Town Warrant

SOMERSET, S. S. State of Maine
To C. E. Cole, constable of the town of Palmyra in the
county of Somerset, GREETINGS:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town House on Monday, the second day of March A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.

Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors and three overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer and act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable, or to ascertain in what manner taxes shall be collected.

Art. 7. To choose one or more road commissioners.

Art. 8. To choose one or more members of the school board.

Art. 9. To choose a fire ward.

Art. 10. To choose one member of the cemetery board.

Art. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for salary of the superintendent of schools.

Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for tuition out of town.

Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for repairs of schoolhouses.

Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.

Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for a music supervisor in the schools.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the adoption of the State road law necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for the year ensuing.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under the Three Town Act, to build on road beginning at the Corinna town line near Brawn's corner, and extending in a westerly direction to St. Albans village, hence south over Mill Hill to the corner near Alexander Foster's residence in Palmyra village, thence east over Route No. 2 to the corner near the Church, thence north to Sanborn's corner, thence

cast to Marsh's corner, thence south to Newport, over Stewart hill, continuing along Route 104, thence Route No. 2 to Hasty corner, so-called, thence westerly direction to the Plymouth town line.

Art. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build State Aid road.

Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for snow fence.

Art. 23. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State road maintenance.

Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for summer roads.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to winter roads and raise money for the same.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for the same.

Art. 27. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to take up outstanding orders on interest.

Art. 28. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for a public health nurse.

Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair Third Class road.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to buy two or more light snow plows and raise money for the same.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise (\$200) two hundred dollars to be expended on road from four corners north of Gale schoolhouse to McCrillis' corner.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise

(\$200) two hundred dollars to gravel a part of the Square road beginning at the Federal road.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of controlling the White Pine Blister Rust Disease now found firmly established within the pine areas of said town.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise (\$200) two hundred dollars to be expended on the Smith road, so-called.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to hire money for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Mrs. C. O. Burns to the amount of \$90.25 for over-valuation of \$950.00 on seven pieces of land assessed to C. O. Burns' heirs by the assessors in the years 1928 and 1929, by reason of which over-valuation she paid in 1928, \$42.75; and in 1929, \$47.50; or take any action in relation thereto.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school committee to open the Egypt school.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to sell the Goodwin schoolhouse.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to sell the South Union schoolhouse.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine and raise money for same.

Art. 41. To see what action the town will take in regard to changing the location of the Village Schoolhouse and provide a safe playground and raise money for the same.

Art. 42. To act on any other matters not relative to the raising of money that may lawfully be brought before any town meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due returns of said warrant with our doings thereon, on or before the day of said meeting.

Members of the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the town of Palmyra, following is a report of your schools for the municipal year 1930-31:

The school census taken last April showed 263 from age 5 to 21 years, 131 girls and 132 boys. Of this number 142 were registered, at the beginning of the school year, Sept. 1st, 1930, in the schools of the town. There are six pupils attending Hartland, seven Newport, and two Pittsfield Elementary schools, making a total of 157 elementary pupils. The sec-

ondary students are distributed as follows: Hartland Academy 10, Newport High 8, and Maine Central Institute 19, a total of 37. This would make a total of 194 elementary and secondary pupils.

The same six schools, as last year, have been maintained 34 weeks. Teachers have received wages as follows: Village Grammar \$20, Ell \$20, Gale \$20, Village Primary \$18, Adams \$18, and Carr \$15 per week. Teachers' meetings have been held the same as last year. Miss Florence Piper Tuttle, reading specialist, was with us two days last spring. Besides giving demonstrations with classes in several schools, on Saturday Miss Tuttle worked a full day with the teachers. Her work and demonstrations were very interesting and helpful to the teachers and pupils. We are still bringing into use the Supervised Study Plan of work, and find it is a decided improvement over the old system. Pupils are receiving more individual help, being taught how to study, and how to make their work applicable to their surroundings.

Music

The pupils have made very satisfactory progress in their school music during the past year. Many are now working in Hollis Dam Book V, a book of two part music. Next year book VI will be used, which will complete books necessary for elementary grades.

Conveyance

Three conveyance teams have been maintained for the year. Mr. L. J. Pray to Newport \$6; Howard Towle, Egypt to Village, \$15 fall, \$16 winter; Frank Bradford, Madawaska to Village, \$9 per week. Merton Nason receives \$5 per week for winter term transporting to Adams. Due to a family moving in above the Marsh school a transportation was made neces-

sary, and Rex Gould is paid \$10 per week for transporting to Village.

Janitor work has been done by the teachers or pupils in the schools. \$1 per week is paid at the Village; \$0.50 fall and spring; and \$0.75 winter to all outside schools.

Tuition

All High School tuition has been paid for the first half of the present year, except M. C. Institute, which has been paid up to the winter term. Common school tuition has been paid as follows: Hartland, first half of this year; Newport, to first of year; Pittsfield for the fall term.

Books

New Arithmetics have been bought for all schools, Geographies for part of the grades. I recommend that English books be changed next year. Also that basal readers be bought for the primary grades.

Fuel

Wood has been bought for \$7 per cord delivered to schoolhouse, and \$8.50 sawed and put in shed. The wood bill is considerably larger, due to the fact that over half of the wood for 1931-32 has been paid for.

135 out of 142 pupils registered, were examined by Dr. Moulton. Dr. Moulton's report will show to you the physical condition of your children, as well as conditions of school grounds and buildings. This report of our children is very important. Any defects found and reported to parents should receive careful attention. Every boy and girl must be physically strong in order to do the best work in their school and enjoy themselves in their play.

Repairs

New steps have been built at the Ell at a cost of

§26. Also at the Adams at a cost of \$12. A new heater has been installed in the Village schoolhouse at a cost of \$164.50. The State pays \$100 toward the cost. I recommend, that the Village shed be moved by the end of the schoolhouse and connected, so that toilets will be directly accessible from main room. I also recommend that inside of Ell and Gale schoolhouses be painted.

It has been a pleasure to me to work with S. S. Committee, parents, teachers, and pupils during the past year and I thank all for the splendid cooperation that has been given me.

The Carr school was visited twice a week during the fall term to give all the help possible to the very capable young teacher who was placed in this school. In all of our schools the music is taught in two classes, and in the Village, three were found necessary.

The youngest (many of whom were singing off pitch at the opening of the year) are now beginning sight reading from books and are making fine progress. The teachers at Gale and Village (both new in our district) have done good work in music.

A cantata is under preparation and will be given in public soon. The schools are now very well equipped with music books. There will be practically no expense for books another year. Much musical ability is appearing among our boys and girls.
