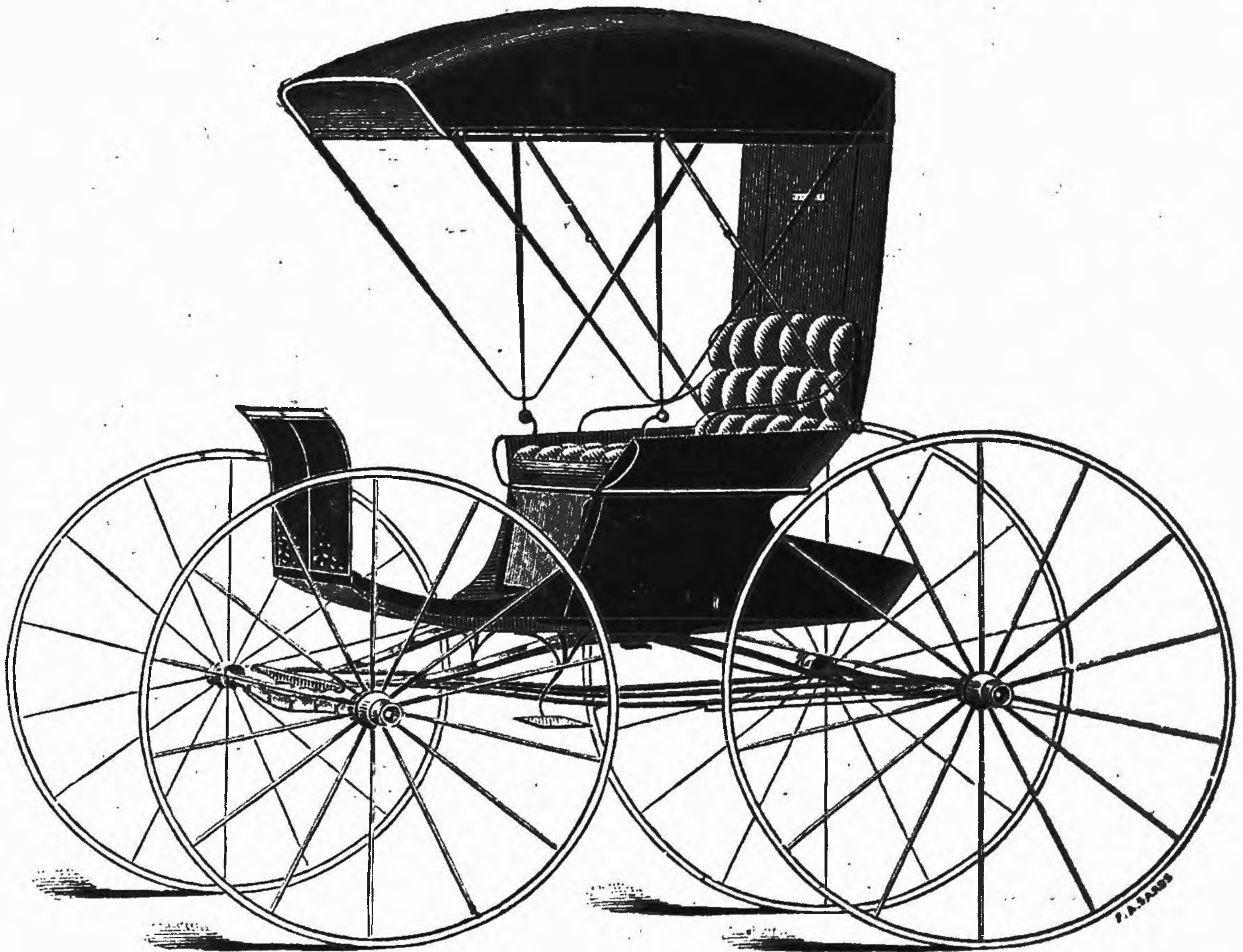

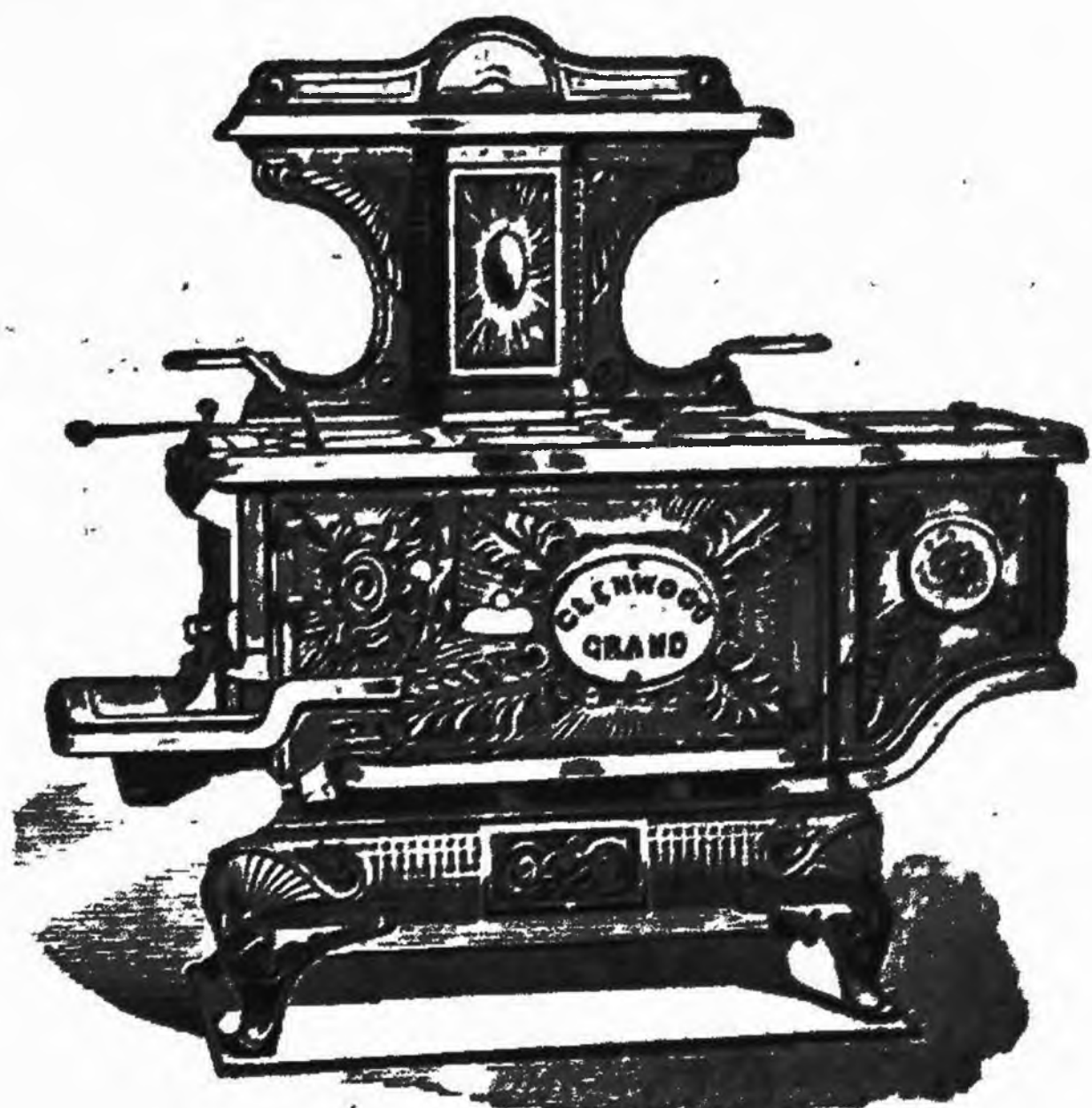

This case, Gentlemen, we found in our hands, the fact being as follows: The Selectmen of last year believed said Emma F. Morey to be in family way, and sent for F. P. Whitaker M. D., as letter we have in our hands will show. He attended her Dec 18, 1892 and found her pregnant and she swore it to be Llewellyn Keizer's, overseer of town farm, begotten on Sunday the 4th of Sept. then last past. We procured a warrant and had Keizer put under bonds and waited for the birth of the child. The child was born on the 3rd day of June, 1893 nine months lacking one day from the time she alleged it to have been begotten, now what could we do but prosecute so plain a case that we found left on our hands.

