



### Town Warrant.

To H. G. Johonnett, a constable in the town of Palmyra, in the County of Somerset, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Palmyra, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town House in said town, on the 2nd day of March at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose Town Clerk and all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the year eusuing.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray town charges for the year ensuing.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of roads and bridges, and determine what manner it may be expended for the year ensuing.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for fuel and repairs for the several school houses in town for the year ensuing.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to continue the road across Hanson flat and how expended for the year ensuing.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to continue the road across Parkman flat, and how expended for the year ensuing.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to repair town farm buildings for the year ensuing.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to erect guide boards in town, and determine what kind.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Memorial services for the year ensuing.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to repair Towle Hill, so called, for the year ensuing,

- ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the damages claimed by Dr. Foss of Dexter, by his horse stepping into a kole in a culvert and throwing said horse or horses.
- ART. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to the unoccupied school houses in town.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the two new school-houses built by the building committee.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the town library for the year ensuing.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to be expended on the Shy road for the year ensuing.
- ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to sell J. A. Goodrich and R. H. Goodrich each a double lot in the burying ground at Mount Pleasant. And also Lincoln Merritt a lot in said burying ground.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to be expended on the Pratt Hill, so called.
- ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to repair the fence around Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to buy text books for the year ensuing.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will unite what was Dist. Nos. 5 and 15, that part of what was Dist. No. 16, extending from the southeast boundary of what was Dist. No. 5 to Newport line.
- ART. 23. To see if the town will unite to what was Dist. No. 3, that part of what was Dist. No. 16, extending from W. H. Miles' to what was Dist. No. 3.

The trustees and librarian of Palmyra town library submit the following report for the year ending Feb. 20, 1896: The whole number of books in the library is 412, classified as follows: agricultural and horticultural, 13; biographical, 8; fiction, 158; historical, 11; juvenile, 13; theological, 20; travel and adventure, 12; miscellaneous, 15; temperance, 4; public documents, 121; Maine reports, 37. Present number of patrons, 55. Number of books taken during the year, 500. Largest number by any one person, 50. There have been added to the library — volumes: number from State, 98; number presented by friends of library, 8.

The interest in the library has been well kept up and the books have been well cared for during the year.
