



Town Warrant

Somerset ss.

State of Maine

To W. A. Blaisdell, constable of the town of Palmyra in the county of Somerset,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house on Monday, the 6th day of March A. D. 1922, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3 To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors, three overseers of the poor.
 - Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable or to ascertain in what manner the tax shall be collected.
 - Art. 7. To choose one or more road commissioners.
 - Art. 8. To choose one member of the school board.
 - Art. 9. To choose a fire ward.
- Art. 10. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay the salary of the superintendent of schools.
- Art. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

- Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for school supplies.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for text books.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay tuition out of town or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote yes or no in the adoption of the state road law necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for the year 1922.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build state road.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Road maintenance.
- Art. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be expended on the roads in summer.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads in winter.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to pay a discount on taxes or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for the same.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for gravel for the third class highway.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$60 to place with \$40 already raised by the schools to establish a school improvement fund for placing a sheet iron jacket on each schoolhouse stove.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build a toilet in connection with the town hall.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will instruct the school board to pay for transportation contracted for in 1921 and furnish transportation from the Goodwin district to the Adams school or act anything in relation thereto.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars from Mrs. Margaret Porter, the income from which to be used for the perpetual care of the burial lot in the villiage cemetery in which are buried her father and mother, the late Mr, and Mrs. Geo. F. Bachelder.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to rebuild the bridge in the Hanson Swamp so called or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to rebuild the road from J. M. Parkman's to Corinna town line and also to the St. Albans town line.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the road on the hill above W. H. Wyman's.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum of money to resurface with gravel the rock filled road below the Grange Hall on the Newport road.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to shingle and paint the town house.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to paint the steel bridge across the river.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise money to take up bridge order of 1921 voted by town at special town meeting.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the selectmen.
- Art. 39. To act on any other matters not relating to the raising of money that may be lawfully brought before any town meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the town house on the day of said meeting at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day of said meeting.

To the Superintending School Committee:

I beg to make the following report of the sanitary conditions of your school property and the physical examination of your pupils:

I found, at the beginning of the school year, the schoolhouses and out buildings clean and in average condition for school purposes.

Few of the houses have been fitted with shades and screens making them much more comfortable and sanitary. Most of the rooms are furnished with modern seats and a few display pictures and other decorations making a very pleasant appearance.

No serious accident, and with the exception of a few skin diseases, no contagious diseases have been noted.

This year a system of ranking has been adopted so that a much more comprehensive idea of the degree of health conditions is shown. Each pupil submits to an examination of ten important physical conditions and is ranked in each. An average of these gives the physical rank, 100% being perfect. While many pupils were only a fraction below, only one in the town obtained a perfect physical rank.

The following is a summary of the physical examination: Whole No. registered Boys 75 Girls 55 Total 130 Whole No. examined 66 51 117

Number below 100% in the following physical conditions: Vision, 12; hearing, 2; teeth, 97; throat, 30; tonsils, 27; adenoids, 24; weight, 81; pulse, 16.

Conditions 75% or less require professional advice. Forty-four were below that rank and were reported to the parents.

Report of Superintendent of Schools for Year Ending February 28, 1922

Members of the Palmyra School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of Palmyra I make my annual report for the present year.

The school enrollment this fall is 25 per cent greater than a year ago, mainly caused by so many families moving from the large towns to the farms. The schools opened with the following enrollments: Gale 33, Marsh 17, Adams 16, Village 24, Carr 13, Ell 26; a total of 129 pupils as compared with 104 in September, 1920.

The following teachers were placed in the schools this fall: Mrs. Fausta Howes at the Gale, Mrs. Nellie Jordan at the Marsh, Mrs. Grace Cook at the Adams, Mrs. Cora Tolman at the Village, Mrs. Gertrude Smith at the Carr and Mrs. Thena Lenfest at the Ell, The first four teachers named will continue in the schools for the year. At the end of the fall term Mrs. Smith closed a period of four years of faithful and efficient service at the Carr school. After considerable delay her place was taken by Miss Orris Hutchinson of Houlton. After searching for two months we secured Mr. John Holland of Steuben for the Ell school. We have paid Mrs. Smith \$17 per week and all the other teachers have received \$19.

The progress of the children in their studies has been satisfactory altho teachers and superintendent are constantly trying to improve it. The 34-week school year has helped greatly in our attempt to teach the work thoroughly. The Standard Tests given last June indicate a gradual improvement in results obtained in our schools, varying with the ability of the teachers. This fall we laid special emphasis on Composition Work. We shall continue this thru the year and stress Arithmetic during the Spring.

The 1921 Legislature passed several laws relating to the schools. The most important deals with the distribution of the State School Funds. The old law worked an injustice on the smaller places which is now corrected. Palmyra will receive from the State several hundred dollars per year more than at present. Another law makes us liable for tuition of High School pupils up to \$60 per year, an increase of \$15 per year. A third law requires that by September, 1924, all schoolhouses must have a connected toilet kept in wholesome, sanitary condition.

The teacher situation is very encouraging and it is up to the citizens of Maine to say whether or not this condition shall continue. The Normal Schools are once more filling with the pick of our High School graduates; former teachers are beginning to return to the work. The present teaching corps throughout the state is trying hard to improve itself thru attendance at Summer School, at teachers' meetings, by home study, etc.

If we begin lowering wages we start upon the backward way to the old conditions of poor teachers, poor interest in the work, and the child gets the short end of it. If we maintain the present rate of pay, the teacher supply will gradually improve in quality and quantity. The only sound policy, the only economical policy is, "Maintain the Standard".

In view of the wide-spread financial depression among farming communities, we shall ask for as little money in the regular appropriations as is consistent with our present standard of service. You will be asked to establish a School Improvement Fund to place some definite improvement in each school. We hope this year that a sheet iron jacket may be placed on all the school stoves. The Gale is already so equipped; as a result the room is heated much more evenly and a supply of pure warm air is available for each child. We estimate the cost at \$20 for each of the five schools or \$100. The schools have already raised \$40 of this by an entertailment and the town will be asked to contribute the rest.

The total per capita cost of schooling the 140 pupils in common school this year has been \$41.00. The school dollar was divided as follows: Teachers 52 cents, fuel 1, janitors 1, conveyance 14, grade school tuition 6, books 3, repairs 1, supplies 2, high school tuition 14, supervision 6.

In closing my fifth report I wish to express to the school committee and to the citizens of Palmyra my appreciation of their spirit of courtesy and cooperation.