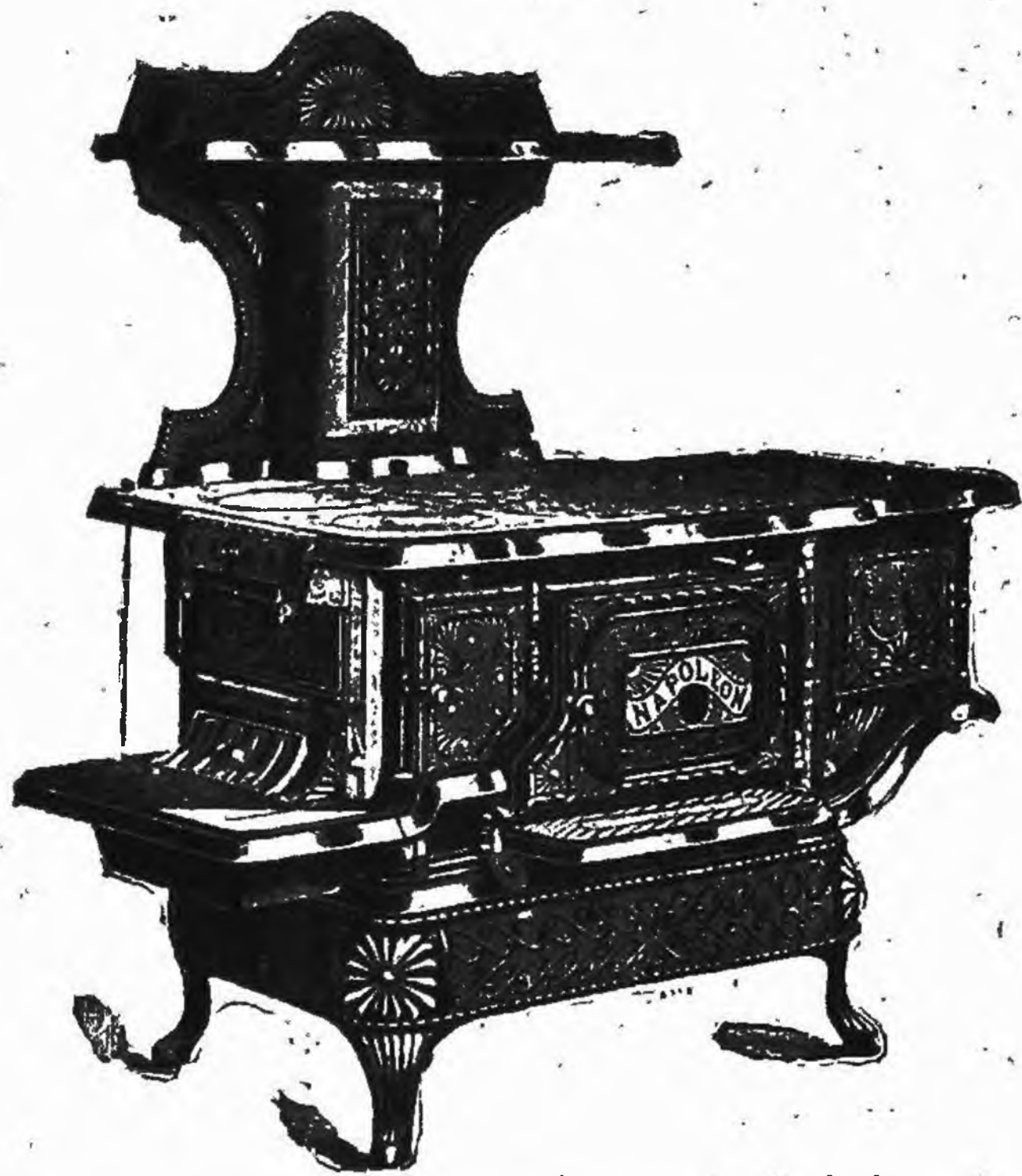

