

# Town Warrant

SOMERSET, S. S.

STATE OF MAINE

To Lewis J. Pray, a constable in the town of Palmyra in the county of Somerset, Greetings:

You are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in the town house on Monday, the first day of March, A. D., 1943 at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - Art. 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4 To choose three selectmen, three assessors, and three overseers of the poor.
  - Art. 5 To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6 To choose a tax collector and constable and act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7 To see if the town will vote to have the Town Clerk collect the Excise Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8 To choose a Road Commissioner or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 9 To choose one or more members of the school board.
  - Art. 10 To choose a fire warden.
- Art. 11 To choose one or more members of the cemetery committee.
- Art. 12 To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 13 To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before July First or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 14 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.
- Art. 15 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for aid to dependent children.
- Art. 16 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.
- Art. 17 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 18 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 19 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school property.
- Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to instruct the school board to make contracts with Newport High School and Hartland Academy for the education of High School pupils for the ensuing year or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 21 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for High School tuition out of town.
- Art. 22 To see if the town will vote to hire a school physician and raise money for same.
- Art. 23 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.
- Art. 24 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State road maintenance.
- Art. 25 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.
- Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the road leading North from Marsh's Corner.

- Art. 27 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.
- Art. 28 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of third class roads.
- Art. 29 To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$25.00 for public health nursing in Palmyra. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 30 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay interest and outstanding orders and bonds.
- Art. 31 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans for the town to be paid during the current year out of money raised during the current year by taxes, and the Selectmen to issue notes for same in the name of the town for loans made.
- Art. 32 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to invest the Cemetery Trust Funds in Government Bonds.
- Art. 33 To see if the town will vote to cancel any of the outstanding bills due the town of Palmyra as listed on Page 13.
- Art. 34 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after February 1st, 1944.
- Art. 35 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to dispose of any real estate acquired through tax liens either at public or private sales and to issue deeds in the name of and for the town for same.
- Art. 36 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25 for advertising our natural resources, advantages, and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 37 To act on anything not pertaining to the raising of money that may lawfully come before any town meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of said warrant with your doings on or before the day of said meeting.

#### Budget 1943-44

Due to the fact that the tax rate for school purposes in the town last year was less than average tax rate for school purposes in the State, Palmyra will not receive any equalization money from the State in December 1943. This is a serious loss and can only be made up by an increase in appropriations this year. The reason that the town is not sharing in equalization next year is due to either one or a combination of the following:

- 1. There was a sharp increase in the tax rate for school purposes in the State from .0130 to .0141.
- 2. There was a sharp decrease in the tax rate for school purposes in the town, from .0179 to .0133.

Had the State tax rate remained as last year or nearly the same .0130 the town would still have shared in equalization in 1943.

A town shares in equalization when the town does the following:

1. When the town maintains school thirty-six (36) weeks every year.

- 2. When twelve mills (.012) on the state valuation of the town does not produce revenue enough to enable the town to maintain a minimum program.
- 3. When the tax rate for school purposes in the town is equal or above the average tax rate of the state.

The statements 2 and 3 are the most difficult to determine in advance. In the second statement the state valuation of property in a town is liable to a change every two years. In the third statement it is impossible to know what the State tax average will be until some months after town meetings are over.

The School Committee recommends the following budget to the inhabitants of the town for the school year 1943-44. Six teachers @ \$27.00 per wk. for 36 weeks \$5832 00 One teacher @ \$6.00 per wk. for 36 weeks 216 00 Fuel, 24 cords @ \$12.00 + sawing and putting in shed 350 00 Janitors and Cleaning 2000 00 Convevance Ele. Tuition 400 00 200 00 Books 200 00 Supplies

The above appropriations for common school purposes are itemized for the purpose of showing where the committee expects to use the money during the year.

In the High School Tuition account there is a large balance at the close of books Feb. 10, 1943. All tuition is paid up to date. There is expected to be some increase in tuition next year. With the present balance the \$700.00 annually received from the State should give enough money to pay all tuition charges.

The repair account is somewhat higher than in past years. It is planned to expend most of this money on the Village building provided material and labor are available.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

One hundred thirty-eight pupils were examined in Palmyra schools during 1942 session.

The predominating correctable disabilities were listed and the parents notified.

Schools which previously had a school physician were notably freer from illness due to correction at an earlier date as urged by their previous school medical attendant, C. A. Moulton, of Hartland through whose tireless efforts their health was made more secure for the future.

How can we further safeguard our children's future?

First, as noted at the time of their examination a correction of dietary deficiency. In other words, see that they eat the right kind of foods.

All children should have either orange, grapefruit, tomato, or pineapple juice at least once a day. Three out of every five children show evidence of Vit. C deficiency in school. Vit. B, a second offender due to its lack, as shown by our examination can be supplied by ingestion of bread, vegetables, meat, eggs, coarse cereals, milk etc.

Vit. D lack as shown by faulty bone formation and poor teeth in many instances might well be supplied by some form of cod-liver oil.

Secondly, the teeth of many children are poor—a trouble which the parents should seek to correct. Here we should give them food which they have to chew—not prepare food

that is soft and goes down easily without chewing. Cod-liver oil should be given, if possible, winter and summer. Exposure to the sun is very important in the summer, i. e., get their clothes off if in any way possible in the summer months.

