WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

FOR MARCH 12TH, 1894.

To D. R. Longley, a Constable in the town of St. Albans, in the County of Somerset, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of St. Albans, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on the twelfth (12th) day of March, A. D. 1894, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a Moderator.

ARTICLE 2.—To choose a town Clerk and other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 3.—To see how much money the town will raise for the support of schools.

ARTICLE 4.—To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor.

ARTICLE 5.—To see how much money the town will raise to defray town charge bills.

ARTICLE 6.—To see how much money the town will raise to repair the highways.

ARTICLE 7.—To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of bridges.

ARTICLE 8.—To see how much money the town will raise to break down the snow in winter, and how the same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 9.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for free high schools.

ARTICLE 10.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to purchase text books and provide book-cases for the school-houses.

ARTICLE 11.—To see if the town will vote to return to the "highway money system of roads," so called.

ARTICLE 12.—To see what amount of highway money the town will raise, and how the same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 13.—To see what action the town will take to break down the snow in the highways the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 14.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair school buildings.

ARTICLE 15.—To see if the town will vote to purchase a new road machine.

ARTICLE 16.—To see how much money the town will raise to operate the road machine.

ARTICLE 17.—To see if the town will vote to raise twenty dollars for the observance of Memorial Day and remit the payment of the same to the treasurer of the George Goodwin Post.

ARTICLE 18.—To see if the town will accept the bequest of the late E. K. Hall, and give the necessary instructions in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19.—To see what action the town will take in relation to Nancy Parkhurst and the claim of Martin Palmer for her support.

ARTICLE 20.—To see what action the town will take in relation to Cyrus K. York and John S. Smart.

ARTICLE 21.—To see what instructions the town will give the Town Agent and Selectmen in relation to the suit at law of Bangor against St. Albans.

ARTICLE 22.—To see if the town will allow the claim of Fred Brown.

ARTICLE 23.—To see if the town^e will allow the claim of Geo. Merrill.

ARTICLE 24.—To see if the town will allow the claim of H. E. Philbrick for labor on the "way," leading from the town highway to his homestead.

ARTICLE 25.—To see if the town will lease the town farm, stock, etc., and board the inmates.

ARTICLE 26.—To see if the town will accept the list of jurors prepared by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 27.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of graveyard fences.

ARTICLE 28.—To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to repair the Town House.

ARTICLE 29.—To see if the town will give the Geo. Goodwin Post the use of the Town House for its regular meetings.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

School Report.

The Supervisor of Schools herewith submits the following report for the year 1893:

The schools in Dists. No. 4, 11 and 12 are now in session, consequently their registers for the winter term cannot be obtained.

There has been no school in district No. 16 (the district having failed to keep up an organization by meeting and choosing officers as required by law), and it was deemed advisable to apportion the money to district No. 4 and allow the scholars to attend that school, which was done with good results.

School in district No. 10 (winter term) was closed two weeks before it was intended owing to so small an attendance and one or two other causes.

The summer term of school in district No. 6 was shortened, owing to the poor health of the teacher.

TEACHERS.

The schools cannot be reported as a decided success, and yet I think that the teachers generally have endeavored to do their best for the several schools in which they have been placed.

The prosperity of our schools does not depend wholly upon the teachers nor does it devolve upon the supervisor; try as hard as they may unless they have the co-operation of the parents the best results cannot be obtained. When the parents are willing to work with the teachers, to encourage punctuality and regularity, to aid them in every way, believing in every case that the teachers should know the best course for the scholar to pursue instead of listening to the complaints of some idle or wilful scholar—then and not till then will our schools be a success. We may devise new methods, adopt new systems, we may do everything in our power, and yet unless we have the firm support of every citizen and every parent, we cannot hope for the best results. And again it should be the aim of the committee or agent to choose those teachers who will interest themselves and work for the advancement of the pupils rather than for the compensation.

TEXT BOOKS.

There is not a uniformity of text books in this town. There seems to be no regularity to them. There should be order and system in everything and especially in so important a matter as this.

In order to do this there must necessarily be a good deal of labor laid out, and it should be done as soon as possible.

It was deemed desirable to change the Physiology in use for a more desirable one, consequently the "Pathfinder Series," published by the instigation of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, was adopted and the results thus far have been very satisfactory.

The high school was without suitable reading matter to make that branch interesting (as it should be in every school) and Barnes' National reader was introduced with good results. Physical Geography was introduced for those pupils who were advanced to a suitable degree, also Ancient History.

There seems to be an erroneous idea in regard to the furnishing of high school studies. The Supervisor has no right to buy high school studies for common schools, and even if he did it would not be the best thing to do, for it would rob the smaller scholars of time that should be given to them. The younger ones must have a chance as well as the older, and if every school should become a high school how would they get it? To be sure some of the high school studies have been let out to accommodate when not needed in the high school but were recalled as soon as needed.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The high school has been under the instruction of your Supervisor. I have tried to make it a profitable school to the town, have endeavored to interest the pupils and aid them in every way both in school and out. How well I have succeeded I will leave to the wise judgment of the citizens.

I feel justified in making the following suggestions:

Retain those teachers of known disposition, ability and actual experience to conduct our schools in the future, even if it requires a little more compensation to recompense them for their services. We need those teachers who have studied to meet the wants of pupils; they who have done away with the dull routine of clinging to the text books and are imparting the spirit rather than letter of the text. Teach the child to reason for himself as well as commit.

Let no local prejudices or sectional animosities divert us from the determination to give to our scholars the best preparation for the duties of life—a thorough practical education.
