Men of large affairs, schooled in taxation, lecture each day, giving the local assessor a chance to ask questions. I find that these meetings are not only schools of instruction, but it gives the average assessor a chance to feel that he has a lot to learn in the up-to-date tax methods of to-day.

The price for her board has been \$2 per week, with no expense for clothing. We have a good report from the orphan asylum in her behalf. Lida White has the same boarding place as last year, and her expense is \$3 per week for board, and we buy all the clothing. Miss Wadsworth writes that Lida is a very nervous girl and not in the best of health. She has good home training, and her school work is satisfactory. Edgar and Charles White are still under the jurisdiction of the Maine Children's Home Society, Augusta, Me., and the board of overseers of the poor of Cranberry Isles. Edgar, with the sanction of the Children's Home, has enlisted in the United States army. We will have no more expense in his behalf. Charles has grown to be a manly fellow, and much interested in his school work. He has lately gone to a free home where he will be well used, and have a chance to make good. It was my pleasure to meet both of the White boys in Augusta this winter, and I found them both very much changed in appearance and deportment and a credit to the town. An effort was made by the mother to get control of Charles this past year, without success. We would recommend raising the sum of \$300 for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens
of Cranberry Isles.*

I have the honor to submit for your consideration my third annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of Cranberry Isles.

As in my last report, I desire to express my appreciation of the excellent service rendered by the janitors during the year. If I were to be asked to make one criticism regarding the manner in which these buildings are looked after by these janitors, I could not do so. I heartily recommend their reappointment for the ensuing year.

TEACHERS AND COMMON SCHOOLS.

The shortage of teachers and high salaries have made it a difficult matter to procure teachers. This town seems to have been born under a lucky star in regard to its teachers. At the present time we have an entirely new force of teachers from that we had last year.

Miss Gray, at the G. C. I. grammar school, is a teacher of five years' experience, thoroughly conscientious in her work, and striving in every way to make this school a success.

Miss Dolliver, at the G. C. I. primary school, is a normal teacher of several years' experience, and well fitted for this particular line of work. Her pupils have made excellent progress in their work.

Miss Stanley, at the Islesford primary school, is a normal teacher of wide experience, and it is a pleasure to observe her work, which is carried on by modern, up-to-date methods, as results show.

Mr. Spurling, an Islesford boy, although not a teacher of experience, has proven a surprise to his many friends here. Teaching his first term, and especially in his own town where he is so well known, is not, to say the least, an agreeable undertaking for anyone. Yet Mr. Spurling, by his faithfulness, kindness and willingness to work, has been not only a credit to the school, but has established a record of which his own townspeople should be proud.

I am more than pleased by the interest taken by the pupils of these two islands in their studies, their league work and their entertainments. And, again, I am pleased at the interest shown by the parents, and I want them to remember that they are welcome in the schools at all times. I would urge pupils who have graduated from the grades not to discontinue their school career, but to enter some high school as soon as possible.

REPAIRS.

Repairs have been made whenever and wherever necessary. The Islesford school has been painted, and I recommend that the G. C. I. school be painted another year.

TEXT-BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

The schools have been supplied with everything necessary in the line of text-books and supplies, and I am starting a library in each school. These books are selected with a great deal of care, and will do much toward broadening the minds of the pupils.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The superintending school committee, after careful study, made their recommendations for the ensuing year. I believe these recommendations to be conservative, and heartily endorse them, and sincerely hope the citizens will appropriate the amounts asked at the annual town meeting.

There are several items in the financial statement I

should like to make clear, and also offer some suggestions for the ensuing year.

Undoubtedly many of you wonder why there should be an overdraw in the common school account of over \$300, especially when you appropriated practically the amount I recommended last year. It would seem that I did not know a great deal about how much money was actually needed.

The amount of money which I recommended for the salary of teachers and the amount expended this year are practically the same, and the same thing applies to the janitors. The amount paid for fuel was far in excess of the amount recommended. We have no way of estimating the cost of coal and wood next year, no more than we had last year. Coal may be \$20 per ton, and, again, it may be only \$14. Following is a plan I recommend the ensuing year, and which is carried out in many of the towns throughout the State:

First, to create a separate fuel account; second, to create a separate janitor account; third, to make the common school account to consist of only teachers' salaries, board, and board of pupils. By this method it would be clearly shown that the cost of maintaining your schools was not wholly caused by the excessive salaries of teachers.

