Report of Superintendent of Schools

I herewith submit, on behalf of the School Committee, the School Report for the financial year 1917-18.

The work in the grades has not been materially changed during the year, as the course as outlined by your former Superintendent seemed to be giving excellent results.

The attendance has been fairly good during the year. Poor attendance is the most damaging feature of the entire school system. For the children it means lessens half learned, lack of interest in the work and in the school, many parts of subjects not studied at all, and a feeling, more hurtful than all else, that "being present or absent does not matter". For the teacher it means poor and unsatisfactory progress of the classes and whole sale discouragement for the entire school. I would urge all parents to see to it, that their children lose no part of a school session unless absolutely necessary.

The work in the High School has been exceptionally good. Everyone knows the advantage in having a permanent teaching force, and I believe the Committee made a wise decision in retaining our present principal, even at a considerable advance in salary. To me a small

high school is one in which there can be very little specialization of work by the teacher, or one in which the teacher must give instruction in several subjects which are quite distinct. One way to meet this difficulty would be to limit the number of studies in the courses to fewer lines of work. This plan would not be practicable. The question then becomes one of teachers. The question to be met is how to secure and retain teachers able to give instruction in from three to five lines of work; or the question resolves itself to one of money, for money can secure such teachers. In my opinion, it takes stronger teaching to secure good results in a small school than it does in a large one.

My short term of office has not given me the opportunity I desire for a closer study of the needs of your schools, so I refrain from making any special recommendations at this time. Suffice it is to say, you have a good teaching force; the teachers are working hard and giving good service. My thanks are heartily extended to them for their excellent work during my supervision. I also take this opportunity to thank the committee for their uniform kindness and courtesy.
