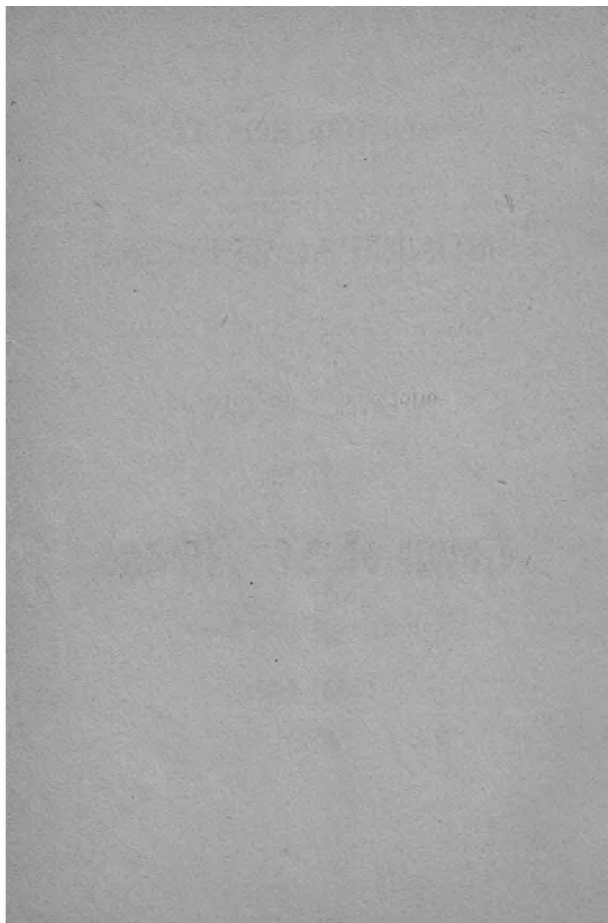

# Town Warrant.

---

## STATE OF MAINE.

*To H. B. Hilton, Constable of the Town of St. Albans,  
County of Somerset,*

GREETING :

---

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of St. Albans, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday, the fourteenth (14th) day of March, A. D. 1904, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

ART 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART 2—To choose a town clerk.

ART 3—To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

ART 4—To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

ART 5—To choose a town treasurer.

ART 6—To choose a collector of taxes and to see what method the town will adopt for collection of the same, or act anything thereon.

ART 7—To choose one superintending school committee.

ART 8—To choose a road commissioner.

ART 9—To choose a town agent.

ART 10—To choose all other necessary town officers.

- ART 11—To see what sum of money the town will raise for schools.
- ART 12—To see what sum of money the town will raise for free high school.
- ART 13—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay tuition of scholars in schools of standard grade out of town.
- ART 14—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair school buildings and purchase school supplies.
- ART 15—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase and repair of text books.
- ART 16—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair and build bridges.
- ART 17—To see what sum of money the town will raise for town charges.
- ART 18—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair roads in summer.
- ART 19—To see what sum of money the town will raise to break out roads in winter, what method they will adopt for expending the same and the pay per hour to be allowed for men and horses, or act anything thereon.
- ART 20—To see what sum of money the town will raise for board and wire fences.
- ART 21—To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial services.
- ART 22—To see what sum of money the town will raise for extension of the State road.
- ART 23—To see what sum of money the town will appropriate from funds in the treasury for extension of State road.
- ART 24—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the construction of a building for the storage of road machinery belonging to the town.
- ART 25—To see what action the town will take in relation to an outlawed claim of Henry Hudson.
- ART 26—To see if the town will instruct the school committee to

run one or more terms of school during the coming year in the Hopkins and Magoon districts, so-called, or act anything thereon.

ART 27—To see what sum of money the town will raise to build a schoolhouse for the accommodation of scholars who have attended school in Hartland, purchase a lot for the same, or take any action thereon.

ART 28—To see if the town will give the school committee any instructions to transport the scholars who have attended school in Hartland, to schools in our own town, if they see fit.

ART 29—To see if the town will vote to pay the school committee for services rendered the coming year, or take any action thereon.

The selectmen will be in session at the town house at eight o'clock A. M. on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

---

### CITIZENS OF ST. ALBANS:

The following school report for the year ending Feb. 20, 1904, is respectfully submitted:

The financial condition of the common schools will be found by referring to selectmen's report.

### Schools.

There have been thirty terms of school, besides the High School, and nineteen different teachers have been employed. Fifteen of these teachers were residents of this town.

### Teachers.

The work accomplished by our teachers during the past year, has been for the most part successful. Five of our instructors had never taught before but have proved themselves efficient toilers in the calling they have chosen.

### High School.

Our High School is under the instruction of Eugene Foster, a student at Bates. He has proved himself energetic and pains-taking and through his high personal character and intellectual power has been able to instruct the students in much outside work that will effect their whole future.



### Books.

It will be necessary to purchase quite a supply of text books, and I would suggest that some changes be made in our present books, as the editions are very impracticable. \$150 should be raised for this purpose.

### Conclusion.

In conclusion, I would say that I thank the school board and citizens, also parents whose children I've had the privilege to instruct, for their co-operation during the year.
