The condition of our public schools for the year past has been one of unequalled prosperity, owing to the good judgment of the School Committee in employing teachers of high rank at increased wages thereby elevating the standard of scholarship.

The High school, under management of P. R. Longley, graduated its first class last June, and will graduate a class this year. This incentive to the teacher and pupils has elevated the standard of the school, The so called district schools, as a whole, have been very successful. In some in tances whooping cough, measles and local prejudices have hindered the work of the teachers.
