Superintendent's Report

To the Citizens of the Town of North Haven;

I, herewith, submit my second annual report on the condition of the schools under my charge.

WORK ACCOMPLISHED

During the past year the two largest school buildings have been kept in good repair and both have been thoroughly painted on the exterior.

The school year has been lengthened from 30 to 34 weeks and the work is no longer interrupted by long vacations. That this change has resulted in great improvement in our schools is evident to anyone who has observed the work of the schools.

There has been one change in text-books during the year. Serl's Language Lessons were introduced and used from grades 3 to 6 inclusive. Several sets of supplementary readers have also been purchased during the year and have added greatly to the pleasure of the school work.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Some way must be found to increase the size of the room used as a laboratory at the High School. The present arrangement is totally inadequate for our needs and in the case of the Chemistry course is positively dan-

gerous. We are obliged to include in our science course, Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Physical Geography. All of these subjects require laboratory work; yet the present room is so small that the class in Chemistry has to be sent to the laboratory in two divisions. If we are to continue our high school we must improve the laboratory at once.

A new law requiring State certification of all teachers went into operation this year. Since this law raises the qualification of teachers, an immediate result will be an advance in teachers wages. While we have a large unexpended balance on the Common School account for this year, I recommend that the same appropriation be made for next year so that we may be able to meet the new conditions and secure desirable teachers.

IN CONCLUSION

It must be admitted that our schools are far from perfect but it will be well for all to remember that your location and small population are somewhat against us in securing ideal school conditions. Some progress has been made in all our schools during the year and the teachers as a rule have worked faithfully and been obedient to the supervisor.
