SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Citizens of Fryeburg,

The Superintending School Committee met at the office of Hastings & Warren, on the evening of the twenty-fourth day of March, A. D. 1899, and chose the Rev. B. N. Stone chairman for the ensuing year. The Committee then voted to delegate to the Superintendent all powers and duties, which, by law, it could give him excepting, however, the power to examine, certificate and employ teachers.

Your Committee has held several meetings during the past year, taken a keen interest in the schools, and I think, has been successful in the performance of all its powers and duties.

School No. 7 has not been in session this winter, as the children, who attend that school, or a part of them were transported to school No. 1, at the Village. Schools No. 10 and 15 have been in session for eleven weeks each this winter, as each was only nine weeks in length in the fall term, while all the other schools were ten weeks in length.

The primary and grammar schools, at the Village, are now on a very satisfactory working basis, and both have been doing excellent work this year; the studies in each have been arranged, the classes condensed, and from this good progress is assured in the future. The remaining schools have also accomplished good results, the classes in the larger ones have been condensed, and other changes essential to their welfare have been made. We are inclined to have too many classes in our larger schools, which I do think a good thing and I heartily approve of the action of our teachers in combining the classes, thereby leaving more time for those that remain.

The cost of transportation has been necessarily larger this year than it was last, as a greater number of scholars have had to be transported. The increased cost for this winter was caused from the fact that part of the scholars who attended school No. 7, were transported to school No. 1, as aforesaid; last winter there was no school at school No. 7, neither were any of the scholars transported, thereby making a decrease in last years expenses, while this year, on account of said transportation, the expenses were increased, I wish to say, that I am not in fayor of the school laws in regard to the transportation of scholars and discontinuance of schools, as they are at the present time, and I hope that our next Legislature will see fit to change them, so that they will give more general satisfaction than they do to-day.

Last spring I gathered together all the books owned by the town, renumbered, and returned them to the school-houses from which I took them. It seemed necessary that the books should be numbered again, as some were lost and many had been sold, thereby making it impossible

to tell how many and what books the town owned. I would suggest that the town raise, at least, one hundred and fifty dollars for school books.

I have had the ceiling and walls of school-house No. 14 sheathed, as the school-house has, for a long time, been very cold in winter and dangerous to the health of the scholars. I have had school-house No. 8 and 10 each painted with two coats of paint. I have had also school-house No. 15 painted one coat and of course have made several minor repairs.

In regard to repairs that should be made the coming year, I would say that the Toll Bridge school-house is in serious need of alterations, new windows should be put in, the ceiling and walls replastered or sheathed a new floor laid and a new chimney built. A competent carpenter estimates the cost of these changes to be \$150 00, therefore if we raise \$250 for repairs this year, this sum together with the unexpended balance of last year will be large enough to pay for the repairs on said Toll Bridge school-house and also for the repairs, that will have to be made on the other school-houses.

With the appropriation for seats and desks, I bought sixty new and three second hand ones, and placed themin the different school-houses. I think that they have been found to be far better than the old seats and desks previously used. I hope that the town will, at its annual meeting make another appropriation as large as that of last year, so that more new seats and desks can be purchased.

The Woman's Club has very kindly had some woodbine planted about school-house No. 1, and has also had the ceilings and walls of school-houses No. 1 and 2 whitened, thus showing their continued interest in the schools.

The following schools are discontinued by law, to wit, school No. 7 at Mt. Tom, No. 9 at Birch Hill, school No. 12 at Fish St., and School No. 13 at Toll Bridge. If these schools are to be continued for the coming school year, it will be necessary for the town to take some action about them at the annual meeting; I have had articles in regard to them put into the warrant.

At the annual meeting it will be necessary to elect one member of the Superintending School Committee, as the Rev. B. N. Stone's term of office will then expire.

The whole number of persons between the ages of four and twenty-one, who resided in the town on the first day of April 1899, was three hundred and fifteen.

The statistics, which relate to the schools, are given in detail in the annexed tabular statement.
