Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the sixth day of March, A. D. 1944, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers' bills for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sect. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 29, Public Laws of 1937.

- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amounts required to meet state apportionments.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay snow bills.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will raise money for maintenance of third class road. Such sum cannot be less than \$136.00 as per state requirements.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes of State Aid Highways within the limits of the town.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$60.00 for electric lights.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$5.00 for public health work in Stow, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health. State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.
- Art. 24. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools to comply with the law.

- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to give a two percent discount on taxes paid before July 1st, 1944.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1st, to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art, 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax deeds or liens.
- Art. 29. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Maine.
- Art. 30. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the purchase of a road machine and raise money for the same.
- Art. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on Monday, the sixth day of March, 1944, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to revise the list of voters.

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

Herewith my twenty-first annual report.

The school year opened on Sept. 6, 1943, with Mrs. Mildred C. Andrews in charge for the ninth consecutive year. This lengthening period of service has, we think, met with the approval of all concerned.

This year we have purchased the usual quantity of supplies, work books and textbooks. Thus far we have been able to get the new language books we wanted for Grades III, IV, V and VI. Those for Grades VII and VIII in this same series will be available we hope for use at the beginning of the next school year. They have not yet been published on account of the book paper shortage. We have purchased more than the usual number of books for the library. Our pupils are the most ambitious readers that we know.

Two resident pupils are attending at Fryeburg Harbor at a charge for tuition of \$1.00 per week each.

Your teacher and your superintendent of schools would again take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation and thanks for the continued support, courtesy and good will that they have for so long a time experienced among the people of the town of Stow.

Report of Public Health Nurse

STOW, 1943

How many of the school children have an annual physical examination to make certain they are in good physical health so they may be able to carry on through the school year? This is a question each parent should consider and they should assume the responsibility for their child's medical care when possible.

Six visits were made to school children in their homes for the purpose of securing the correction of defects or assisting parents to see the need to correct such defects.

Thirty-one visits were made to infants and preschool children emphasizing immunization, helping mothers establish good health habits and urging medical supervision.

Two visits were made to prospective mothers and three visits after delivery to help mothers make necessary adjustments and give care to the new babies.

I would like to thank town officials and teachers for courteous cooperation of the past year. Their interest should aid the cause of better health in Stow.
