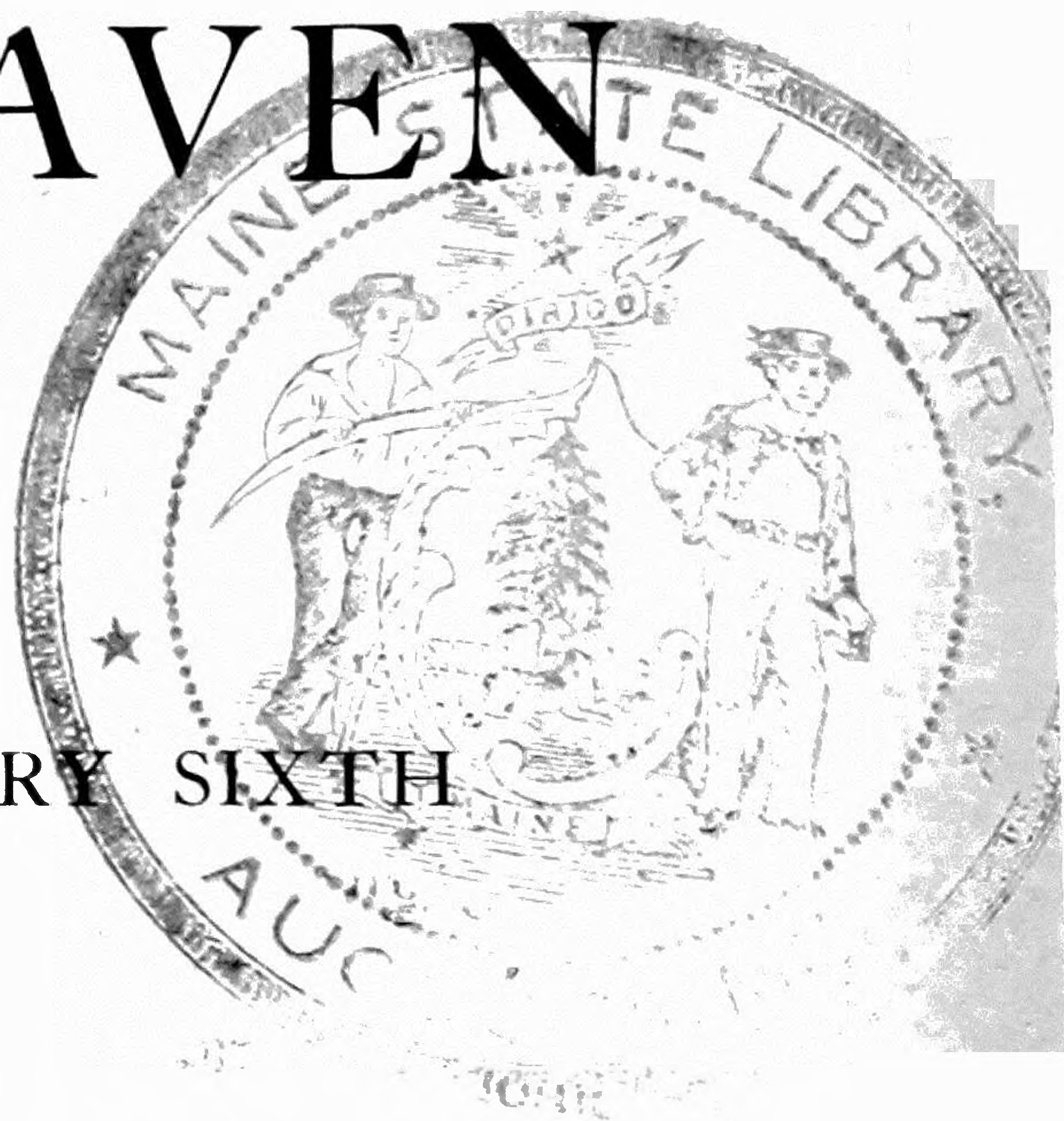

School Report

To the Citizens of the Town of North Haven:

It is gratifying to report that the work in the school department has gone off quietly and effectively the past year. One thing greatly favoring the work of the schools is the fact that we have not only been fortunate in securing competent and experienced teachers, but have been able to keep them in the schools throughout the year except in the Center school, circumstances being such that we were obliged to have a different teacher for each term in this school. At present this is the largest school in town and the most difficult to classify and control.

The pupils at the North East District are fast decreasing in numbers, and unless a larger attendance can be secured the coming year than there has been for the past two terms the school cannot be continued thereafter without a vote of the town to that effect.

The High school was somewhat handicapped during the spring term by too frequent change in teachers. A class of seven boys and girls were graduated in May, it being the third class we have sent out to put to test the education and training received in the North Haven schools. The graduates of North Haven High school are "making good" and we take great pleasure and pride in watching their progressive careers.

Mr. Grindle is doing very satisfactory work in the school this year. Mr. Taylor, the State inspector of High schools, has visited the school twice within a year, and by following his instructions and suggestions we are assured

that the present classes are receiving such training as will graduate them on a footing with pupils in schools of standard grade. It will be necessary to fit up a physical laboratory the coming year and thus work up gradually to the minimum requirements of a standard High school.

We thank the parents and citizens for their hearty cooperation in the management of the schools.

- 16 To choose a Constable or Constables.
- 17 To choose a Truant Officer or Officers.

- 18 To choose Surveyors of Wood and Bark.
- 19 To choose Surveyors of Lumber.
- 20 To choose a Pound Keeper.
- 21 To provide a place for a Pound.
- 22 To choose Fence Viewers.
- 23 To choose an undertaker and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 24 To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray town charges.
- 25 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs on roads and bridges.
- 26 To see what sum the town will raise for the support of common schools.
- 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise to be expended in a free High School.
- 28 To see what sum of money the town will raise for free text books.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will raise for school supplies.
- 30 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs on school buildings.
- 31 To see what sum of money the town will raise to clear the roads of snow.
- 32 To see what sum the town will raise to pay interest on outstanding notes.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to raise \$500 to pay outstanding notes.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$15 for Memorial Day.
- 35 To see if the town will vote yes or no on the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for 1911.

36 To see if town will vote to raise \$400 to be expended on State road.

37 To see if the town will vote to build a system of water works, for public and domestic purposes, and to establish hydrants in convenient places for protection against fires.

38 To see if the town will vote to issue a series of bonds to pay for said water works or provide some other way.

39 To see if the town will vote to contract for a term of years with the North Haven Water Company (to be organized) for a supply of water, for fire and other purposes, securing a hydrant service for fire protection, and what sum of money they will vote to raise annually to pay for same.
