

SOMERSET SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To W. A. Blaisdell, Constable of the Town of Palmyra, in the County of Somerset, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House on Monday, the 5th day of March A. D. 1923, at ten o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a Molerator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3 To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4 To choose three Selectmen, three Assessors, three Overseers of the poor.
- Art. 5 To choose a town Treasurer.
- Art. 6 To choose a Tax Collector and Constable, or to ascertain in what manner the tax should be collected.
- Art. 7 To choose one or more Road Commissioners.
- Art. 8 To choose one member of the School Board.
- Art. 9 To choose a Fire Ward.
- Art. 10 To choose all other necessary town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 11 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 12 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.
- Art. 13 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- Art. 14 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for School Supplies.
- Art. 15 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for text books.

- Art. 16 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay tuition out of town.
- Art. 17 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Schoolhouses.
- Art. 18 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.
- Art. 19 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the a loption of the State R ad law necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for the year ensuing.
- Art. 20 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Road Maintenance.
- Art. 21 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build State Road.
- Art. 22 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public laws of 1917 for construction of a State highway extending from north town line of Cambridge in a general Southerly direction down what is known as Ham hill and across Goose flat, to the town line between Cambridge and Ripley; thence across the town of Ripley via Todds Corner, so called; thence across the town of St. Albans via St. Albans village; thence diagonally across the town of Hartland via Hartland village thence across the town of Palmyra Southerly to Pittsfield town line.
- Art. 23 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges in summer.
- Art. 24 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads in winter.
- Art. 25 To see if the town will vote to hire a school Physician and raise money for same.
- Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to take up outstanding orders on interest or act anything thereto.
- Art. 27 To see if the town will vote to pay the balance claimed to be due W. A. Smith for log dragging, not allowed by the road Commissioner.

- Art. 28 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to be expended in the Parkman Swamp so called.
- Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the Spaulding road so called.
- Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from C. R. McCrillis place to the Nigger bridge known as the Baker road.
- Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Lindell Gray road from the buildings to the Stewart Hill Road.
- Art. 32 To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to hire money for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 33 To act on any other matter not relating to the raising of money, that may legally be brought before any town meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on the day of said meeting at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day of said meeting.

School Department

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, FOR YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 28, 1923

Members of the Palmyra School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of Palmyra I make my sixth annual report.

The school census, or list of persons in town between the ages of 5 and 21, as taken last April, showed an increase from 214 to 253. This was reflected in the school enrolment in September. The schools opened with the following attendance: Gale, 39; Marsh, 16; Adams, 22; Village, 32; Carr, 14; Ell, 26; a total of 149 or 20 more than a year ago. The attendance has been very regular during most of the year. Nearly all of the absences have been caused by sickness or severe weather; very few children stay out of school because of lack of interest on the part of parents.

The following teachers were placed in the schools this fall and will probably continue thru the spring term: Gale. Mrs. Fausta Howes: Marsh, Mrs. Nellie Jordan; Adams, Mrs. Grace Cook: Village, Mrs. Katherine Cronkite; Carr, Mrs. Gertrude Smith; Ell, Mr. John Holland. Mrs. Smith receives \$17 per week, the other teachers receive \$19. Since Mr. Holland has moved his family here, we may consider that all our schools are taught by local teachers. I can speak very highly of the service they are rendering. None of us have been able to satisfy all but we have striven constantly to make the schools better. \$19 per week has placed in the Palmyra and St. Albans schools an excellent group of 'home' teachers. When it has been necessary to go out of town to get teachers at this salary, a very marked drop in quality has been noted. I sincerely hope that it will be possible to retain in Palmyra schools a corps of local teachers at the present wage.

For some time it has been our custom to place particular emphasis on one subject thru the year, while trying to teach the other studies as well as before. This year we are giving special attention to the field of English. We have all studied what to teach and how to teach in oral and written composition and Grammar. As a a result the boys and girls are making excellent progress in ability to stand up and speak upon a topic briefly and well and to write an interesting letter or an article without glaring mistakes in spelling, punctuation or correct speech. More Grammar has been taught in these two terms than in any previous period twice as long. The pupils in the lower grades are making better progress than ever in that most important of all subjects, Reading. The 34-week school year has added greatly to the thoroness of our common schools, which is the only schooling that many of the children get.

The School Improvement Fund has placed a sheet-iron jacket on all the school stoves but that at the Village. This has meant a more even distribution of better air over the schoolroom. It has helped especially in the larger schools where it would have been necessary to sit very close to the stove. The School Board feel it unwise to continue this fund during the coming year.

The only large repair items this year have been the connecting of the outhouse to the maine schoolhouse at the Gale and Village Schools, to comply with the new state regulation which takes effect in 1924. We have done this in the least expensive manner and trust that it will be accepted by the State.

For some time I have been particularly interested in the problems of the Rural school. I have come to the conclusion that the superiority of the famed city schools is due almost entirely to three things; a good teacher, remaining in the same school for a number of years, under good supervision. I confidentially look for a much greater efficiency in the country school because these same factors can be brought to operate. Many rural towns cannot afford, many more think they cannot afford the teaching and supervision.

Many excellent people believe that a teacher's stay in one school should be limited to one term, or at most to a year. The last ten years have seen much progress along these lines, however. Most country people desire no Federal aid or control of schools. They wish no further extention of State powers. If we are not going to accept the assistance of these agencies, it is squarely up to us to provide a reasonably efficient school thru our own local resources even at considerable sacrifice. I feel that Palmyra has done well by its schools.

The total per capita cost of schooling the 150 pupils in common school this year has been \$43.00. The school dollar was divided as follows: Teachers, 47 cents; fuel, 2; janitors, 1; conveyance, 10; grade school tuition, 4; repairs, 6; supplies 2; books 2; High School tuition 21; supervision 5.

The school committee recommends the following budget for the coming year: Common schools, \$3,000, which maintains the same pay for teachers for the same number of weeks of school; Repairs, \$100; Books, \$175; Supplies, \$50. This is \$1,385 less than the total of these accounts appropriated a year ago. It is evidence of our sincere desire to assist in lowering the tax rate during a hard year.

I wish to express, thru the medium of this report, my appreciation of the spirit of courtesy and cooperation shown toward my efforts by the school committee and citizens generally.
