Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the sixth day of March, A. D. 1950 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers bills for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 29, Public Laws 1937.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 32, Section 54.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay snow bills.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$60.00 for electric lights.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for public health work in Stow, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in co-operation with local authorities.
- Art. 21. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received of the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for schools or roads to comply with the law.

- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on taxes paid before July 1, 1950.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1, 1950, to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax deeds or liens.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise money and how much for the care of the Stow Corner Cemetery and the Emerson Cemetery.
- Art. 27. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on Monday, the sixth day of March, 1950 at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to revise the list of voters. Given under our hands at Stow, January 25, 1950.

It is easy to explain the overdraft by calling attention to the amount received from the state. A reduction of \$250 by the state is about equal to the accumulated overdraft for the year. The last legislature made no reductions in school appropriations, but it did not consider the increased school program to be maintained in the state. There are nearly 300 more teaching positions and possibly 10,000 more children in school than there were two years ago when legislature was in session. Apparently the town must share the added burden alone.

I am more than pleased with the efforts you people are making to provide services for your children that are common in larger communities. You have had vaccinations and inoculations which is an excellent immunization program. You have started with physicial examinations which we hope will continue, (each year grades 1, 4 and 7 should be done). You are continuing the noon lunch program which has been a part of the school program for many years. This year the meals are being cooked outside of school and federal assistance will help pay for the cost of the program. With 29 children in school it would be quite difficult to do all the work in school as has been done in the past.

Quite often people ask about our school program of studies. It would be difficult to describe it all here, but there are a few items that I would like to explain.

In social studies we like to combine grades and also alternate subject matter from year to year. This year grades 5 and 6 study old world history and geography as a single subject-social studies. Grades 7 and 8 study Maine for the first half year and they will study world problems the last half year. Next year grades 5 and 6 will study history and geography of the Americas, and grades 7 and 8 will also study the Americas but on a more intensive scale. In the lower grades we do not follow a definite text any more than we do in the upper grades, but we do have specific areas that we hope to cover. In grade 2 we confine our study to home and community. In grade 3 we extend to the town and state. We also include units on Indians and circus. In grade 4 we study biography and people of various lands.

There are a few items in the language arts that should be clarified. We teach children to print with large letters in the sub-primary, in grade one we continue with manuscript writing reducing the size of the letters, and in grade two there is a gradual transition to cursive writing. We are concerned with the ability of our children and adults in oral and written expression so we are making every effort to develop composition, spelling, and oral conversation. It has been proven many times that this cannot be accomplished by teaching rules of grammar alone. We hope, however, that certain grammar rules will be better understood if children have correct usage and good sentence sense.

There are other school practices which you may question, but I hope you have confidence in your teacher and superintendent, knowing that their interest is in developing both mentally and physically healthy boys and girls.
