

REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Cranberry Isles:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration my fourth annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of Cranberry Isles.

TEACHERS AND COMMON SCHOOLS.

There have been several changes in the teaching force, Mr. Spurling being the only teacher to remain throughout the year.

Miss Wardwell, at Islesford primary, Miss Tripp and Mrs. Teel at G. C. I. primary and grammar, respectively, are teachers of experience, thoroughly interested in their work, and doing a great deal toward bringing these schools up to a high grade of efficiency.

Mr. Spurling, by his excellent work at Islesford, has clearly demonstrated that he made no mistake in taking up the teaching profession.

Very few instances of tardiness or unnecessary absences have been reported during the year. The pupils seem to realize what they are in school for, and are doing everything possible, with the help of their teachers, toward laying a good foundation to become useful citizens.

Following is the number of pupils in each grade:

Grade 1—3 boys, 2 girls

2—3 boys, 2 girls

3-5 boys, 5 girls

4—5 boys, 5 girls

5—5 boys, 1 girl

6—4 boys, 3 girls

7—1 boy, 3 girls

8-7 boys, 5 girls

Total, 33 boys, 26 girls, or 59 pupils attending the common schools. By the above figures you can see that there are twelve pupils to take the examination next June for high school. I urge not only the parents of these pupils, but all citizens as well, to encourage this class in every way possible to seek a higher education. Remember, Cranberry Isles has a record to be proud of in the number of boys and girls she has sent to high school and college in the past, the excellent showing they have made, and also the excellent work being done by those already attending some high school.

The census of last year shows 69 boys, 52 girls, or a total of 121.

HIGH SCHOOL TUITION.

We now have eight students attending some high school in the State. The law relative to high school tuition has been changed to read as follows:

"Whenever any town shall have been required to pay and has paid tuition for pupils attending secondary schools, the superintendent of schools of such town shall make return under oath to the State superintendent of public schools before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty-two, and annually thereafter, for the preceding school year, stating the name of each pupil for whom tuition has been paid, the amount paid by the town for each, and the name and location of the school which each has attended. Upon the approval of said return, the State superintendent of public schools shall apportion to such town a sum equal to two-thirds the amount thus paid by such town, not to exceed forty dollars for any one pupil or six hundred dollars for any one town.

"Provided, further, that tuition for such pupils may be paid by towns to an amount not exceeding the average cost per pupil for the year preceding that for which the tuition is paid in the school attended by such pupil, but such payment by any town shall not exceed one hundred dollars for any pupil for any one year."

Every town or city to which we are sending high school pupils is charging at least sixty dollars per year per pupil, and in these cases we will be reimbursed by the State forty dollars per pupil. There are some towns or cities charging more than sixty dollars per pupil, and the difference is being paid by the parents or guardians of the tuition pupils.

The town, at its annual meeting, may vote to pay the entire cost of tuition of these pupils not to exceed one hundred dollars per year per pupil.

PENMANSHIP AND DRAWING.

The work done by your children under the supervision of the special teacher has been of such excellent quality as to leave no doubt in my mind of its success.

REPAIRS.

Both schools have been thoroughly cleaned, toilets put in a sanitary condition and many minor repairs made. The heating apparatus at the G. C. I. school has been repaired so that the heat may be more evenly distributed. Also, this building has been painted. A new furnace has been installed at the Islesford school and, owing to the crowded condition in the grammar room, it was found necessary to purchase a few new seats.

NEW LAWS.

An Act to Provide for the Apportionment of the School Fund.

This law, for distributing the school money to the towns, is entirly different from the old law. I will not attempt to insert this law word for word, as it would take too much space, but will try to give you some idea of its substance in a few words.

The school money is now to be distributed on the

basis of "school census," "aggregate attendance" and number of "teaching positions."

The term "school census" shall be understood to mean the number of persons between the ages of five and twenty-one years. On this basis the town will receive three dollars a person, or, from the census of last year, \$363.

The term "aggregate attendance" shall be understood to include the total number of days of attendance for any one school year of each regularly enrolled pupil resident of the town.

Any pupil who does not attend school regularly not only deprives himself of an education, but by every day's absence is taking so much money from the town which would necessarily be paid were the attendance perfect.

On this basis the amount available will be paid to

the town, but this amount is not stated.

On the basis of "teaching positions," the town will receive \$100 for each teaching position. This would not us \$400, as there are four teachers.

To sum up this law, I believe it will not affect your town much either way; in fact, if it does, I believe you will benefit.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Several citizens have asked me to explain the Junior high school and the Class B high school, what it would cost to maintain one in your town, etc.

Class B high school—This class shall include such schools as maintain one approved course of study at least two years of thirty-six weeks, and of standard grade, together with approved equipment, provided the town, precinct or union maintaining such school shall appropriate and expend for instruction therein at least five hundred dollars annually.

