### SCHOOL REPORT.

The supervisor would respectfully submit the follow-

ing report :

The object of a school report is to show what success has attended the schools and what progress has been made, and not to criticise the teachers, magnifying the successes and whitewashing the failures. The proper time for the supervisor to criticise is when the schools are in session, and that for their improvement. Taken as a whole, I think the schools will compare favorably with former years. I can see that great advancement has been made in the last ten years. Scholars are farther advanced now than at the same age ten years ago and better order and discipline is maintained. Prominent among the best disciplined schools is the Grammar school, taught by Miss Sara Hurd. The scholars seemed to know the will of the teacher and comply with her wishes without any expression from her.

The Primary school, taught by Mrs. Frony Trafton, was a model school. Perfect order and discipline was maintained and all moved like clock-work, without noise or friction. As might be expected, the best results were obtained in these schools. Light gymnastics were introduced by the teachers, which added greatly to the interest

and good discipline.

There were other schools that I would like to mention if space would permit; among them those taught by Miss Lizzie Bane, Miss Cora Pennell, Miss Alice Libby and

Miss Rose Winslow.

Eleven of the teachers never taught before and their efforts were a sort of experiment, to test their ability to teach. Most of them were quite successful; some of them I would advise not to toy any more. Two of them are students at the Normal schools and show the advantages of a Normal training.

Normal training.

There have been twenty-four teachers employed, besides the High School teacher. Two-thirds of them are residents of this town. There have been thirty-four terms taught during the year, with an average of about nine weeks in each term. Two hundred and eighty-five pupils

have been registered.

District No. 13 has not had a school for several years until this year when it had a term of eight weeks. District No. 10 re-organized la-t spring and has had two terms of

school.

We were very fortunate in our selection of a teacher for the Free High School, taught in the village district. Although the school commenced under very unfavorable conditions, it preved to be the best we have had for many years. Many of the pupils were engaged at the corn factory, so there were only nine present at the opening of the school; but it rapidly increased in numbers until the schoolroom was filled. Many of those who taught during the summer attended and did thorough work, which was what the teacher required in all his pupils. The teacher showed a tact for governing his school that few possess. The only fault with the school was the large number of recitations, dividing the time into such short periods that the best results could not be obtained. Some of the pupils were sent into the Primary school for recitation. The school continued twenty weeks and cost, for wages of teacher and board, \$300, one-half of which will be paid by the State.
