

SCHOOL REPORT.

By law or custom, the Supervisor's report, for the past few years has been very brief. Perhaps a little more space may be given to me than has been usually taken for this part of the town report.

The object of a report is for information, but how can the people be instructed without language, spoken or written? Many things ought to be said but we will touch only upon a few points which we think are of importance to the town.

In our schools, every voter should be interested, and every act possible should be performed which tends to their improvement. It is true we have made wonderful strides on this line in the past twenty years. We have better schoolhouses, more, and a better class of books, and better educated teachers. But a few suggestions we may offer further on in this report, we think, if heeded, may add to the cause of education.

SCHOOLS.

The schools in this town, the past year, have been good, and many of them excellent. With one exception, every school has been visited twice, at the opening and closing, as the law requires, and all the time needed given to each school. One agent failed to notify the Supervisor of the time for closing, hence the school did not have the last visit.

TEACHERS.

There have been employed in town, the past year, twenty-six teachers, besides the High School teacher. One-half of them were residents of this town; two of them never taught before. Thirty-eight terms have been taught, with an average of nearly nine weeks in each term. We would be glad to make special mention of several who have done honor to themselves in teaching, but it does not seem advisable. We need the space this year for another

purpose. Many of our teachers have such a well established reputation for being good instructors, that no words of mine would add any laurels to their already well earned good name. And then it is true, the exaltation of one is to the discouragement of another. My words of commendation or reproof have already been said in the school-room. As a whole, they have been a hard-working and painstaking class of instructors.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

This is a school that belongs to the town, but we fear the town does not appreciate this privilege for the instruction of its youth. The patronage of the school has not been what it might have been, nor what we had a right to expect it to be. It is the cheapest educational privilege that can be given a student, for the State pays one-half of the expense, and just as good instruction can be obtained here as is given in the academy or many of the institutes. We speak particularly of this school because it is the town's school, and of the teachers for the same reason. We were fortunate enough to secure a teacher whose deportment, in the school and out, merited the approval of the committee. He gave, by his daily life, an example that any young man would do well to imitate, and what we have said of him, touching his moral character, we can say of every teacher who has taught in our town the past year.

At the opening of the term the school was hindered, (as last year) by many of the pupils working in the corn factory. But in due time the school machinery was in motion and continued twenty weeks, with two weeks vacation. The last part of the term was considerably interrupted by sickness. A new departure, by the teacher, was the introduction of several lectures for the benefit of the school and its friends, which were very instructive and highly satisfactory. As a teacher, he was very successful.

The total expense for wages and board was \$250.00, fifty dollars less than last year.

The school at its close, gave an exhibition which netted \$10.00 for the High School.

A WORD TO PARENTS.

Much depends upon your co-operation with the teacher for a good school. I have found in some instances, if a

pupil is displeased with a teacher, it may be for some trifling matter or because the teacher insists upon the scholar getting his lesson, that the parents will allow their children to remain out of school, to the great injury to the boy or girl. This is all wrong. The old-time admonition, "If you get a flogging at school you will get another when you get home," might serve a good purpose in some districts in this town. If a teacher is over exacting or puts heavy burdens upon your boy (according to your judgment) there is a proper way for a redress, without punishing your boy for life by depriving him of his schooling just to gratify his likes or dislikes. See to it, parents, that your children are in school and there to stay during the term.

AGENTS.

Engage your teachers two weeks, at least, before your school is to begin. Employ as many from your own town as you can. There are as good teachers here as in other towns. Engage early. Teachers must have time for examination, which will be more critical this year than in the past: new studies are to be introduced, which must receive attention. I further suggest that all winter terms begin early enough to close two weeks before the annual town meeting, that all school registers be in the Supervisor's hands in time for use in his report. It was not so this year. Notify your Supervisor at least ten days before the opening or closing of your schools.

BOOKS.

According to law, the town shall furnish free text books. Very many of the books first bought by the town are worthless. I found upon my first visit to the schools there were not nearly enough to supply the demand; hence I have been obliged to purchase quite a large quantity, especially readers, and now if all the schools were to commence the first Monday in May three or four districts would have no books. The care of books is considerable, and the trucking from one district to another is hard work and a needless expense. I suggest that every district have a book case with lock and key, and when a term closes put the books therein, the agent taking a correct number thereof, so that his number will exactly correspond with

that of the teacher's which is returned to the Supervisor; and that at the beginning of a term the teacher shall remove from the case such books as are needed, charging to the scholar receiving the book, and crediting it to the agent. In this way our books would do longer service, and be of less expense to the town. For this arrangement to be carried out the town must furnish a larger supply of books. I would suggest the town furnish labels, to be pasted on the inside of the cover of every book. Said label shall give the number, with rules and regulations in reference to the care of the book and the responsibility of the scholar using said book.
