

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

#### REPORT OF TOWN FARM.

The town farm is being carried on by Harvey Davis and mother. They appear to be very kind to those under their care, especially to Stilman Orff, who is getting to be very dependent.

We leave upon the town farm the same as we found, four years ago, excepting three cows, a yearling heifer and a shoat.  $\forall 10^{\circ}$ 

The meagre supply of household goods, that we found, are of course wearing out.

There may be a small bill due Dr. I. W. Tibbetts.

There may be a bill due the town of Etna on one Diadama Clark. The case was looked up, some ten years ago, by S. G. Jerrard, and he claimed her pauper settlement was on Carmel.

There is due from Charles A. Mitchell, \$120, pauper bill paid Pittsfield, for support of Mitchell's wife in her last sickness.

There is due from A. H. Waugh, by the books he left us \$128.72, previously reported \$153.22. There has been \$24.50 of the amount paid to the town, by C. C. Simpson, treasurer for that year. We report the balance as entirely worthless.

There is due from Wm. and Myron E. Manley, \$182.82 for the support and treatment of the said Myron E., at the Insane Hospital.
