Owing to a misunderstanding as to the amount received from the State the schools in Districts Nos. 1, 7, 9, were shortened one week therefore they are entitled to an extra week next year. We regret this very much as plenty of money was available.

REPAIRS.

School house No. 1, needs to be finished and there are not enough seats which are comfortable for the scholars. Having been selected according to their condition rather than whether the seat and desk would match or not.

Two new windows were put into the school house at West Levant several more are needed.

The school house in the Emerson Dist. was shingled but the wood shed needs to be repaired in general.

The house at the Village needs a coat of paint and the wood-shed is in a deplorable condition and should be repaired as soon as possible.

SCHOOL BOOKS

As the Wentworth's Arithmetic now in use in town is very difficult for the children to grasp readily, we would recommend that a simpler one be introduced to be used before Wentworth's. We would also advise the use of another series of Readers for supplementary work.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I would urge, not only the parents but also all citizens to take more interest in our schools, by visiting the schools, becoming acquainted with the teachers and know for themselves what work is done.

I wish also to thank each one for the kindness and courtesies shown me during the past two years.

The pleasant greeting which the children have ever shown me will ever be remembered with pleasure.
