

STATE OF MAINE

To Irving O. Bartlett, a constable of the Town of Palmyra in the County of Somerset, Greetings:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house on Mcnday, the second day of March, A. D., 1942, at ten o'clock, A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4. To choose three selectmen, three assessors, and three overseers of the poor.
 - Art. 5 To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose a tax collector and constable and to ascertain in what manner the taxes shall be collected, or to act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 8. To choose one or more members of the school board.
 - Art. 9. To choose a fire warden.
- Art. 10. To choose one or more members of the cemetery committee.
- Art. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before July First, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for aid to dependent children.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school property.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school board to make contracts with Newport High School and Hartland Academy for the education of High School pupils for the ensuing year, or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for High School tuition out of town.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for the same.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of the Public Library.
- Art. 23. To see what sum the town will appropriate for State Aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Road maintenance.

- Art. 25. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.
- Art. 26. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$35.00 for Public Health Nursing in Palmyra. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 28. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for repair of Third Class roads.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay interest and outstanding orders and bonds.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans for the town to be paid during the current year out of money raised during the current year by taxes and the selectmen to issue notes for same in the name of the town for loans made.
- Art. 31. To see where the town will vote to expend the State Aid road money.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after February 1st, 1943.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government, for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid road construction in the excess of the amount required to meet the State appropriation.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to dispose of any real estate acquired through Tax Liens, either at public or private sales and to issue deeds in the name of and for the town for same.

- Art. 36. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.
- Art. 37. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the Third Class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class roads, in excess of the requirement of Section 1, Chapter 207, P. L. 1939.
- Art. 38. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise money to build the road leading from E. E. Davis corner west to the Hartland town line.
- Art. 40. To see what action the town will take in regard to calling Fire Department from out of town or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 41. To act on anything not pertaining to the raising of money that may lawfully come before any town meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of said warrant with your doings on or before the day of said meeting.

The schools of Palmyra have been conducted on lines essentially the same as previous years. The elementary school enrollment is about the same as last year, 141 pupils. The secondary school enrollment is reduced considerably. This is due partly to the fact that there were only four pupils graduated from our elementary schools last year. There will be

about 14 eighth grade pupils to graduate from our schools this year and in all probability most of these pupils will go to secondary school.

Attendance in the elementary schools has not been satisfactory. It is the parents' duty to see that their children go to school when the child is physically able. With this cooperation average attendance could be brought up to a satisfactory standard.

Several teachers, new to the schools of Palmyra, were hired last fall to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of former teachers in the schools. For the most part these teachers are well qualified to fill their respective positions. Teachers' salaries were increased during this year. This increase was made possible by an increase in equalization funds received from the State.

The Gale school building was painted this year. The Egypt school building is next to be repaired. The toilets and steps of nearly all the buildings need to have some work done on them. The Village building needs work done on the inside.

Eighteen pupils were conveyed from the Gale district to the Village School. After these pupils were taken from this district there were still 29 pupils left in the four lower grades at the Gale school.

BUDGET

The town has received a substantial increase in equalization fund from the State. This has enabled your committee to meet rising costs without increasing the appropriation for this year. Due to the fact that there are fewer pupils in secondary schools this past year we have a large balance in this account. It is expected that there will be more secondary pupils next year.

We are asking for the same appropriations in the other accounts. The proposed appropriations are:

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING

1941

The health of the child is the strength of the nation could be a good slogan for Public Health Nurses. Whatever is done to improve the physical and mental health during the prenatal, infancy, childhood and youth periods will help secure better health for the community. For this reason we stress particularly work with the pregnant mother, the infant and the preschool child in our program. Therefore we try to contact expectant mothers as early as possible. These mothers are reported by physicians or other sources. Those reported by physicians are visited to help them carry out his instructions. These not reported by physicians are seen to advise them to secure early care during pregnancy and to help them with their plans. If on a third visit to a prenatal patient we find that she does not have medical care, visits are discontinued.

Visits are usually made to the Town Clerk monthly to obtain a list of new babies which have been recorded. Infant mortality is greatest during the first month so we try to contact these infants as early as possible. We plan to visit infants and preschool children regularly in an effort to keep them under medical supervision and to discuss immunization against smallpox and diphtheria. During the past year visits have been made to nine prenatal patients, twenty infants and a number of preschool children. Visits have also been made to premature or tiny infants.

School visits are made to help the teachers with their health problems, check on children with doubtful hearing and vision, to encourage hot lunches during the winter months and to carry out a general immunization program. Due to unavoidable circumstances few school visits have been made as yet. In towns where school work is done the school Superintendent is visited either in the summer or early in the school year to learn his plans for the year. We are also working on plans for group meetings of teachers and nurses in the various towns for exchange of ideas.

Selectmen are visited to discuss problems in the towns.

In addition to the work mentioned above, visits have been made to children carried on the Crippled Children's Services to learn if instructions given at the clinic have been carried out, to see why some have not attended the clinic, to help arrange for further treatment or to help with transportation.

A Well Child Conference was held in June sponsored by the Home and Community Welfare of the Grange. They made arrangements for the clinic rooms, the necessary furnishings and secured transportation for those needing such services. They also gave invaluable service at the conference held in the Grange Hall. Fourteen children were examined by a physician and a dentist. Smallpox vaccination was given to seven and diphtheria toxoid to eight children. Home visits are made to help mothers in carrying out physicians' instructions. Due to this examination children have been referred to Crippled Children's Services.

Arrangements were made for reactors to the tuberculin tests given in 1939 to return for second x-rays.

As few children have been vaccinated against smallpox, this would make a good program to work for in the spring. There should be a check-up on diphtheria immunizations, which have been given in town, to see how many got immunity in one dose. Also several families have requested that tuberculin tests be repeated.


