

Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday, the second day of March, A. D., 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers' bills for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid and road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 29, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to recind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay overdrawn bills, including snow bills.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will raise money for maintenance of Third Class Road. Such sum cannot be less than \$136.00, as per State requirements.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on State Aid Highway within the limits of the town.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$138.00 for electric lights.

- Art. 23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$5.00 for public health work in Stow, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.
- Art. 24. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools to be according to law.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on all taxes paid before July 1, 1942.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1st to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax deeds or liens.
- Art. 29. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to third class roads in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.
- Art. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on Monday, the second day of March, 1942, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to revise the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

Herewith is my nineteenth annual report of the School Department of the town of Stow:

On Sept. 8, 1941, Mrs Mildred C. Andrews opened the school for the current school year of thirty-six weeks. The school is progressing favorably, the usual curriculum is being followed as far as is possible under the conditions of the day. Due attention is being given to current national affairs in order that pupils may well understand the meaning of what we call the democratic ideal of civilization. The subprimary grade has become a permanent feature of the school life of the pupils and beyond question is a most advantageous advance. A lively and excellent Grade VIII is being prepared for further schooling and as far as possible for community life here or elsewhere. This group will be very much missed in the school after its graduation. The noon lunch, during the winter term, continues to be an important agent in the proper nourishment of the children.

We have as usual, a happy and efficient school as we hope that most citizens will agree. Parental interest and cooperation is of a very high degree and is much appreciated.

The building is in good condition. A screen door was hung during the summer. At some future time the building should be refinished inside in order to make it more attractive and comfortable.

The Union Hill school building has now been returned to the custody of the Municipal officers, since it is not at all probable that it will ever again be used as a schoolhouse.
