

There have come criticisms to the manner in which the Overseers have handled this case, but we have done what we have thought to be the best for the town, and we still think that we have done what was for the best interests of all concerned.

We cannot expect these conditions to continue for another year as we can see what is liable to come most any time, and we would recommend raising the sum of \$500.00 for the poor, for 1920.

The taxes for 1920 bid fair to be higher than they were in 1919, we will be asked a great deal more for schools, it seems as though our school houses must be repaired for they are far from what they should be for the health and comfort of our children, our Superintendent will recommend that we raise the sum of \$1000.00 for repair of school houses.

There is a strong feeling of raising at least \$3000.00 to be used on our highways for the coming year.

We are facing conditions that we well might stop and think before we come to our annual meeting and be ready to express our own views, and act and vote for what will be best for the majority of our towns people and having done this to stand by each other for making our town of Levant a better place to live in and do by those that are coming after us as we know to be right.

Superintendent of Schools' Report

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of Levant, I submit this my first annual report:

I am sorry to say that I do not consider the schools have been as much of a success as they should have been, altho most of the teachers have worked hard and faithfully performed their duties. Some of the parents do not seem to realize the importance of sending their children regularly; but keep them out for every little excuse they can find, or if they send them at all will start them ten to thirty minutes late, thereby bothering the teacher and pupils, who are regular and prompt, and helping to form for the children themselves very bad habits which will probably stick to them thru life. Now I ask every parent and guardian for the welfare of their children and the schools, to see that their scholars are prompt and regular in attendance. I would also ask all voters, who have the interest of the schools at heart, to remember that we cannot expect something for nothing; so it will be necessary for you to see that we have money to do with.

We feel that we need and should have every dollar for which we are asking, as we have made our recommendations just as low as we can and feel reasonably confident of making the schools a success.

In our estimate for Common Schools we have figured on paying good experienced teachers if we can find them \$18 per week.

Can we hope to get them for less?

Other things such as fuel, conveyance etc., we have figured the same as this year.

COURSE OF STUDY

We have adopted the State Course of Study in all our schools. We have introduced the hot lunch in two.

REPAIRS

Probably very few of you realize just the condition your school-buildings are in, or how they compare with the buildings of other towns of your size and valuation.

I venture to say that in no town are they in a worse condition, and few as bad. I cannot believe it is because you take no interest in your children's welfare; neither can I think you too mean to furnish the necessary funds to put them in good condition. I understand you have raised for the past two years the amount your board has asked for for this purpose, but that they have failed to spend it, and no wonder; for in looking over any one of your school-buildings they must have seen that it would be impossible to improve them much with so small a sum. If you allow us what we ask for this year, and it is little enough to do the job, I promise you we will try and put one building in first-class, condition. By taking one each year you will soon have them all in good shape.

To Ira H. Goodwin, a Constable in the Town of Levant in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Levant, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday, the eighth day of March A. D. 1920 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of their selectmen and accept the report as printed.
 - Art. 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor.
 - Art. 5. To elect one member of the S. S. Comittee.
 - Art. 6. To elect a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To elect a road commissioner or commissioners.
- Art. 8. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools, for the repair of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books and supplies, for the repair of school houses and out-buildings, for school appliances, for memorial purposes, for care of cemetaries and for patrol maintenance.
- Art. 9. To clect a tax collector, constables, and all other necessary town officers.

- Art. 10. To fix the daily compensation for men and teams laboring on the highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$553.00 for the improvement of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway commissioners in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public laws of 1913.
- Art. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to making the necessary repairs on the town house and raise money for same or act anything relative thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to have their town represented by one of their assessors at the Assessors Convention held in Augusta each year under the auspices of the State Assessors and appropriate money to defray the expenses.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to organize a High School and raise money for the same.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to rebuild that part of the bridge at Levant Village that needs to be rebuilt and raise money for the same, and say how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 17 To see if the town will vote to repair or rebuild the East abutment of the bridge at S. Levant and raise money for the same, or act anything relative thereto.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to permit J. U. Day to install and maintain a penstock under the "Harding Bridge" so-called or act anything relative thereto.

- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to build a road from the Pomroy road so called to and connecting with the Ross road so-called or act anything relative thereto.
- Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money sufficient to finish the job of erecting the guide boards through town.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the town house at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.
