

School Report

TO THE CITIZENS OF PHIPPSBURG:

In accordance with the requirements of the law, I respectfully submit the following report of the condition and progress of the public schools of Phippsburg for the year 1904:

Length of spring term, 12 weeks.

Length of fall term, 12 weeks.

The Center school closed three weeks early and Popham school one week early in the spring term on account of sickness in three districts, which time was made up at end of fall term. Also two weeks at Sebasco to make up time lost in previous year. The work done in the schools has been very satisfactory considering the number of weeks in school year. The attendance has not been all that could be desired, it being 87.5 per cent. during spring term and 85 during fall term. The responsibility of this condition rests with the parents who in some districts seem absolutely indifferent regarding this important matter.

Regular attendance is necessary for the success of the school and the advancement of the pupils and should in districts where parents are negligent in this respect be made compulsory by an appointment of a truant officer in such districts who will promptly attend to this matter and rigidly enforce the law.

The school property has been much improved during the past year, extensive improvements having been made on several buildings which with the exception of Dromore building, which is badly out of repair, and Winnegance, Percy and West Point buildings requiring slight repairs, are in good condition. Unfortunately lightning damaged the Parker Head school building to the extent of about sixty-five dollars and to repair these damages it was necessary to overdraw the appropriation somewhat.

The books of the schools are still in rather poor condition although the total appropriation has been expended to furnish new books. It will be necessary to supply nearly all the schools with arithmetics and grammars next year.

There is great need of maps, charts and globes as the schools are very poorly equipped with these articles so essential to the proper instruction of our children. The law provides for an appropriation for apparatus and supplies, which covers this portion of school equipment and I respectfully recommend that a sum of money be raised for this use.

The expense of maintaining our schools is yearly increasing and salaries of competent teachers are advancing. The increased cost of living has made it necessary to pay more for board. Cost of nearly all material used for repairs has advanced. More educational topics introduced into our schools require a greater number of books and greater cost.

The expenditure of the moneys of the school fund has clearly demonstrated to me the necessity of appropriating more money that we may have more weeks of school, that our schools may be equipped with suitable books and apparatus necessary to keep them up to the standard of schools in other towns of equal size and to properly educate our children. We should have at least 26 or 27 weeks of school each year. I hope every citizen will give this subject careful consideration and act according to his best judgment for the interest of the children and the future advancement of our town. I would especially call your attention to the excellent work done by the "School Improvement League" in improving and beautifying the school buildings and surroundings. Much credit is due them and the interest taken by them has been appreciated and will in the future as in the past be encouraged by every citizen of our town.

Johnson; Small Point, spring term, Iva U. Spiller, fall term, Louise B. Mereen; Popham, spring term, Nellie L. Kelley, fall term, Elizabeth Tobey; Percy, spring term, Louise B. Mereen, fall term, Mattie Clifford.

The school committee acting as building committee have completed a new school building at Small Point a report of which appears on another page of this book.

I wish to thank all citizens and pupils who have so kindly assisted me in carrying on a successful year of school work and to impress upon the parents and citizens the importance of maintaining the highest possible standard of our schools for the education of our children.

Town Warrant

To Leon W. Berry, a constable of the town of Phippsburg, in the county of Sagadahoc—Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Phippsburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on the sixth day of March, A. D. 1905, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE I—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.

ART. 3—To attend and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer and Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 4—To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner.

ART. 5—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and entire care of roads and bridges to Dec. 1, 1905.

ART. 7—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount due for clearing the roads of snow and caring for the highways from Dec. 1, 1904, to March 5, 1905.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the year ensuing.

ART. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and repair of school buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchasing free text books for the year ensuing.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the interest on the outstanding indebtedness for the year ensuing.

ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay outstanding indebtedness for the year ensuing.

ART. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the salary of the officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the abatement of taxes for the year ensuing.

ART. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 17—To see what compensation the town will vote the treasurer for his services for the year ensuing.

Art. 18—To see what compensation the town will vote the collector for his services for the year ensuing.

ART. 19—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for a longer or shorter time to meet the demands against the town falling due the present year.

ART. 20—To see if the town will vote to establish Free High Schools and accept donations for the support of the same.

ART. 21—To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain sidewalks at Popham Beach (the right to do so having been granted by the owners of the land) and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 22—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred eight and 51-100 dollars to reimburse C. F. Hathaway and J. H. Stacey for cost of building seven hundred and fifty feet of sidewalk four feet wide leading from town road near steamboat pier northerly toward the post office at Popham Beach.

ART. 23—To see what action the town will take in regard to the doings of the Selectmen in laying out the road on Cox's Head as instructed by the town at the last annual town meeting and make an appropriation to build the same.

ART. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the supplies of schools.

ART. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the damage done by the water running from the road into T. J. Small's stable and repair the road so as to keep the water from doing any more damage, the appropriation to come out of the appropriation on roads and bridges.

ART. 26—To see if the town will vote to reopen the school in Pitch Pine Hill district No. 1.

ART. 27—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the State road as provided for by Chapter 285, Public Laws of Maine for 1901.

ART. 28—To see if the town will vote to raise fifty-one dollars and fifty-two cents for schools for the years previous to 1904.

ART. 29—To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars for repair of town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 30—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the main road to the so called Parks Mill at Winnegance.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the lists of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon the check list at the town hall at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