This town is not by any means paying the highest salaries to its teachers. The average weekly wage of your teachers is \$16.88, while that of the town of Tremont is \$17.46, of Southwest Harbor \$18.56, and of Mt. Desert \$22.82, yet you have two modern school buildings, and the expense of heating these buildings, and janitor work, are necessarily heavy.

If you adopt this plan, I can easily estimate the amount necessary to raise for teachers' salaries, board, and board of pupils, while the fuel account could be estimated as near as possible, so that if there should be

an overdraw in the fuel account it could not be taken from the salaries of teachers.

Again, I recommend a special teacher for penmanship and drawing for part time, as the progress made by pupils of Mt. Desert and Southwest Harbor in penmanship during the past year has made me more than anxious that your children should have this same benefit.

In closing, I wish heartily to thank the superintending school committee and citizens for the courteous treatment accorded me during the year.

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

To the Citizens of the Town of Cranberry Isles.

Having examined the report of the superintendent of schools, we approve the same, and make the following recommendations for the ensuing year :

1 We recommend that the fuel account be a separate item.

2 We recommend that the janitor account be a separate item.

3 We recommend that the common school account shall consist of teachers' salaries, board, and board of pupils.

4 We recommend a special appropriation for painting the G. C. I. school.

5 We recommend a special teacher, part time, for penmanship and drawing, and that the amount be raised by special appropriation.

6 We recommend the following appropriations for the ensuing year, believing them to be as conservative as possible for the best interests of the schools :

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Cranberry Isles, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Town hall in said town on Monday the seventh day of March, A. - 2 To choose by ballot a clerk for the ensuing year.
 - 3 To hear and act on the report of the town officers for the past year.
 - 4 To choose by ballot selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
 - 5 To choose by ballot a treasurer and vote his compensation.
 - 6 To choose by ballot a collector of taxes and vote his compensation.
 - 7 To choose by ballot one member superintending school committee for three years.
 - 8 To choose by ballot a caretaker for Town hall for the ensuing year and vote his pay.
 - 9 To see if the caretaker of Town hall shall let and have charge of hall in connection with selectmen.
 - 10 To choose constables for the ensuing year.
 - 11 To choose surveyor of lumber and measurer of wood and bark for the ensuing year.
 - 12 To nominate road commissioners for the ensuing year.
 - 13 To see what sum of money shall be raised for necessary town charges.
 - 14 To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of the poor.

- 15 To see what sum of money shall be raised for highways on the different islands.
- 16 To see if the town will vote to paint the G. C. I. school building.
- 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for painting the G. C. I. school building.
- 18 To see what sum of money shall be raised for repairs of school property.
- 19 To see what sum of money shall be raised for appliances, apparatus and insurance.
- 20 To see what sum of money shall be raised for free textbooks.
- 21 To see what sum of money shall be raised to pay tuition of scholars attending secondary schools out of town.
- 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fuel for its common schools or act thereon.
- 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for janitors for its common schools or act thereon.
- 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the common schools.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to engage a special teacher for penmanship and drawing for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- 26 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for special teacher in penmanship and drawing.
- 27 To see if the town will vote and authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician according to chapter 73 of the public laws of 1909.
- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to employ a school physician.
- 29 To see how many weeks of school the town will vote to have the ensuing year.
- 30 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars to pay interest on schoolhouse notes.

- 31 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay on notes due August 15, 1921.
- 32 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 120 of the public laws of 1913.
- 33 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the State road, the section as outlined in the report of the State highway commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of sec. 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repairs and maintenance of State-aid highways.
- 35 To see if the town will vote to revise the jury box.
- 36 To see if the town will vote to elect a board of Mothers' aid or vote the selectmen act as such.
- 37 To see if the town will vote to hold the next annual town meeting on Little Cranberry island.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to elect a fire warden in accordance with the requirements of chapter 108 of the public laws of 1913.
- 39 To choose by ballot a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 40 To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of three to find out the cost of placing a memorial tablet in Town hall to the memory of soldiers and sailors from Cranberry Isles in the World war and report at the next annual town meeting.
- 41 To see if the town will vote and authorize the selectmen to make a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes for the year 1921.
- 42 To see if the town will vote to continue clam law as passed in annual town meeting, March 5, 1906.
- 43 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$225 for superintendent of schools' wages.

- 44 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200, to pay for new heater in L. C. I. school building.
- 45 To vote pay of moderator for his services.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at Town hall at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.
