STATE OF MAINE

To H. A. Fletcher, a constable of the town of Palmyra in the County of Somerset, GREETINGS:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the fourth day of March A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officials as the town may think proper.

Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors, and three overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable or to ascertain in what manner the taxes shall be collected and act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To choose one or more road commissioners or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 8. To choose one or more members of the school board.

Art. 9. To choose a fire warden.

Art. 10. To choose one or more members of the cemetery committee.

Art. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before June 1, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for salary of the superintendent of schools.

Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for high schools tuition out of town or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the public library.

Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for a music supervisor in the schools or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the adoption of the state road law necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for the year ensuing.

Art. 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise under the three town act to build on the road beginning at the Corinna town line near Brawn's Corner and extending in a westerly

direction to St. Albans village south over Mill Hill to the corner near Alex Foster's residence in Palmyra Village, thence east over Route No. 2 to the corner near the church, thence north to Sanborn's Corner, thence east to March's Corner, thence south to Newport over Stuart Hill, continuing along Route 104, thence over Route No. 2 to Hasty's Corner, so called, thence westerly to Plymouth town line.

Art. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to build State Aid road.

Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to buy snow fence.

Art. 23. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State road maintenance.

Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regards to breaking roads in winter and raise money for same.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for same.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to unite with other towns as authorized in Chapter 1, Section 91, Public Laws of 1933, for the purpose of securing a full time trained health service, and to raise a sum of money necessary for such union purposes or other public health work.

Art. 28. To see how much money if any the town will vote to raise to take up outstanding orders and interest.

Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair Third Class roads.

Art. 30. To see what sum if any, the town will recommend from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans for the town to be paid during the current year out of money raised during the current year by taxes and the selectmen to issue notes for, and in the name of the town for the loans made.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to recind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 33. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for school repairs.

Art. 34. To see what action the town will take in relation to collection of the balance of outstanding 1932-1933-1934 taxes.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to accept a sum of money of fifty dollars or more for the perpetual care of the George Mills lot in the village cemetery.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to accept seventy-five dollars for the perpetual care of the Taylor and Ladd lot in the village cemetery.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to buy road machine or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a Public Health Nurse.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to abate Arthur Magnus' tax for the year 1934.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to expend on the Chamberlain Swamp, so called.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jury-men as read by the town clerk.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to take up mortgage on Will Wyman property which is now foreclosed.

Art. 43. To see where the town would vote to expend the State Aid money.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Palmyra:

I herewith submit my annual report of the condition and progress of your schools.

There have been two changes in teachers during the current year. At the close of the spring term Miss Lena Sperry and Mrs. Doris Bridge accepted better positions elsewhere. Mrs. Dorothy Cookson was transferred to the Village school. Miss Thelma Thorne was engaged for the Gale school and Miss Eleanor Currie for the Carr school. Miss Thorne is a graduate of Farmington with one year's experience in teaching and Miss Currie is also a Farmington graduate but without experience. Miss Clara Turner continued at the Adams school, Mrs. Audrey Lanpher at the Egypt school and Mrs. Edna Estes at the Ell school.

The enrollment in the Ell and Village schools has been over forty. This is too large to be satisfactorily handled by any one teacher who has nine grades to care for, no matter how capable or efficient the teachers may be. It is to be hoped that if the enrollment continues to remain as high that steps may be taken to relieve this congestion.

During January our schools were visited by Miss Zeta I. Brown, Field Agent for Rural Education of the State Department of Education. The work of all the teachers was observed and complimented highly by Miss Brown. This was highly gratifying as an intensive effort has been made by both teachers and superintendent to improve the quality of instruction.

CONVEYANCE

The usual conveyance routes have been maintained this year all of which were put up to bid. During the winter conveyance has been provided to the Ell school for the children living near the Pittsfield line. If the same families continue to live in that neighborhood the South Union schoolhouse should be put into condition and that school opened. This would relieve the congestion at the Ell and would lessen considerably the distance which these children must walk daily.

HIGH SCHOOL

The largest class in recent years was graduated from the eighth grade last spring. All of these except two entered some secondary school this fall. Twenty-five pupils have been enrolled at Maine Central Institute, sixteen at Hartland Academy, eight at Newport High and one at Cony High in Augusta. Several of these are doing honor work. There have been several withdrawals and the eighth grade this year is smaller than usual.

REPAIRS

Only necessary replacements have been made this year. No major repairs have been made for two years. There has been the anticipation all the time that something would be done from Federal funds. It seems unfortunate that such has not been the case. Several of the schools are in need of shingling, exterior and interior painting, new floors and the like. In co-operation with Mr. Lee, Federal Administrator, estimates were presented for interior work during the winter. These estimates were ready in abundant time for the second allotment of the season but Palmyra, in company with many other towns, failed to receive any. I believe that if this work

is continued by the government every effort should be made to secure an allotment during the time of year when repairs can be made efficiently and economically. In any event some of these repairs will need to be made within the next year or two.

EQUALIZATION FUND

The town received an allotment from the State Equalization Fund for lengthening the school year. This fund is allotted to towns whose rates for schools and municipal expenses are equal to or above the state average. The amount of the allotment for Palmyra was \$204.00 which made possible an additional two weeks of school.