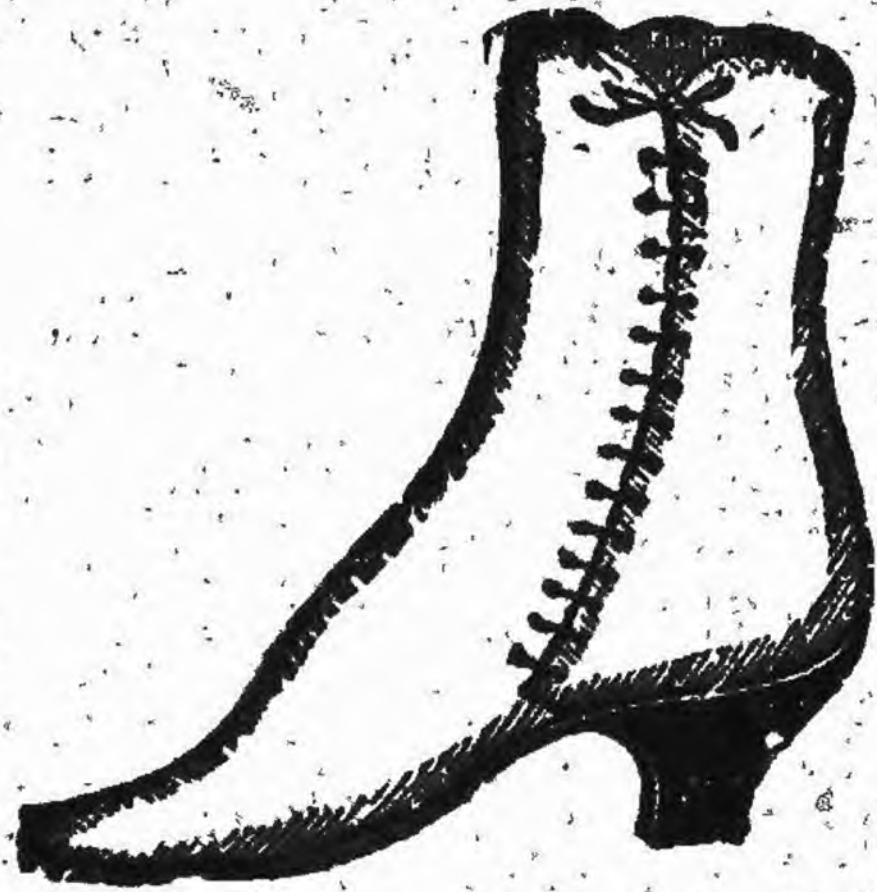

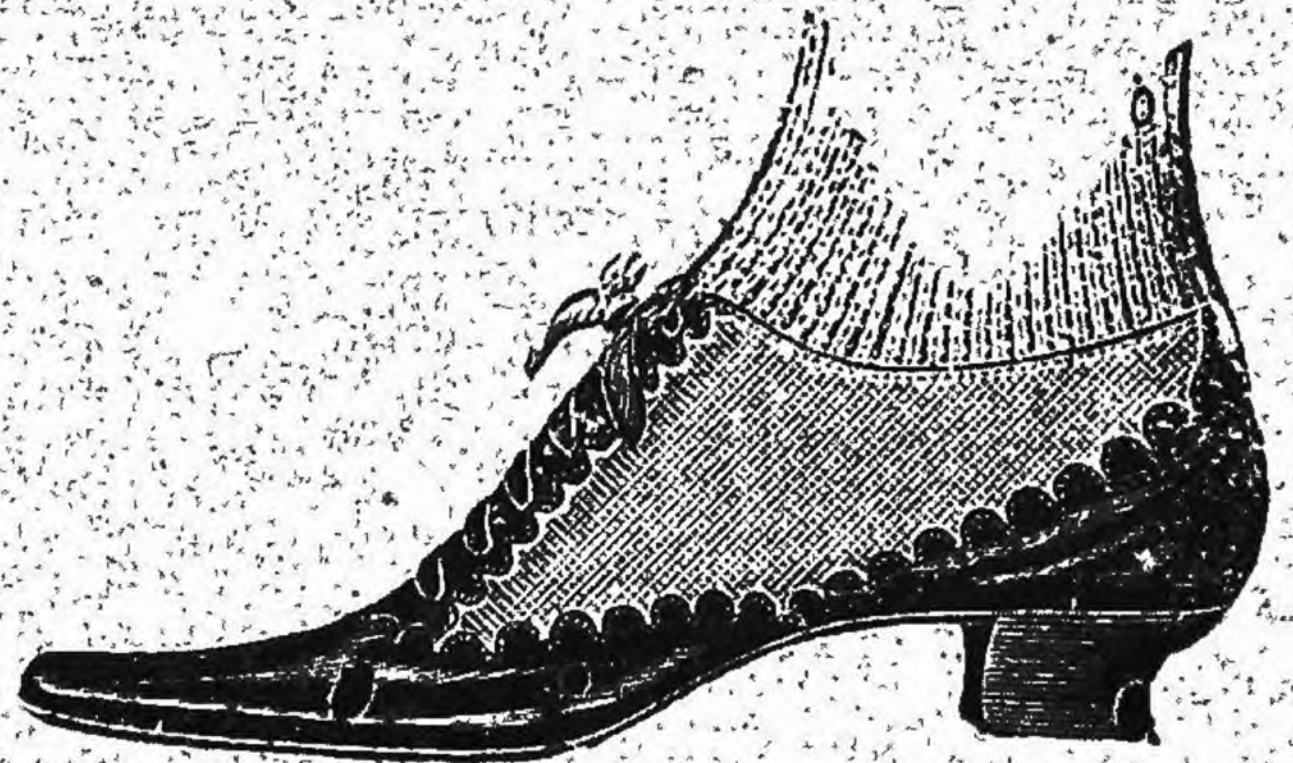
