SCHOOLS SUP'TS REPORT.

Gentlemen.

At the first meeting of the School Committee, for the year 1900, Rev. B. N. Stone was chosen Chairman and A. C. Ferguson, Secretary.

The Committee met several times during the year to select teachers; decide what changes, if any, were to be made in text books, school supplies etc; determine where and what repairs were to be made, and to attend to any other matters concerning the schools

In a few instances the selection of teacher was unfortunate, such a selection as will recur more or less frequently as long as the appropriation for schools is so small as not to permit the employment of experienced teachers in all our schools.

The Committee, after fair trial in some of the schools, adopted Wentworth's Arithmetics, Cyr's Readers and Kittredge and Arnold's "The Mother Tongue", and instructed your Superintendent to purchase a supply of the books and place them in the schools.

The appropriation of \$150. for school books was not large enough for the purpose. Several hundred of the old books have been sent in exchange, but as there is an allowance of but a few cents each for them the amount realized was still not enough to give a good supply of books to the schools.

The Committee instructed the Superintendent to have the Toll Bridge school house repaired and the work was done by Mr. Chas. Farrington, he being the lowest bidder.

The building was put in good repair at an expense of \$176.50 and will not need any further repairs for some time to come.

School houses No's. 2, 8 and 9 have been shingled.

New stove funnel has been put in No's. 1, 8 and 13 and the stove repaired in No. 13. Desk chairs have been put in No's. 2 and 11. Minor repairs have been made on nearly all the school houses. School houses No's. 1, 2, 7, 9, 11 and 12 are much out of repair. No. 1 will need to be shingled the coming year and many of the school houses will need painting. School house No. 7 is not worth repairing and No. 12 is nearly as bad.

The appropriation of \$1,400 00 for thirteen schools has permitted of but twenty-five weeks of school. Many of these small schools—maintained by vote of the town—have but from one to three scholars, cost the town a little more than \$5 00 per week and are failures economically.

Your schools should be combined wherever practicable. —The cost of transportation of scholars, if you combine your schools, will be but little more than has been this year and you would have larger and better schools and schools in which the scholars would have more interest and more incentive to study.

I believe that transportation of scholars is not a desirable thing—but as it has been thrust upon us, and as long as the scholars are transported, why not transport them to a few, only, of the school houses and have larger schools?

Fryeburg schools are not as advanced as they should be, and to advance the schools to a standing that will com-

pare favorably with that of the most of the nearby towns, we must have more weeks of school and experienced teachers for all schools. To accomplish this larger appropriations will be needed. With a little larger appropriation and not quite so many schools, you can have as good schools as any town.

I would suggest that the scholars in Districts 9 and 12 be apportioned, as is most convenient to them, to Districts 8, 10, 11, and 15.

In the Menotomy and Mt. Tom districts, No. 4 and 7, I would suggest that as the Mt. Tom building is so out of repair as to be hardly fit for use even in the warmer months, a school house be located centrally for the two districts.

A school house, to take the place of No's 1 and 2, is much needed in the village. Better results could be attained if these schools, with an intermediate school, were placed under one roof.

I think that the sum of \$1,800 should be raised for the support of schools; \$300 for repair of school houses, and \$175 for purchase of school books.