REDUCED EXPENDITURES

In spite of the fact that two more weeks of school were maintained the cost of maintaining schools during the past municipal year has been reduced by \$139.44. High school tuition cost less by \$373.99.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The work of the School Finance Commission is probably generally known. This group of distinguished citizens was appointed by Governor Brann to investigate the financing of schools. Their report has been widely distributed. The necessity for a wider tax base for the schools as well as for all state purposes was recognized by this Commission and by the Commission on Taxation. Bills before the Legislature offer real hope for the real estate tax payer. Petitions circulated through this Union have been very generally signed. This matter is of vital importance to this town and to every town and city in the State. I believe if the Legislature can be made to understand this feeling on the part of the people that these bills will be enacted into law. If they are they will be the salvation of towns such as Palmyra. It is desirable for every citizen to get in touch with our Senators and Representatives by letter, telegrams and personal interviews and urge them to support these measures.

APPROPRIATIONS

It is pleasant to be able to report that the Committee and Superintendent find after careful study that they can get on with less

money this coming year. Owing to the fact that the South Union school was not opened last fall and to reduced expenditures there remains a substantial balance on the Common School Account and on the High School Account also. The following amounts are therefore recommended to be raised:

Common Schools	\$3,300 00
High School Tuition	2,300 00
Repairs	100 00
School Physician	50 00

This totals \$700 less than last year.

CONCLUSION

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to teachers, pupils, parents and citizens in general for the excellent support they have given the schools during the past year.

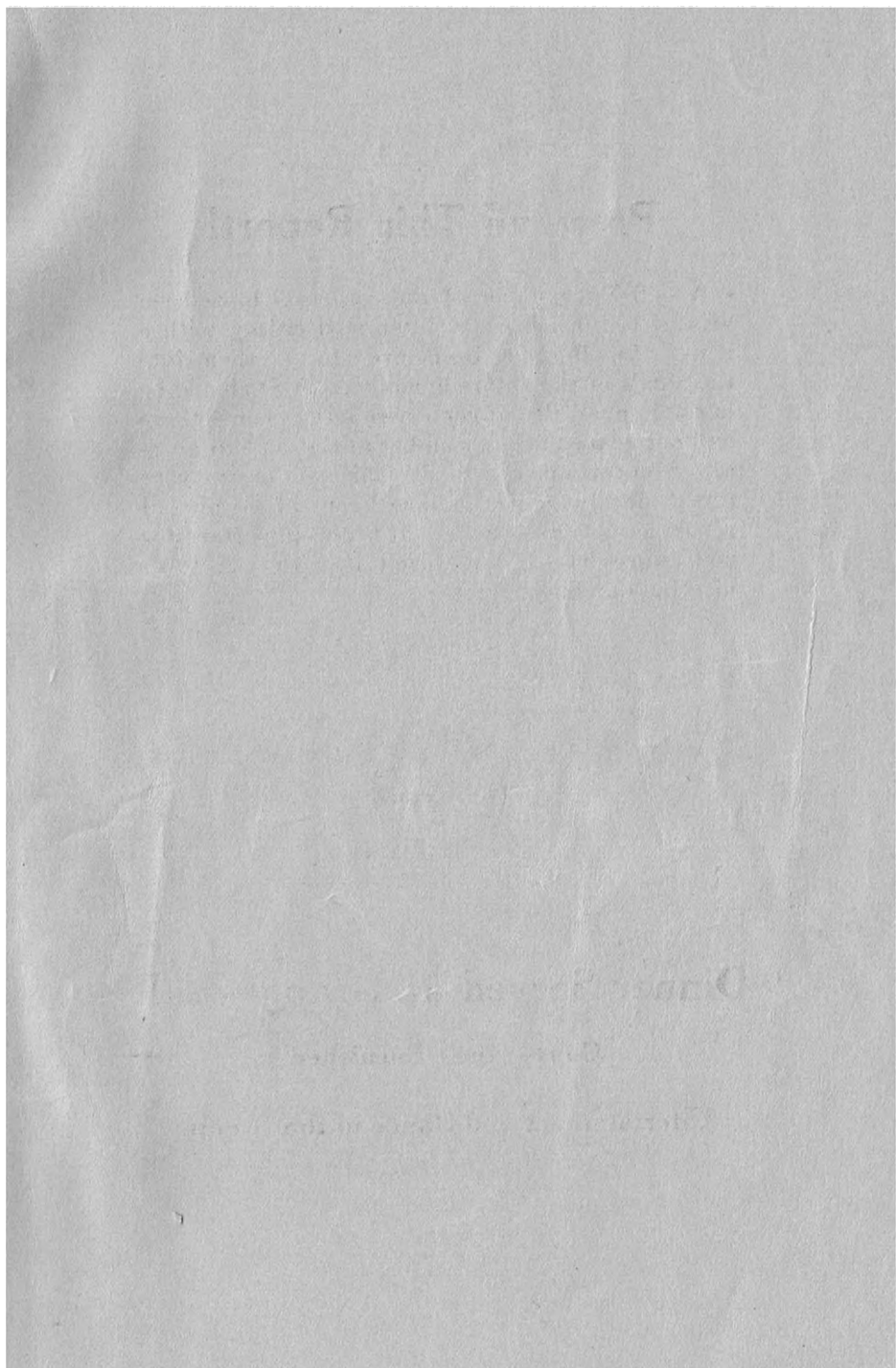
