Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of North Haven.

I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the year ending Feb. 10, 1919.

Regardless of the many difficulties which have presented themselves during the past year, the schools have made splendid progress. Our worst difficulty has been the Influenza; this epidemic has obliged us to close the schools several times. The first time we lost four weeks but plans have been made to make up this time without additional expense to the town.

The State Course of study for Elementary Schools has been adopted this year and will be put in use as soon as sufficient copies can be obtained to supply each teacher. This course is merely a suggested outline of work to be taken up in the several grades, and can be adjusted to meet the demands of any school. It is in general use throughout the State, thus making it possible for children moving from town to town to continue their studies at a minimum loss of time.

A special effort has been made this year to establish a uniform system of text books which seem best adap-

ted to the course of study. In order to accomplish this end, no additional expense need be incurred since no large number of books will be purchased at any one time, but as the books now in use are worn out, they will be replaced by new ones according to a definite plan. This method eliminates the haphazard purchase of text books which is not always economical.

We are to be congratulated in having an exceptionally good force of teachers most of whom have had professional training and all are doing excellent work. It is always prudent to retain the successful teachers so far as possible because the experienced teacher has many advantages over the beginner, she understands the pupils and the community and knows just where to take up the work that was in progress during the preceding year. The fact that we start a class in High School only on alternate years requires good judgment and skillful management on part of the grade teachers, however this method has proven very effectual in the past and so long as we are fortunate enough to secure good teachers, I believe no change is advisable in the system.

The High School under the efficient instruction of Mr. Morrimer is doing excellent work, and we have good reasons to be proud of that little school. The students are all amply qualified for their work and the spirit and interest which they always manifest is certain to win them success. This year I have employed several teachers who are graduates of that school and I am glad to say that everyone is giving entire satisfaction.

Of course there are a few disadvantages to be overcome in a B Class High School but these need not be disastrous at all. I have made a careful investigation of our high school plan this year and at present I would not recommend any change.

Good attendance is the first requisite for success in the public schools. Therefore parents are urged to cooperate with the teachers to secure perfect attendance so far as possible. They should also put forth an earnest effort to visit the schools several times each term as there is nothing the children enjoy much as to have their parents visit their school. A child will always do better work when he knows his parents are interested in what he is doing.

Except for a few minor repairs, the school buildings are all in good condition. A wash bowl and drinking fountain should be installed in the Primary Room of the Thoroughfare School. A new flag is needed for the North East School. The law requires that a special appropriation be made for the purchase of flags for public buildings; therefore I recommend that ten dollars be raised for this purpose. At present I am unable to recommend the customary appropriations so will leave these entirely to the discretion of the school committee.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the school committee, teachers and citizens for the loyal support which they have given me since I have been in office.
