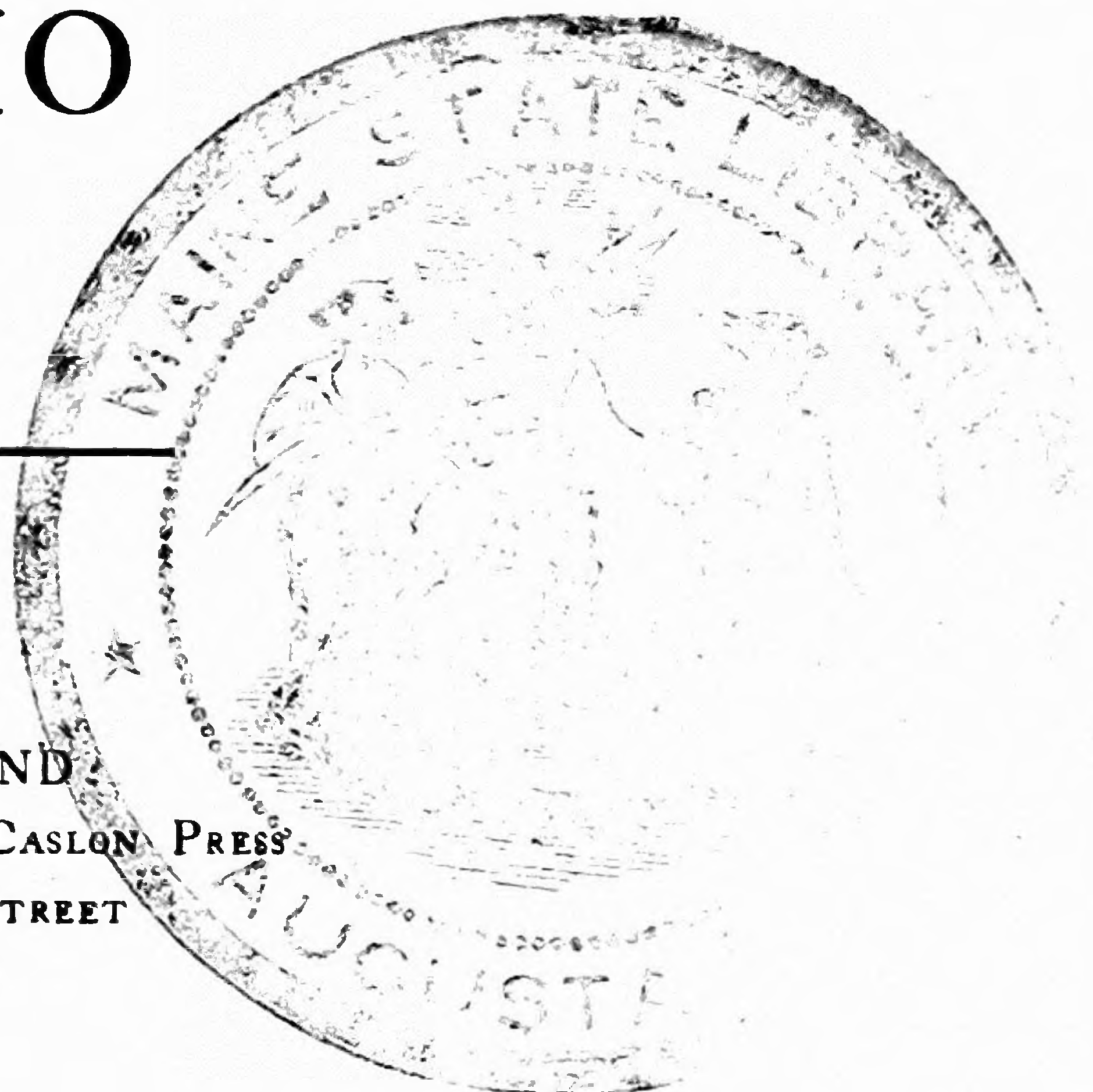

School Report

To the Citizens of the Town of North Haven:

Having our schools once more permanently located we are adjusting ourselves to the new conditions and are getting down to hard, honest work. Teachers and pupils have worked faithfully and well the past year. No serious sickness has interrupted the schools. On the whole the attendance has been good, and the quantity and quality of work done, satisfactory.

During the fall and winter terms we had two teachers at the Thoroughfare. Having more time for the classes much more satisfactory work has been accomplished. The requirements for entrance to the High school have been raised somewhat and a course of study for the same revised and approved by the State Superintendent. Every effort is being made to have a class properly fitted to enter this school next September.

On another page will be found our approved course of study for the High school. In order to maintain our present rating we must do satisfactory work in the studies throughout a four years' course of at least 36 weeks per year, and the school must be well equipped with a chemical and physical laboratory.

We can assure you that the pupils are doing fine work in this school and you have good reasons to be proud of the North Haven High school.
