

STATE OF MAINE

To Irving O. Bartlett, a constable of the town of Palmyra in the County of Somerset, Greetings:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town House on Monday, the Fourth day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.

Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors and three overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable and ascertain in what manner the taxes shall be collected or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To choose one or more road commissioners, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 8. To choose one or more members of the school board.

Art. 9. To choose a fire warden.

Art. 10. To choose one or more members of the cemetery committee.

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Art. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.

Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Mother's Aid.

Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of Common Schools.

Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for repair of School Property.

Art. 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for High School tuition out of town.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for same.

Art. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of Public Library.

Art. 22. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the Provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1927. Art. 23. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State road maintenance.

Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to Roads and Bridges.

Art. 25. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for snow removal and sanding.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the road from the Gale Corner to the corner near Nigger Bridge.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the road leading from Route No. 2 at the intersection of the Raymond road to the Gale corner.

Art. 28. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Third Class Maintenance.

Art. 29 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay interest and outstanding orders and bonds.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make temporary loans for the town to be paid during the current year out of money raised during the current year by taxes, and the Selectmen to issue notes for the same and in the name of the town for loans made.

Art. 31. To see here the town will vote to expend the State Aid road money.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after February 1^{st} , 1941, and act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for Public Health Nursing

In Palmyra, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to dispose of any real estate acquired through tax liens, either at public or private sales and to issue deeds in the name of and for the town for same.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet the State appropriation.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to pay the same rate for labor and trucking as paid by the State Highway Department.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the last annual town meeting under Article 6 in regard to applying tax liens by collector, and act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 38. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of apply bituminous surface treatment to State Air roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1939.

Art 39. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the Third Class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, P. L. 1939.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to install street lights through the village.

Art 41. To act on anything not pertaining to the raising of money that may lawfully come before any town meeting

The Selectmen give notice that they will be at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of said warrant with your doings thereon on or before the day of said meeting.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Inhabitants of the Town of Palmyra:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report of the schools of your town. As this is my first report of this nature to your town, I wish to be as specific as possible. I shall endeavor to mention facts concerning your schools as I have found them during the brief period since August 16, 1939.

Palmyra had a total of 138 pupils registered in the elementary schools of the town during the fall term. There were 19 Palmyra pupils attending elementary schools in nearby towns. In all elementary schools there are approximately 15 Palmyra pupils in the eighth grade.

Palmyra has a total of 61 students in secondary schools as follows: Hartland Academy, 32; Newport High school 16; Maine Central Institute, 13. The tuition expenses at the present rate are secondary per year, \$4,240.00; elementary, \$386.00.

At the present time I am not well enough acquainted to make a detailed report of the progress of each pupil, but I do feel, however, that progress is average. At the beginning of school in September, the enrollment at the Gale School was found to be much too large to expect good results. The majority of the pupils in this school were enrolled in the primary and intermediate grades. By conveying the grammar grades to the Village grammar school, the over crowded condition at the Gale School was relieved for this year.

There is also a similar condition at the Village Primary. The number of pupils enrolled is not too many for one teacher, but it is far too many for the size of the room. There doesn't seem to be any solution for this situation at the present.

At this junction in my report I shall venture out on a limb and suggest that a Consolidated school building located at the village would be a big asset to your town. Your roads are such now that all pupils could be conveyed to the school. Better progress can be made when a teacher has two grades instead of eight grades to teach.

Improvements that have been made:

Considerable work was done on the Ell school building this past year. The exterior was painted, the foundation, chimney and shed were repaired and it was thoroughly cleaned on the inside.

Rather than continue to carry a large unexpended balance in the common school account each year and in order to use the equalization funds while they were available, it was decided to spend some of this money. As one result your schools are now equipped with a new, modern Reading, English and Arithmetic series throughout. The schools are now well equipped with textbooks and reference books.

Although the balance in the common school account could not legally be used to pay for the grading of the school yards and installation of light, it was deemed advisable to use some of the money for these worth while projects. The amounts are carried as an overdraft in the repair account. A reduction in the common school and repair account will partly take care of this overdraft. If the conveyance from the Gale school is continued another year, and I see no other solution, the common school budget cannot be reduced any more.

Considering the total school appropriation for last year and the appropriation asked for this year, we find an increase of about \$525.00. Anticipated increases in conveyance and high school tuition amount to some more than the increase in total appropriations.

### Suggested Improvements

All buildings are very much in need of a light paint on the inside walls and ceilings. Playground equipment is needed at the Gale, Egypt and Village schools. American flags and some means of displaying them is an improvement to be made soon. At present the Ell school is the only one able to display its outside flag.

### Attendance

Attendance at school is one of my chief interests. I believe that in order for a pupil to get the most out of his school that that pupil must be present at every session of that school. An absence for a day means so much lost. That which is lost cannot be regained in full. Sickness and accidents are the only legitimate excuses for being absent. All other causes of absence can be avoided by careful forethought and planning. At the time of promotion on any doubtful cases, my first thought is the attendance record of the individual. A perfect or nearly perfect attendance record means that pupil deserves a great deal of consideration. I am a firm believer in education beyond the elementary school for all students. Education is a good investment. Palmyra is paying tuition money that the graduates of the elementary schools may continue their education. Palmyra students in secondary schools should do good work in order to make this investment pay dividends.

The proposed budget is about the same as last year with the exception of the secondary school account and a new account for a school nurse. An increase in secondary tuition is anticipated at the present with 61 students in secondary school. The yearly tuition bills would amount to \$4,240.00. We will receive \$700.00 of this from the State. The remainder to be raised by the town.

The school nurse account is included in addition to the school physician. The annual inspection by the doctor is very essential and most satisfactory. Dr. Moulton gives a most thorough examination but there is need for follow up work to the examination. A school nurse having connections with agencies such as the Red Cross, State Dept. of Health, Medical and Dental Clinics can often see that defective eyes, teeth, ears, and throats are treated. Home visits are invaluable in many instances.

#### School Lunch

Teachers, pupils and parents are cooperating splen-

didly in having a hot dish during cold weather. By paying express on surplus commodities all pupils have had apples during the fall term. During the winter we expect other fruits and foods to supplement the lunch program.

In closing I wish to thank all that have contributed toward making this a pleasant beginning for me.
