



Whole number of scholars in town, 284; number of male teachers employed the past year, 4; number of female teachers employed the past year, 15; number of terms taught in town during the year, 28.

DISTRICT No. 1.

H. C. WEBBER, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Florence E. Young of Detroit. This was Miss Young's first term; the pupils passed a good examination in the branches taught. This was a profitable term. Length of term, 9 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 77-8; wages, \$2.50; board, \$1.60.

Winter term was taught by Miss Ethelyn M. Brackett of Palmyra. This was a good school. Length of term, 11.1 weeks; number registered, 11; average, 9; wages, \$3.40; board, \$1.60.

DISTRICT No. 2.

J. B. KENNEY, Agent. Summer term was taught by Miss Alice E. Homstead of Palmyra. The examination showed good progress and thorough work. Length of term, 8 weeks; number registered, 7; average, 6.4; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.50.

Length of fall term, 8 weeks; number registered, 7; average, 5; wages, \$2.50; board, \$1.50. Length of winter term. 5 weeks; number registered, 5; average, 4; wages, \$3.25; board, \$1.50. Both terms were taught by Miss May C. Bowman of Detroit. These were successful terms.

DISTRICT No. 4.

PETER H. LANG, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Rosa W. Winslow of St. Albans. Miss Winslow is a teacher of experience, systematic and faithful in her work. This school was a success. Length of term, 10 weeks; number registered, 26; average, 18.7; wages, \$4.50; board, \$1.50.

Fall term taught by Miss Minnie Thompson of Palmyra. This was Miss Thompson's first attempt at teaching, yet she succeeded well. Length of term, 7 weeks; number registered, 11; average, 9; wages \$2.00.

Winter term is now in session under the instruction of Mr. W. H. Patten of Newport. Mr. Patten is laboring hard to make this school a success.

DISTRICT No. 5.

JOEL PARKMAN, Agent. Summer term opened by Miss Nellie S. Folsom of Corinna. On account of some difficulty Miss Folsom closed the school at the end of the fourth week. It was re-opened by Miss Belle Mains of Palmyra and continued five weeks with good results. Total length of term, 9 weeks; number registered, 7; average, 6 4-5; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.05. Winter term taught by Miss Lula C. Hathorn of Detroit. This was a successful school. Length of term, 16 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 7; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.05.

DISTRICT No. 6.

HENRY SHAW, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Grace E. Libbey of Detroit. The examination showed good work on the part of both teacher and scholars. Length of term, 9 weeks; number registered, 12; average, 10; wages, \$4.00; board, \$1.25.

Winter term taught by Mr. B. P. Hanson of Palmyra. Praise or censure. Length of term, 12 weeks; number registered, 15; average, 10.9; wages, \$30.00 per month including board.

DISTRICT No. 7.

ABNER LINNELL, Agent. Length of summer term, 10 weeks; number registered, 44; average, 35; wages, \$5.00; board, \$1.50. Length of fall term, 10 weeks; number registered, 42; average, 33; wages, \$5.00; board, \$1.50. Length of winter term, 10 weeks; number registered, 29: average, 24; wages, \$5.00; board, \$2.00. The three terms were taught by Miss Augusta M. Lord of Detroit with the best of success.

DISTRICT No. 8.

FRANK DYER, Agent. Summer term was taught by Miss Alice B. Collamore of Palmyra. The examination showed good progress and thorough work. Length of term, 10 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 6.6; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.00.

Winter term is now in session under the instruction of the same teacher. It is safe to predict a profitable term.

DISTRICT No. 9.

MICHAEL DYER, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Cora M. Pennell of Palmyra. The examination showed the progress an average with the summer terms, and drill thorough. Length of term, 9 weeks; number registered, 20; average, 17.8; wages, \$4.00; board, \$1.12. Winter term is now in session under the instruction of Miss Bertha B. Felker of Palmyra. Miss Felker is a successful teacher, and I think the school is giving general satisfaction.

DISTRICT No. 11.

JOHN BENNETT, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Lula C. Hathorn of Detroit. This was a quiet, orderly school, and the examination showed that it had been a profitable one. Length of term, 8 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 67-8; wages, \$2.50; board, \$1.25.

Winter term taught by Miss Minnie Thompson of Palmyra. This was a profitable term. Length of term, 13 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 7 1-2; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.25.

DISTRICT No. 13.

GEORGE VARNEY, Agent. Length of summer term, 9 weeks; number registered, 18; average, 15; wages, \$5.00, including board. Length of fall term, 11 weeks; number registered, 17; wages, \$5.00, including board. Both terms were taught by Miss Bertha B. Felker of Palmyra with the best of success.

DISTRICT No. 15.

FRED M. MARSH, Agent. Length of summer term, 9 weeks; number registered, 9; average, 8.8; wages, \$2.25; board, \$1.40. Length of fall term, 12 weeks; number registered, 14; average, 10.7; wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.45. Both terms were taught by Lula G. Millett of Palmyra with good success.

FREE HIGH SCHOOLS.

Free high school in district No. 4 was taught by Mr. W. C. Marden of Swanville. Mr. Marden is a fine scholar, and he came among us well recommended. The examination showed good progress and thorough work on the part of some, others not so good, but this was due to no fault of the teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks; number registered, 43; average, 35; wages for term including board, \$100.

Free high school in district No. 9 was taught by Mr. Newell Tupper of Solon. Mr. Tupper is a teacher of much experience,

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thorough and practical in his work. This was a very successful school. Length of term, 9 weeks; number registered, 34; average, 29; wages for the term including board, \$100.
