



Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of the Town of North Haven:

As superintendent, I have had charge of your for four years. For many personal reasons and I feel that to continue longer in this office would be stand in the way of progress, I shall relinquish work at the end of this fiscal year.

SUPERVISION

Supervision of schools is an important service in community and demands the highest professional equi ment and close application to the work. Few are fitt by training and experience for this position and no whose attention and ability are directed chiefly alo some other line of work, has any business to act for long period as superintendent.

I, therefore, recommend that we form a union wi some other town or towns for the purpose of hiring superintendent. Fortunately our State has a splendid supervision law which is working well in all towns wh ever applied. Since this law embodies the latest approved methods of securing expert supervision under the State Superintendent of Schools, it is more than crimi-

nal to longer deny our children the benefits which are sure to come from a reorganization of our schools under this law.

It may be well to remember, also, that the school law at present demands special qualifications for superintendent of schools. In order to serve in this position legally, the holder must possess either a highest grade

teacher's certificate or a superintendent's certificate. There are few at North Haven who are able to qualify under the law.

HIGH SCHOOL

In retiring from office I want to confess frankly that our High School is far from satisfactory. The material equipment, such as desks, chemical and physical apparatus, books and maps, is inadequate. Yet in proportion to attendance we are now spending annually twice as much per pupil in the High School as in the Common Schools.

The present method of admitting a new class every second year is far from satisfactory. Close grading, under such a plan, is not possible, and members of every entering class are far from being equally well equipped for the work.

It has always seemed to me that it would be far better for us to admit pupils every year and attempt only the first two years of high school work than to continue under the present plan. A one-teacher-school with four classes is manifestly impossible. Few teachers are equipped to teach all high school subjects under the present plan. It should be the first duty of the new superintendent to attempt the solution of many of the pressing problems connected with our High School.

IN CONCLUSION

I want to thank all who have aided me in the work which I have tried to do in the schools. I have especially enjoyed the intimate association with the members of the superintending school committee. In the years to come I shall not forget our school but hope to be of some degree of helpfullness to both pupils and teachers.
