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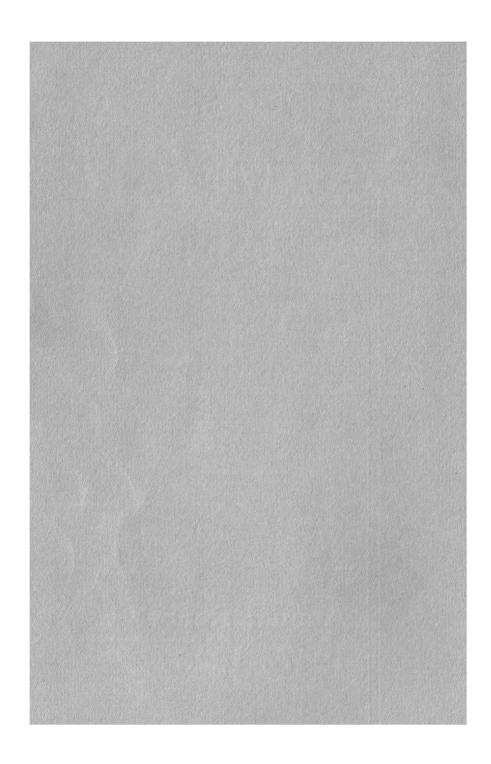

STATE OF MAINE

To Lewis J. Pray, a constable in the Town of Palmyra in the

County of Somerset, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Palmyra, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall, on Monday the first day of March A. D. 1948 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear such reports from the town officers as the town may think proper.
- Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, three Assessors and three Overseers of the Poor and fix compensation for same.
- Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer and fix compensation for same.
- Art. 6. To choose a Tax Collector and Constable and act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to have the Town Clerk collect the Excise Taxes for the ensuing year, and fix compensation for same.
- Art. 8. To choose a Road Commissioner or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 9. To choose one or more members of the school Board.
 - Art. 10. To choose a fire warden.
 - Art. 11. To choose one member of Cemetery Committee.

- Art. 12. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes for the year ensuing or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make temporary loans for the town to be paid during the current year by taxes and for the Selectmen to issue notes for same in the name of the town for loans made, in accordance with provisions of Sec. 83 of Chap. 5, of Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after Feb. 1, 1949.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay interest and on town indebtedness.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of:

Town Charges
Aid to Dependent Children
Support of Poor
Repair of Roads and Bridges
Repair of Third Class Roads
Plowing Winter Roads
State Highway Maintenance

- Art. 18. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction, in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Section 25 and 29, Chapter 20, Revised Statutes of 1944, as admended.
- Art. 19. To see where the town will vote to expend the State Aid Road money.
- Art. 20. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for expenses of:

Common Schools
High School Tuition
Superintendent of Schools Salary
School Physician
School Repairs

- Art. 21. Shall the Act to Incorporate the Town of Palmyra School District be accepted?
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to establish a "School Bus Account" and vote to transfer the balance, or any part thereof in the School Budget this year, to this account, to be used only for the purchase of school buses.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$50.00 for Public Health Nursing in Palmyra, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to establish a fixed valuation on Ames Baldwin Wyoming Co. plant at West Palmyra or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to purchase a Bulldozer Blade for the town Tractor and raise money for same or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to resurface the Wilbur Smith road so-called.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the road leading from Lanpher's Corner north to the residence of Ashley Smith.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to use with the money already held in trust by the town to inscribe the names of World War II Veterans on the Soldiers Monument.
- Art. 29. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes Chap. 32, Section 53-58.

- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to dispose of any Real Estate acquired through tax liens either at private or public sales, and to issue deeds in the name of and for the town for same.
- Art. 32. To see what action the town will take if any in regard to fire fighting equipment or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 33. To act on anything not pertaining to the raising of money that may lawfully come before any town meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of said warrant with your doings on or before the day of said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Palmyra:

Following is my second annual report on your school system submitted to you for your approval.

I receive pleasure in making this report as it is my belief that considerable progress has been made in your school system as a whole. The year has been one of fine cooperation and excellent school spirit.

The following changes have been made:

Every school building in town with the exception of Ell Hill had a complete painting inside. The ceilings, walls and toilets were given a thorough coating which made them much improved at a reasonable cost.

Through a process of changing bus routes during the summer vacation, we were able to open school in the Fall with some relief on the overcrowding at the Village. We still have a most undesirable situation there with about sixty-five youngsters where not more than fifty ought to be. However it is far better than fifty in one room which existed last year.

We have been fortunate in securing the services of a Music Supervisor, Mr. Glenroy Lamb. His wide range of musical ability makes him a valuable member in our system. He has already succeeded in organizing an Orchestra at the Village and other minor units in the rural schools.

