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### TOWN WARRANT.

TO L. C. DILLINGHAM, CONSTABLE OF THE TOWN OF ST. AL-BANS, IN THE COUNTY OF SOMERSET. GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of St. Albans, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday the fifteenth day of March, A. D. 1897, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1-To choose a Moderator.
- ART. 2-To choose a Town Clerk and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 3-To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the support of schools.
- ART. 4—To see what sum the town will grant and raise for Free High school.
- ART. 5—To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the repair of school buildings.
- ART. 6-To see what sum the town will grant and raise to purchase text book.
- ART. 7—To see what sum the town will grant and raise to defray town charges.
- ART. 8—To see what sum the town will grant and raise to repair bridges.
- ART. 9—To see what sum the town will grant and raise, in cash to repair highways in summer.
- ART. 10—To see what sum the town will grant and raise, in cash to repair highways in winter.
- ART. 11—To see what sun the town will grant and raise in labor and material to repair highways in summer.
- ART. 12—To see what sum the town will grant and raise, in labor, to repair highways in winter.
- ART. 13—To see what sum the town will grant and raise for board and wire fences.
- ART. 14—To see what sum the town will grant and raise additional to that raised in 1896 to build a schoolhouse in the Lothrop district, so called.
- ART. 15—I'o see what sum the town will grant and raise for memorial services.
- ART. 16—To see what sum the town will grant and raise to defray town debt.
- ART. 17—To see what sum the town will grant and raise to repair the Charles Clark road, so called, or what action it will take regarding said road.
- ART. 18—To see if the town will vote to abate the balance of tax due from M. Bigelow for 1891.
- ART. 19—To see if the town will vote a sum of money to Sewall Whittier to maintain a water tub near W. A. Bigelow's and under what conditions.

ART. 20—To see what sum the town will grant and raise to enlarge the Maloon cemetary.

ART. 21—To see what action the town will take on the claim of J. F. Hilton for services as town agent for 1894.

- ART. 22-To see if the town will vote to sell the Moore place.
- ART. 23-To see if the town will vote to give the Army Post, Relief Corps and St. Albans Band the use of the town hall for their regular meetings.
- ART. 24—To see if the town will accept the list of juriors as revised by the municipal officers.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town hall at nine o'clock A. M. on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

# SCHOOL REPORT.

#### CITIZENS OF ST. ALBANS:

I have the honor to submit the annual report, the same being for the year ending Feb. 23d, 1897.

#### TEACHERS.

We run thirteen schools during the summer term. All of the above were under the instruction of teachers in our town with the exception of three. The summer term we considered to be a success on the whole.

For the fall term we were obliged to make changes in our teachers, in a very few districts. This term was an improve ment on the summer, but on a whole they were not considered as successful.

There were eleven schools run in the fall, all of which were under the instruction of teacher's in our own town. On account of sickness among the scholars in Dist. No. 17, it was not considered advisable to start the school.

There is a spring term of seven weeks in place of the fall term so as to give them an equal amount of schooling.

We run thirteen schools in the winter. With but one exception they were all under the instruction of teachers in our own town. Owing to the feeling existing in some districts, this term was not what it should have been.

There were but two districts in town where the same teacher was retained through the school year. I would say that the greatest fault with some of our teachers is a lack of energy and interest. It seems to be the compensation rather than the well-fare of the school which they are working for. In regard to discipline I am sorry to say that some of our schools are sadly deficient in this respect. There are several districts where I would recommend a good disciplinarian, and that he or she be sustained in that respect by the school board.

In the past year we have employed several teachers without any previous experience and with a very few exceptions they have met with excellent success.

In conclusion, I would say that the teachers have nearly all been elected by the board. It was left with me to fill a very few vacancies, which I did by consulting the school boad, or a majority of the same with but one exception.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

We were obliged to secure the services of a new teacher for the fall term, as Miss Elliott tendered her resignation at the end of the summer term.

The fall term was under the instruction of Miss Libby, of Gray, who worked hard for the interest of her school. Her discipline was excellent, but owing to her health was not considered able to teach the spring term, but we were very fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Smith of Corinna. He has a large school, every district in town being represented. Mr. Smith is a teacher of experience in this grade of work, and is meeting with excellent success. His pupils are making good progress and we think his earnest labors should be appreciated throughout the town.

#### TEXT BOOKS.

In regard to text books, I would say there is not the uniformity that there should be. We are using, at present, two authors on geography, grammar and arithmetic. The primary work is in very bad condition. At the beginning of the year I put in considerable time repairing those books I thought suitable for use. Our preceding superintendent thought it not necessary that they should all be collected, looked over and renumbered as had been done under Mr. Dyer's supervision, but I would recommend the same should be done before the spring term. We have expended \$76.75 for text books the past year. In my judgment the books are in better condition, on a whole, than at the beginning of the year.

I think it would be advisable for the town to come to some understanding in regard to furnishing books for the High school as there are various opinions as to whether the town should furnish them or not.

#### REPAIRS.

The houses in Dists. Nos. 5, 6 and 13 have been newly shingled, also a shed built in No. 13, and all other necessary repairs, such as setting glass, etc. We have not done any plastering, but there is need of more or less being done in nearly every house in town. Several of our schoolhouses are very much in need of repairs, especially the one in Dist. No. 2 (or the Merrill) schoolhouse. The shed and outbuldings of the same are a disgrace to the town, being located on a main traveled road. The houses in Dists. Nos. 1 and 15 need shingling. The house at the village should be painted, and some changes made in the outbuildings, as there has been a complaint made by the board of health.

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I would say that I thank the school board and my fellow townsmen for their support.
