

# Town Warrant

SOMERSET, S. S.

STATE OF MAINE

To H. H. Coston, a constable of the town of Palmyra in the county of Somerset, GREETINGS:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town House on Monday the sixth day of March A. D. 1933 at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors and three overseers of the poor.
- Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer for the year ensuing.
- Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable or to ascertain in what manner the taxes shall be collected and act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To choose one or more road commissioners or act on anything thereto.
- Art. 8. To choose one or more members of the school board.
  - Art. 9. To choose a fire ward.

- Art. 10. To choose one or more members of the cemetery committee.
- Art. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on June 1st or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for salary of the superintendent of schools.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for high school tuition out of town, or act on anything thereto.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of public library.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for a music supervisor in the schools, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the adoption of the State road law necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for the year ensuing.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise under the Three Town Act to build on the road beginning at the Corinna town line near Brawn's Corner and extending in a westerly direction

- to St. Albans Village, hence south over Mill Hill to the corner near Alex Foster's residence in Palmyra Village, thence east over Route No. 2 to the corner near the Church, thence north to Sanborn's Corner, thence east to Marsh's Corner, thence south to Newport over Stuart Hill, continuing along Route 104, thence over Route 2 to Hasty Corner so-called, thence westerly to the Plymouth town line.
- Art. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build State Aid road.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to buy snow fence.
- Art. 23. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State road maintenance.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.
- Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to breaking roads in winter and raise money for same.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for same.
- Art. 27. To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to take up outstanding orders on interest.
- Art. 28. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for a public health nurse.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair Third Class road.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the "Ringwood Road" so-called, extending from the Hartland and Pittsfield

road past the residence of James Connors towards Douglas Pond, the money to be used to ditch, grade and gravel the road, or act on anything relating thereto.

- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to gravel the "Square Road", so-called, beginning at the Federal road, and extending to the home of P. J. Whitten, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 32. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans for the town, to be paid during the current year out of the money raised during the current year by taxes, and the selectmen to issue notes for and in the name of the town for the loans made.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the hereinafter named roads: the road leading over Warren Hill, so-called; the road leading from Charles Cole's toward St. Albans, to St. Albans' town line; the Hubbard road, so-called, beginning at the Hubbard place, extending to the Smith road; the road beginning at the old Gray place, so-called, extending to the road leading by L. J. Pray's; the road leading from Guy Hill corner, so-called, to the rail-

road at Thompson's Crossing, across Nigger Bridge, so-called, or act on anything relating thereto.

- Art. 36. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair the "Nigger Bridge", so-called, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid highway construction, in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the schoolboard to contract with any school or schools for high school tuition out of town, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 39. To act on any other matters not relative to the raising of money that may lawfully be brought before any town meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters. Hereof fail not to make due return of said warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day of said meeting.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Palmyra:

I herewith submit my report of the condition and progress of your schools.

My service covers the period from July 1 to date. This time has been spent largely in becoming acquainted with the school situation. I found the schools for the most part well up to grade, and both teachers and pupils doing good work. This speaks well for the previous administration of the schools.

The following table shows the schools maintained during the current school year, names of teachers, wages per week, and enrollments.

Of the above teachers all taught in town last year except Miss Sperry and Mrs. Bridge. All of the teachers are receiving lower wages than last year but the wages have been higher than would otherwise have been possible because of a grant from the State Equalization Fund for the purpose of maintaining higher wage scales. It will be noted that Miss Sperry has done the work of two teachers at the Village at a saving of \$18 per week over last year.

#### Conveyance

Owing to the necessity of carrying more pupils and longer distances there has not been as much saving in conveyance as was planned. L. J. Pray had \$8 during the fall term and because of two additional children and increased distance has had \$9 per week during the winter. Sandy Foster has been paid \$10 per week for conveyance from the Pittsfield line to the Village. Audrey Lanpher had \$5 per week during the early fall and \$7.50 thereafter, owing to increased distance. Pupils on the upper Pittsfield road attending Hartland are carried in the Hartland bus at the low cost of \$3 per week. Mrs. Edwin Ireland was allowed \$3 per week for the conveyance of her children to the Gale school, and R. E. Cook was allowed \$1.50 for conveyance to the same school.

### Repairs

The principal items of repair work were the painting of the Egypt schoolhouse and the painting and papering of the large room at the Village, which was in an extremely tattered and dingy condition. This building should be shingled next summer. Caution signs were purchased for this school, and also for the Adams.

### School Physician

The work of Dr. Moulton, School Physician, is to be highly commended. The routine examinations are of great culmulative value over a period of years. His action in one school where there was an outbreak of a contagious skin disease this fall, saved far more than the whole salary paid for the year. In times like these I do not believe a town can afford to be without a School Physician.

### High School Tuition

The high school tuition bill has been the highest ever, owing to the presence of large numbers of pupils in secondary schools. During the fall there were 29 enrolled at M. C. I., 12 at Hartland Academy and 6 at Newport High. Tuition at M. C. I. is \$100 per pupil and at Hartland and Newport is \$75. We have been assured that tuition costs at Hartland and Newport will be less next year. It is indicated that there will be no change at M. C. I. Probable cost to the town for next year at present rates would be \$3600.

### The Coming Year

The school accounts were closed at the end of 32 weeks in order to avoid any danger of an overdraft. To maintain the usual 34 weeks on the present cost basis would require an appropriation of \$4,300. The Committee and Superintendent are agreed that costs must be lower next year but are also faced by the fact that the State School Fund will be 20 per cent less. Careful study of the situation indicates that it will be necessary to raise \$4,000 in order to maintain 34 weeks of school. The cost of current running expenses of the schools per week is \$140.50 at the present time. This does not include fuel, textbooks, supplies and common school tuition, which are virtually fixed charges and amount to \$1,200.

It has always been considered that the first duty of a community is to its children. They are in no wise responsible for the difficulties in which we find ourselves at this time. Let us not become panic stricken. Let us be willing to make every sacrifice in order that the children may not unduly suffer in their educational privileges.

### Conclusion

In closing this report I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the school committee, parents, teachers and pupils and to Mr. Perry F. Shibles for their helpful cooperation.