Every effort has been pressed in an effort to secure transportation in all cases possible. Some minor changes in bus routes now make our accommodations somewhat greater. There still are some injustices and attempts will be made to rectify them if ways can be found.

Mrs. Doris Bridge has been added to our teaching force and deserves much credit for conducting an excellent program at the Egypt School. I believe we should seriously consider our good fortune in being able to boast of a good conscientious group of teachers in times such as these. You have every room supplied with a certified teacher when the State as a whole is crying for just such luck. There are at this time about 500 people in this State teaching on Permits or Sanctions.

By the time you read this Article in your town report,

you will be close to the date when it is up to you to decide upon a paramount issue concerning your school system. There will be an article in the Warrant asking the citizens to decide whether or not they wish to build a new Consolidated School. This deserves your most careful and considerate opinion. It could mean success or failure for your child and yet no one can be sure of either. It will mean a cost to you each year so long as your real estate is used as the basis for raising funds of approximately ten dollars per one thousand of evaluation. This will be the highest cost and it will be less as the payments are made.

Many people immediately wave the figure of the initial cost before our eyes and shout in horror. However, I would like to ask them a few questions as follows:

- 1. How many children have you in school?
- 2. Are you first concerned about the welfare of our 170 children or is it this increase in taxes that is determining your opinion in the matter?
- 3. Have you decided that cur present five rural schools are suitable? If not, have you considered the expense of making them sanitary and satisfactory school buildings. Too, after you have put them into condition at considerable expense, what have you?
- 4. Have you figured your actual cost per year if a new building were erected? The average evaluation in Maine is approximately \$1,000.00. This would mean a tax increase of \$10 for the average taxpayer. \$10 would not pay the average family's movie bill for six months.
- 5. When all angles of the case are figured, don't you think we would be dealing a severe blow to our children and the future prosperity of Palmyra if we don't give this a fair trial?

I would like to turn to the financial picture for the past year.

We started out the year with \$1002.11 overdraft. You increased the appropriation \$1,000 over the previous year to make up this deficit and to meet the increased cost of operation. Even though prices have steadily climbed we have come through the year with a balance of \$963.30.

It is my opinion that you would be wise to put a portion of this balance aside for the purchase of a school bus in some future year. Your 1944 Ford Bus will need to be replaced in a few years and your Dodge Ambulances will both wear out at the same time under normal conditions. This means quite a burden on the town at some future date and

I suggest we take this years balance and set it aside into a school bus account and tag it for just that purpose.

(without new building and \$100 if new building is accepted.)

This represents less money than raised for the same account last year which is rather exceptional during these times. Too, this does not take into consideration over \$900.00 recommended to put aside in the School Bus Account.

Your total school enrollment is 167 pupils. If these were to be brought to the village in a new school you would have a plan whereby no teacher would need over thirty pupils under normal conditions. Too, the first grade would be alone and in no case would a teacher have more than two grades.

In closing this report, I wish to thank the citizens of the town for their cooperation. I wish also to pay my respects to the School Committee for their willingness to cooperate in every manner that the young people of Palmyra might have the best schools which we had the power to provide.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR PALMYRA

January 1, 1947 — December 31, 1947

BUREAU OF HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

Which is more important, the health and welfare of your whole community, or your own personal liberty and feelings?

You can protect your neighbors and friends by doing your best to cooperate with your health officer and the nurse. When the public health nurse comes to your home to investigate a communicable condition, which may be anything from pediculosis (head lice) to tuberculosis, the purpose of her visit is an endeavor to control the spread of disease, protect your township and your family.

A Health Council is still very much needed in your town. If one had been organized, protective services against the

dangers of the recent drought caused and other measures to safeguard the health of the community would have been taken. If your Child Health Conference Committee would provide transportation to summer conferences more babies and small children could benefit from them. There are many other ways in which a Health Council could serve you.

In your town this past year, health supervision visits have been made, as usual, to expectant mothers, infants, pre-school and school children. The schools have been visited in an effort to control communicable diseases, inspect conditions in schools, and to obtain information with those children needing corrective work. Conferences with the School Superintendent and teachers have been held in order to promote a better health program in the school.

Three Child Health Conferences were held in town from May through July, with a total attendance of 38 children. Diphtheria and tetanus immunizations were given to 8 children; 5 were inoculated against whooping cough; and 16 had the smallpox vaccinations. An inovation at the conference was the vision testing of children starting school this fall, by Mrs. Jennie Burns. This gave the parents an opportunity to have corrections made before the children entered school.