Milk should be given freely and in some form or other to the amount of a pint to a quart daily. This supplies the necessary minerals to make strong teeth and bones. I am sorry to see that milk has been removed from the schools this past year. In my opinion there is no substitute for pure wholesome milk in building strong bodies and alert minds. Therefore, I would recommend that an effort be made to have this useful food included as a part of each and every school's curriculum.

Not only buy your child a tooth brush but see that he or she uses it twice daily. This forms a massage of the gums which is necessary for good teeth.

Thirdly, many parents will note that their children have been marked on their throat and hearing. A child who has had abscesses in his or her ears in the past definitely will have a recurrence of the same if the cause is not removed. Frequent "gatherings" or ear abscesses mean difficult hearing and often paves the way to mastoid and more serious difficulties. If the adenoids are removed a child usually does not have recurring abscesses of the ear as that is the most common cause of this condition in an indirect way. Hence removal of tonsils and adenoids usually helps prevent subsequent ear disease and improves ear disease of long standing.

Fourthly, have your child take all inoculations and tests as recommended by the State Department of Health. This helps prevent epidemics and will do no harm to the child. Every child should be innoculated against smallpox, diphtheria, and typhoid fever.

Fifthly, I further recommend a better system of ventilation for the school rooms. In many instances the windows are opened directly on the pupils when a change of air in the room is indicated. Further, the screening of the windows to prevent flies and other insects will help many of the schools to have fewer empty seats due to illness. Many schools have non-adjustable seats which indirectly effect your child's health due to the fact they do not fit the seat hence poor posture and poor health. Some schools have poor lighting systems, in which the black board is mottled or shaded. This too should be corrected.

In summarizing may I impress you with the fact that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure". If we wish to

prevent future trouble to our children by giving them the right diet, rest, school surroundings, and hygiene we are doing well for them not only for today but for years to come where they will need their healthy bodies and minds to meet the future and have a much better chance than any of us had.

#### REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE — 1942 PALMYRA

Frequently we, as Public Health Nurses, are asked this question, "Just what do you do?" Perhaps the reason we hear this so much is that we do not advertise ourselves enough. To the following we are usually well known; families with babies and small children, and many with school children, selectmen, health officers, town clerks, and teachers. However, families without children, as a rule, have little knowledge of our work. Therefore, this year in my report I will try to explain more about what we do.

Our work as Public Health Nurses is an effort to insure that every baby is born healthy, is kept in good health through the childhood and school years, by adequate nutrition, prevention of communicable diseases, good dental care, correction of possible defects and good, clean housing. The adult, which this child becomes, cannot help but be more healthy than one who has not had this care. Therefore you will be interested to know that in your town this year visits were made to nine expectant mothers and to twenty-six infants. Health supervision was given to fifty-six preschool children: school children have been seen in school followed by home visits when necessary. Audiometer hearing tests were given in October to one hundred thirty-eight. Those with hearing defects are being visited to see if corrections can be made. One service rendered to school children, that cannnot be measured in figures, is the conferences the Public Health Nurse has held with the teachers concerning the growth and development of the school child and planning for health protection services.

A Child Health Conference was held in July under the auspices of the Farm Bureau where children under six were examined by a physician and a dentist. At this time immunizations against diphtheria and smallpox were also offered. At these conferences, where the nurse is present, the physician is paid by the State. Children with orthopedic defects have either been seen at the Crippled Children's Clinics or visited to help the mothers carry out clinic recommendations or to encourage their attendance at clinics when they receive notification. In addition to the above work there is constant effort on the part of the nurse to plan for community protection. The war emergency has made this more important than ever.

Since tuberculosis is a great problem you will be glad to know that reactors of the tuberculin tests given in 1940 have had re-x-rays as advised by the Sanatorium. It is hoped that a tuberculin skin testing program may be given next year. In March smallpox vaccinations were given to one hundred and five and diphtheria immunizations were given to one hundred and seven.

The cooperation the selectmen, health officer, and town clerk has given to the Public Health Nurse has been invaluable.

The work of the nurse could be enhanced and a great deal of time saved for the town by the organization of a permanent Local Health Committee. With such a community your Public Health Nurse could another year plan better protection for your community.

#### COMMENTS

#### CASH:

All cash recorded as received was properly accounted for, as summarized on Exhibit B.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, as summarized on Exhibits B and D.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank as per detail on Schedule 1.

#### TAXES:

The 1941 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the Assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, an amount of \$195.55 due from the Collector which was settled by him during the course of this audit, or was still unpaid as shown by Schedule 2.

The unpaid balances on prior years' taxes were checked for payments, and those still unpaid according to the records, are also shown by Schedule 2.

#### TAX LIENS, TAX DEEDS, AND SHERIFF'S DEEDS:

All tax liens and deeds on file were checked and are shown by Schedules 3, 4 and 5. According to your town records, these liens and deeds are still unpaid.

#### TRUST FUNDS:

An examination was made of the savings pass books covering trust fund investments, and the detail is shown by Schedule 7. It appeared that all income had been properly accounted for.

#### ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE:

As will be noted, Schedule 6 shows accounts receivable which, in considerable amounts, are of questionable value. We have contacted the State Welfare Department and they do not appear to have any record of the accounts as shown on the town books.

It would appear that bills have not been sent out on these accounts, and it is our suggestion that your Overseers attend to the matter of getting bills mailed and getting settlements from various towns and the State, if possible. GENERAL:

A partial check was made of paid bills and payrolls, and as far as our examination went, all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

With the exception of cash, the stamp fund, and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset or liability accounts.


