

At the last annual meeting the town voted to raise \$1,800.00 for roads and bridges. And for drainage at the village \$500.00 the town also voted that the cost of building the new road through the old fair ground be appropriated from money in the town Treasury. And by the statement of the road Commssioner the cost of the same was \$175.00. Making for the support of roads and drainage \$2,475.00

Your road Commissioner found it necessary to lay out much more on old drains than any one thought would be required at our last annual meeting. Since the death of the road Commissioner the selectmen have taken charge of the roads, but only to the extent of making such repairs as seemed, to them, to be absolutely necessary.

The building of the new county road was let by the Selectmen to Henry Andrews at a cost of \$275.00 and the same has been paid from the town Treasury.

SCHOOL REPORT.

TO THE CITIZENS OF FRYEBURG:

The sudden and lamented decease of Mr. Orrin Charles, just as the schools were about opening for the summer term, seemed to make it advisable, in the judgement of your Committee, that I should again take the office of Superintendent for the present year. While no very great improvement has been observed in any of the school yet the work done will compare favorably, I think, with that of previous years. Many of your children have progressed well in their studies and have made good use of their privileges. And if there has been some idleness and disorder, and some bad boys and girls have not been disciplined as they should have been, we must remember that it is a remarkable field which yields no small potatoes. In the very best schools not all are first-class in rank and deportment. The teachers have all tried, apparently, to do their duty faithfully according to their several gifts of teaching ability. Some of them seem to me to be not fully qualified for their work. But on the other hand, if they have not been quite competent, neither has the 'pay been altogether adequate. You cannot expect to get a College Professor for four dollars per week and board. For the most part, I am confident, our teachers have honestly earned their wages.

Let us not undervalue, then, the good our common schools are doing, though it is true that they are far from being ideally satisfactory. But when all the limitations and difficulties are considered, it is not easy to see just what can be done to make them very much better. It requires no very high order of mental genius to find fault with the exsisting state of things in the schools or elsewhere, but to find just the right remedy is quite another matter. Of course if the citizens were able and willing to spend more money on the school buildings and to pay for the highest grade of teachers, we could have more successful and flourishing schools; but the majority, probably, do not care to vote much larger appropriations than they have heretofore. The best that can be done, then, is to use the available means for the maintenace of the schools with

good judgement and strict economy.

Since the town has nearly 50 less scholars to draw money, we receive from the State fund \$140 less than last year. But notwith-standing this diminished revenue, it has been possible to increase by two weeks the amount of schooling for the present year. The reason for this gain is partly because several items of expense have been somewhat less, but mainly because less money has been needed for the Village schools, while the Menotomy school, No. 4, has been suspended for the year, and No. 9. for the fall term.

Only a few small repairs have been made; but in my judgement it would be good policy for the town to lay out two or three hundred dollars every year, until all the decent school-houses were put in thoroughly good condition, inside and outside. If you wish the buildings to be kept insured, I suppose that a special appropriation should be made for this purpose. Most of the policies now in force will expire this year or next. I am well aware that the present financial state of many of our townsmen is not the most cheerful, yet I cannot forbeaar reminding you once more of the urgent need of a suitable building, containing three rooms, to accommodate all the scholars of Fryeburg Village. I recommend an appropriation of \$100 for the purchase of text-books.

The whole number of scholars belonging to the town is 359.

The term of office of Mr. Jason W. Towle and of the late Mr. Orrin Charles having expired, it will be necessary at the coming town meeting to fill these vacancies by electing two members of the Snperintending School Committee to serve for three years each. And the law also requires the election of one or more Truant Officers.