Through the facilities of the Division of Tuberculosis Control, 15 had chest x-rays. This number does not include the x-rays given to the School Personnel.

The services of the Crippled Childrens' Clinic of the State Bureau of Health have been made available to children of this community.

Plans for special services for 1948 will include audiometer hearing tests in the schools. It is expected that x-ray clinic services will again be available in Skowhegan in March and in Newport in July.

The health standards for Palmyra students in the past year have greatly improved. Many disabilities that were previously noted have been well corrected and the parents, as well as the teachers are to be congratulated for their cooperation.

The school buildings have been improved and lighting is a much better type.

Toilet facilities are still a problem and water supply is inadequate. The children wash out of the same basin in some instances and in other cases there is no opportunity for them to wash at all. There is still the problem of getting water into the schools and for the most part this is carried from the outside.

The danger of accidents still exists before each school and this should still be a problem of consideration. However, it is a greatly improved situation and both teachers and pupils are to be commended for their part.

The superintendent and county nurse are to be congratulated on the excellent cooperation they have shown in working so diligently for your child's welfare.

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of Palmyra have been audited by Auditor R. M. Parsons for the period February 17, 1946 to February 17, 1947 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the Town and the result of its operations for the period designated. Recommendations have been made which we believe to be worthy of consideration.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted,

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts—Town of Palmyra February 17, 1946 to February 17, 1947

CASH

The receipts were checked in detail and found to be recorded correctly. All monies recorded as received were deposited promptly.

The cash balance of \$2,028.39 was reconciled with the depository and it was determined that the bank balance exceeded the cash balance by \$1.10. This amount has been set up as a Treasurer's suspense item pending allocation or correction.

All expenditures were made by check and were supported by warrants issued by the Selectmen. It was noted, however, that 17 warrants which were paid by the Treasurer had been signed by the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen only. This is contrary to Chapter 80, Section 31 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 and related law court decisions which provide that all warrants shall be signed by a majority of the Board of Selectmen.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts Receivable in the amount of \$517.95 are represented by charity accounts of \$438.75, a balance due from the 1944 Tax Collector of \$25.00 and overpayments in 1946 of \$54.20.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1946 tax commitment book was added and checked and was found to be in agreement with the records of the Assessors. Approximately 93% of the current tax commitment was collected or abated. Taxes outstanding, totaling \$2,319.50, were checked and listed.

Payments on prior year's taxes were checked and found to be properly credited.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

Accounts Payable, totaling \$273.01, represent shovel rental on the town road improvement which was not paid in 1946. NOTES PAYABLE

Notes Payable, totaling \$13,200.00, were issued for the purpose of purchasing snow removal equipment.

BONDS PAYABLE

Bonds Payable totaling \$2,000.00, are being matured at the rate of \$1,000.00 annually, the last bond coming due in 1948.

RESERVE

The Postwar Planning Fund of \$2,500.00 was used for the purchase of snow removal equipment.

DEFICIT

There was a Net Deficit of \$11,117.36 at the end of the fiscal year as compared with an unappropriated surplus of \$543.87 at February 17, 1946. This decrease was principally for the purchase of snow removal equipment.

TRUST FUNDS

The trust fund investments were not examined as they are in custody of the Skowhegan Savings Bank. A letter from the bank, dated February 6, 1947, states that they are holding for safekeeping \$4,200.00 in U. S. Government Bonds all registered in the name of the Town of Palmyra. The savings deposit books were examined. Income received from trust fund investments were expended in accordance with the terms of the trusts.

GENERAL

The Tax Collector and Treasurer furnished corporate surety bonds.

The excise tax receipts were checked and it was ascertained that all collections had been promptly deposited with the Treasurer.

Vouchers and payrolls on file were examined and in many instances were found to be incomplete as to what the expenditure was for.

During the course of this examination, it appeared that the First Selectman had been overpaid \$54.20. This payment was represented by Voucher No. 127, roads and bridges, \$6.40; Voucher No. 192, town poor, \$6.00; Voucher No. 240, roads and bridges, \$9.60; Voucher No. 262, roads and bridges, \$7.20, and Voucher No. 270, town charges, \$25.00. These amounts have been set up as accounts receivable.

It was also noted that a number of the school payrolls had been entered on the warrant for payment without the approval of the School Committee.

So far as could be determined from this examination, and with the above exceptions, the vouchers appeared in order.

The distribution of warrants did not agree with the total warrants issued, therefore, it was necessary to make an analysis of all warrants issued.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended:

That the majority of the Board of Selectmen approve all warrants before presenting to the Treasurer for payment in accordance with statutory requirements.

That all school payrolls be approved by the School Committee before entering on the warrant for payment.
