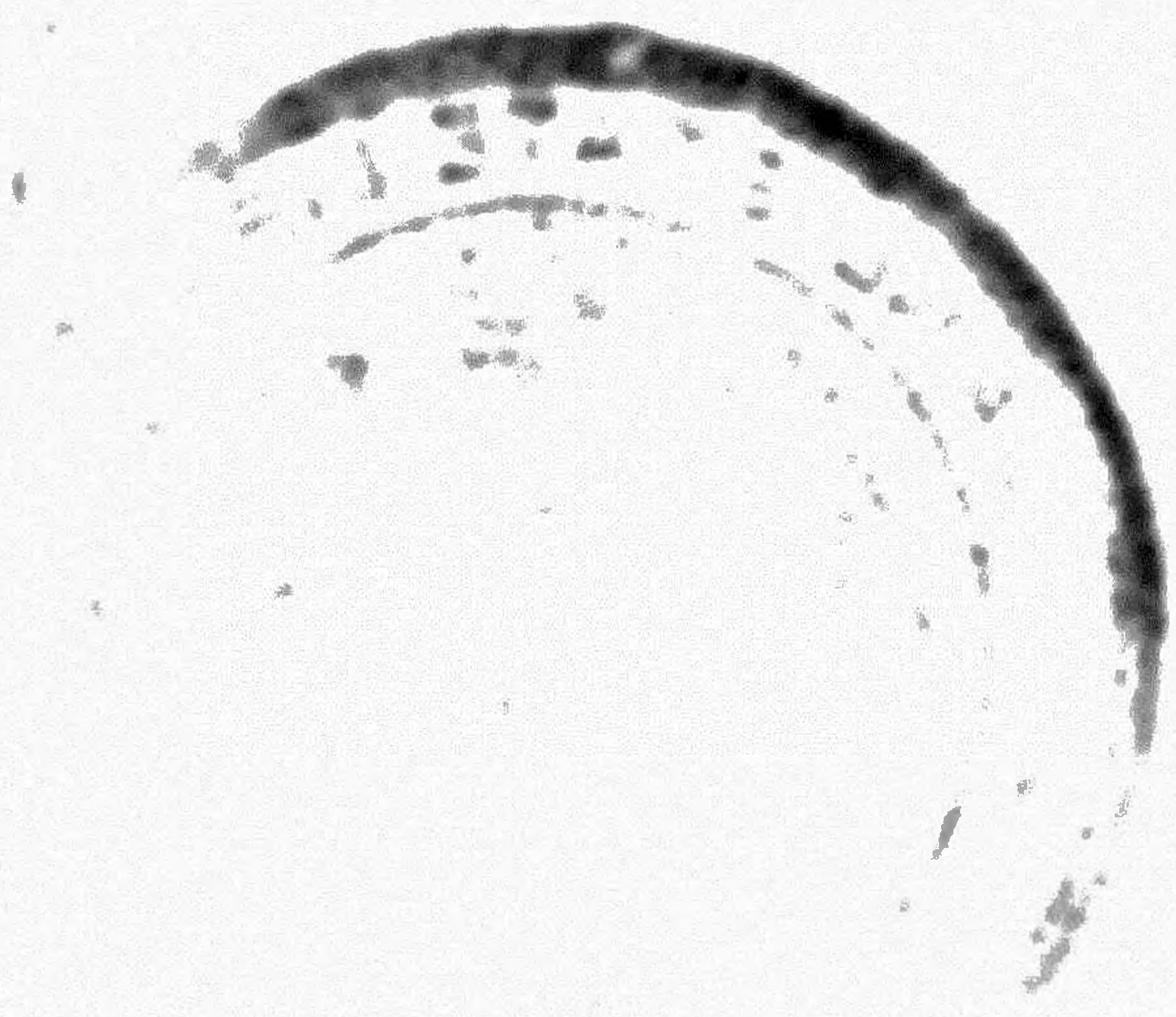

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of North Haven:

Following the established custom, I herewith, submit the annual report on the condition of schools in the town of North Haven.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR'S WORK

One year ago the Superintending School Committee adopted a program of improvement for our schools. Following this program first attention was given to secure properly qualified teachers for all our schools. In this we have been fortunate especially since the schools opened in September. Our schools are now in good condition and this advance must be maintained.

There has been an extension of the system of transporting children to the common schools. This has been greatly to the advantage of the children and has meant actual economy to the town. This system should be further extended and improved so that it may not be necessary to open the North-east school during any part of the year.

Many repairs were made during the year on the Center School building and the fence about the school grounds was rebuilt and is now in first class condition.

We have used for the first time this year the State Course of study recommended for rural schools. This has worked well and should help us in building up our schools to a higher standard.

NEEDS OF THE SCHOOLS

The work of school betterment has just begun and it is my desire to make some progress each year. As has been my custom in the past, I shall briefly outline a few improvements which should be undertaken this year.

A set of shelves should be built in the selectmen's room in the Center School building for holding our supply of text books and supplementary readers. The expense will be small and will be more than offset by the saving made in giving the books proper care. These books are public property and should not be stored in private homes or left in overcrowded school libraries to be destroyed by careless teachers and pupils.

We should adopt a policy of better heating and ventilation for our two larger buildings. I recommend that some heating system be installed in one of these buildings during the coming year.

Our schools are poorly equipped with maps, globes, necessary reference books, etc., especially is this true of the High School. I recommend that a much larger appropriation be made this year for school equipment.

The school supplies such as paper, pens, etc., are at present in part furnished by the town. The use of much material purchased by the pupils results in lack of uniformity in school work and much loss of efficiency. It is simply an extension of the free text book plan to furnish all of this equipment free in every school. I recommend that in the future all necessary supplies be furnished by the town free of cost.

FINALLY

I am pleased to notice a greater interest in the affairs of our schools on the part of parents and friends. It is my hope that during the coming year there may be a much greater evidence of community interest in our schools.