A Class B high school is in reality the first two years of a Class A high school. Any town maintain-

ing this kind of high school would not be liable for tuition until a pupil had completed the course at this school. So that the town would not be obliged to pay tuition to any other school until the pupil had entered the junior or third year class. It would be necessary to employ at least one teacher.

I estimate it would cost at least for a teacher and the approved equipment about \$1,200 per year. Under the new law, you would receive from the State \$100 per teacher and about two cents per pupil per day, or a total of about \$140, provided there were twelve pupils. I believe it would be necessary to appropriate about \$1,100.

Junior high school—This class shall include such schools as maintain a diversified program of studies approved by the State superintendent of public schools, for such grades or years as he shall prescribe, throughout a school year of at least thirty-six weeks, provided that the last two years of the elementary schools and not more than two grades or years of the high school may be included in such a school, and provided that the cost of maintenance may be taken from high school funds, or from high school funds and common school funds combined, in proportion to the cost of maintenance of the several grades.

A high school of this kind would make it possible to have an extra grade in the common schools, thus making the boys and girls more proficient by having a more practical education. You could then have the eighth and ninth grades and two years of high school work in this Junior high school, thus dividing the grades at the common schools more evenly.

The cost would be about the same as a Class B high school, although part of the expense could be taken from common school funds.

Anything further in regard to this matter I shall be more than pleased to answer at any time.

The superintending school committee, after careful

study, has made its recommendations for the ensuing year. I believe this committee has taken into consideration the industrial situation, the high tax-rate and has endeavored in every way to make these recommendations as conservative as possible and still keep up the present degree of efficiency in the schools.

In closing, I wish heartily to thank the superintending school committee and citizens for the courteous

treatment accorded me during the year.

REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

To the Citizens of Cranberry Isles:

Having examined the report of the superintendent of schools, we approve the same, and make the follow-

ing recommendations for the ensuing year:

1 We recommend that the G. C. I. grammar and primary schools remain as they are at present. Although we have heard some remarks in favor of uniting these schools, because of economy, we firmly believe the educational efficiency of our children would be impaired a great deal more than would be offset by the financial saving.

- 2 We recommend that the town pay the entire cost of high school tuition.
- 3 We recommend the following appropriations for the ensuing year, believing them to be conservative for the best interests of our children:

 - 7 To choose by ballot one member of superintending school committee for three years.
 - 8 To choose by ballot a caretaker for town hall for the ensuing year, and vote his pay.
 - 9 To see if the caretaker of town hall shall let and have charge of hall in connection with selectmen.
- 10 To choose constables for the ensuing year.
- 11 To choose surveyor of lumber and measurer of wood and bark for the ensuing year.
- 12 To nominate road commissioners for the ensuing year.
- 13 To see what sum of money shall be raised for necessary town charges.
- 14 To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of the poor.
- To see what sum of money shall be raised for highways on the different islands.

- 16 To see what sum of money shall be raised for repairs of school property.
- 17 To see what sum of money shall be raised for appliances, apparatus and insurance.
- 18 To see what sum of money shall be raised for free text-books.
- 19 To see what sum of money shall be raised to pay tuition of scholars attending secondary schools out of town.
- 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fuel for its common schools, or act thereon.
- 21 To see what sum, of money the town will vote to raise for janitors for its common schools, or act thereon.
- 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the common schools.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to engage a special teacher for penmanship and drawing for the ensuing year, or act thereon.
- 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for special teacher in penmianship and drawing.
- 25 To see if the town will vote and authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, according to chapter 73 of the public laws of 1909.
- 26 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to employ a school physician.
- 27 To see how many weeks of school the town will vote to have the ensuing year.
- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of sixty dollars to pay interest on schoolhouse notes.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay on notes due August 15, 1922.
- 30 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter 120 of the public laws of 1913.
- 31 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the State road, the section as outlined in the report of the State highway commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount

being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

- 32 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repairs and maintenance of State-aid highways.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to revise the jury box.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to hold the next annual town meeting on Great Cranberry Island.
- 35 To see if the town will vote to elect a fire warden in accordance with the requirements of chapter 108 of the public laws of 1913.
- 36 To choose by ballot a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 37 To see if the town will vote and authorize the selectmen to make a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes for the year 1922.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to continue clam law as passed in annual town meeting March 5, 1906.
- 39 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$225 for superintendent of schools' wages.
- 40 To see if the town will vote to adopt daylight-saving time if the towns of Bar Harbor, Mt. Desert and Southwest Harbor adopt the same.
- 41 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 42 To vote pay of moderator for his services.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Island, in said town, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters; also the selectmen give notice that the true town meeting warrant posted and used in town meeting will be open for the further transaction of business until February 20th next.
