### Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the third day of March, A. D. 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 5. To choose a school committee for three years.
- Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year and vote the compensation.
  - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers' bills for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.

- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for state aid and road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet state apportionments.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay overdrawn bills, including snow bills.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will raise money for maintenance of third class road. Such sum cannot be less than \$204.00 as per state requirements.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on state aid highway within the limits of the town.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$80.00 for Mother's Aid.
- Art. 23 To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$138.00 for electric lights.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$5.00 for public health work in Stow, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare in cooperation with local authorities.
- Art. 25. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools to be according to law.

- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to give a two percent discount on all taxes paid before July 1, 1941.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1st, to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax deeds or liens.
- Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a new snow plow, and raise money for same.
- Art. 31. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to third class roads in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.
- Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on Monday, the third day of March, 1941, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to revise the list of voters.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

I offer herewith my eighteenth annual report of the progress condition and needs of the school department of the Town of Stow:

The school opened on September 9, 1940, for the usual school year of thirty-six weeks. Mrs. Mildred C. Andrews was and is continued as the teacher. This statement is more a matter for the record of the town than for information of course. I feel that the town is very fortunate in the selection and retention of this teacher for whom her pupils have so great a love and respect and which is so well deserved.

This year we began work in the sub-primary grade, thus adding a year to the elementary school life of our beginning pupils from this year onward. The foremost purpose of the Sub Primary Grade is to condition and prepare very young pupils for school life, to help them achieve that readiness to learn first and before they actually do learn a very great deal. It happened that in Stow this year with two unusually apt and intelligent little beginners the Sub Primary Grade has thus far made more progress than the same grade in any other school in this school union.

The latest, and it is to be hoped the best, sub primary material has been purchased and used. Some further purchases will be necessary immediately.

All of the other grades in the school are making very satfactory progress. Where, a few years ago, it was difficult to interest pupils in good reading, it is now a problem to provide sufficient reading material for them. This is the most decided and satisfactory improvement that can be imagined, I think, in this particular situation. The noon lunch, as provided and served in the school during a part of this year is a notable feature of our school. This, we well know, would be quite impossible without the support of the parents, to whom the children and the teacher are indeed grateful. This year we are receiving certain lunch supplies from the Surplus Commodities Administration of the Federal Government. Parents should drop in at noon time and observe this school family. It is unique.

Last summer the building was painted outside and all of the furniture was varnished. There is need of patching the plaster in a few spots. The roof of the building at Union Hill should be repaired this year to prevent leakage and consequent damage to the interior. This work should have been done last summer, but it escaped attention at the time and there were not sufficient funds available.
