# School Report

---

Fellow Citizens :

Again we submit to you a brief report of the progress and condition of our schools. The school work has moved along quietly and profitably, there being no serious interruptions on account of sickness or for other reasons. All the teachers have had previous experience or special training and with but one exception have given us good service. It is much to be regretted that we were unable to hold more of our teachers throughout the year.

The schools at the Thoroughfare and at the Northeast District are small and fairly well graded as to classes, which has aided much in the progress of the work. The Center school is very difficult indeed to classify. If another recitation room can be secured it will be highly profitable to employ another teacher for the present to handle a few of the primary classes. Much credit is due the teachers for their management of this school under the present conditions.

If the pupils at Crabtree's Point are to be conveyed to the school, as they very much desire, an increase in the school appropriation should be made to pay for conveyance.

The High school is making good progress under Principal Morrison and we shall be proud to graduate another class next June. Look over our list of pupils for the past ten years. Note the number who have attended and are attending institutions of higher learning. This school is indeed a profitable institution. The chief aim of the High school should be to create the desire and cultivate the ambition of our youth to aspire to something higher. This we are surely doing.

Again we thank you for your aid and sympathy in the work of the schools.
