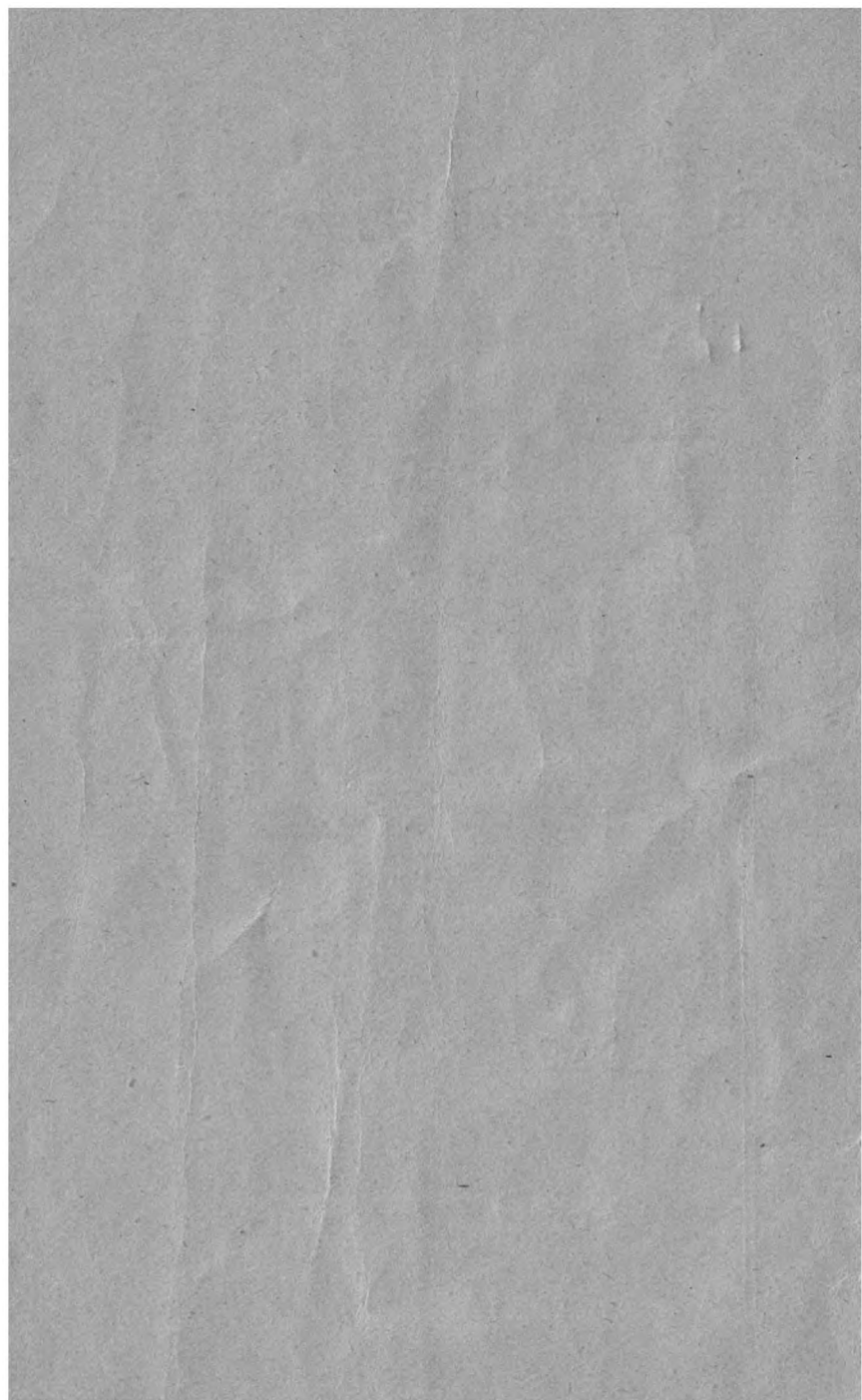

Town Warrant

STATE OF MAINE.

To E. E. Parkman, Constable of The Town of Palmyra, in the County of Somerset, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the 4th. day of March, 1907 at 10 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2—To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.

ART. 3—To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.

ART. 4—To choose three Selectmen.

ART. 5—To choose three Assessors.

ART. 6—To choose three Overseers of Poor.

ART. 7—To choose Town Agent.

ART. 8—To choose a Town Treasurer.

ART. 9—To choose a collector of taxes and Constable.

ART. 10—To choose one or more Road Commissioners.

ART. 11—To choose one Member of School Board.

ART. 12—To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 13—To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

ART. 14—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of schools.

ART. 15—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for school appliances.

ART. 16—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair school houses.

ART. 17—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for text books.

ART. 18—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay tuitions of such scholars as are qualified to attend high schools in other towns.

ART. 19—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.

ART. 20—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a stone tablet to mark the grave of Daniel Gale the first settler of Palmyra.

ART. 21—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to celebrate the town centennial.

ART. 22—To see what action the town will take concerning the writing and publishing of a history of the town.

ART. 23—To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair roads and bridges.

ART. 24—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for State road.

ART. 25—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay outstanding bridge orders.

ART. 26—To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to hire a sum of money not to exceed two-thousand dollars to take up and pay outstanding bridge orders.

ART. 27—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid before a certain date.

ART. 28—To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay discounts on taxes.

ART. 29—To see if the town will vote to purchase a Rock Crusher or to appoint a committee to investigate the

working of the same and raise a sum of money to defray any expense of such committee.

ART. 30—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended by the sextons of the cemeteries in town to help clean up the yards and reset Head stones.

ART. 31—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Municipal Officers.

ART. 32—To see if the town will vote to have the valuation of its real estate revised and if so by what method.

ART. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for repairs on town farm barn.

ART. 34—To see what action the town will take regarding paying for the horse of Walter Small which he lost on the highway.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on the day of said meeting at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters. Hereof fail not to make due returns, with this warrant with your doings thereon on or before the day of said meeting.
