STATE OF MAINE.

To A. B. TRACY, Constable of the Town of St. Albans, County of Somerset. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of St. Albans, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1905, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2-To choose a town clerk.

ART. 3—To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

ART. 4—To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

ART. 5-To choose a town treasurer.

ART. 6—To choose a collector of taxes and to see what method the town will adopt for collection of the same, or act anything thereon.

ART. 7-To choose one superintending school committee.

ART. 8-To choose a road commissioner.

ART. 9-To choose a town agent.

ART. 10-To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will raise for schools.

ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will raise for free high school.

ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay tuition of scholars in schools of standard grade out of town. ART. 14—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair school buildings and purchase school supplies.

ART. 15—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase and repair of text books.

ART. 16—To see what sum of money the town will raise for bridges.

ART. 17—To see what sum of money the town will raise for town charges.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair roads in summer.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will raise to break out roads in winter, what method they will adopt for expending the same, and the pay per hour to be allowed for men and horses, or act anything thereon.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town will raise for board and wire fences.

ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial services.

ART. 22—To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for extension of State road.

ART. 23—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay on debt created by breaking roads in the winter of 1904-5.

ART. 24—To see if the town will vote to pay the school committee for services rendered the coming year, or take any action thereon.

ART. 25—To see if the town will take any action in relation to claim of Nancy Robinson for injuries sustained by reason of the condition of the sidewalk between her residence and the Wilson Bigelow stand.

ART. 26—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to purchase or build one or more rollers for breaking down snow in winter.

ART. 27—To see what method the town will adopt to procure money for the payment of snow bills and current

expenses between now and the time when the next taxes are due.

ART. 28—To see what sum of money the town will raise to construct a building for the storage of road machinery.

ART. 29—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the village schoolhouse lot and use the proceeds to purchase another lot, or act anything thereon.

ART. 30—To see what sum of money the town will raise to move the village school buildings to another lot and repair the same.

ART. 31—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay the deficiency for building Moose Pond road schoolhouse and to fence the lot.

ART. 32—To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as prepared by the town clerk and selectmen.

ART. 33—To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to sell the Chambers schoolhouse, so-called.

The selectmen will be in session at the Town House at eight o'clock, A. M., on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

### Report of Supt. of Schools.

It will be noticed that twelve schools have been maintained for twenty-two weeks each. For the greater part these schools were profitable and good work was accomplished. This was pre-eminently the case wherever teacher, pupils and parents co-operated in endeavoring to make the school work a success. Wherever this unity of purpose was in any degree lacking—on the part of either party to the triple alliance—the schools suffered to that extent.

The Hopkins school, so-called, maintained an average attendance of less that eight, the spring and fall term.

The scholars were transported to Lyford school the winter term. This school stands suspended by law unless the town empowers the superintending school committee to continue it. Should this be the case I would deem it necessary that there be repairs made on this schoolhouse. Under the new "High School Law" found in chapter 68 of the public laws of 1903, which requires towns not supporting free high schools to pay the tuition, under certain conditions, of pupils attending such schools in other towns, it has been ruled that no scholar is entitled to its privileges until he has mastered the common school studies, etc. I would suggest that a more careful examination be taken in regard to the qualification of such students, before agreeing to pay tuition for the same.

Our Free High School is being taught by Oscar Bigelow, who is assisted by Miss Lena Butler. These teachers have both proven themselves earnest, energetic and conscientious workers in behalf of our schools.

In conclusion, let me express my thanks to the teachers who have loyally carried out what directions I have given them, my thanks to the members of the school board, who by careful attention to school interests have made the work effective, and my thanks to the townspeople for their consideration and help.

#### Report of the Superintending School Committee.

We herewith submit our annual report of the condition of the school property and the expenditures of the past year with such recommendations as we believe would be productive of beneficial results.

#### Schools.

There were thirteen schools in which thirty-six terms were taught.

The Hopkins school was suspended for the winter term and a school established in the Moose Pond schoolhouse for the winter term.

First term of seven weeks commenced Apr. 25. Second term of eight weeks commenced Aug. 22. Third term of seven weeks commenced Oct. 31. High school of ten weeks commenced Jan. 9.

#### Transportation.

The superintendent was instructed to procure the transportation of scholars from the Chambers to the Five Corners for the year, from the Moose Pond to Hartland for the spring and fall, and from Hopkins to the Lyford for the winter term.

#### School Buildings.

#### VILLAGE.

The attention of the citizens of this town was called to the condition of this school building two years ago.

At that time we called special attention to its sanitary condition. The near proximity of its outbuildings and other surroundings render it unfit for school purposes and extremely dangerous to the health of scholars and teachers, although this has been mitigated in part at great expense without giving any permanent benefit.

The height of the rooms, which are sixteen feet, make it impossible to maintain near an even temperature, thereby making it very uncomfortable for the scholars. The plastering and floors are in very bad condition and the time has come when repairs must be made or some other place provided, as we consider this building not only dangerous to health but to bodily injury.

It is the opinion and recommendation of the school board that this building should be moved to a larger and more suitable lot and then thoroughly repaired.

#### TANNERY, LUCAS, MERRILL, BRICK, TOWN FARM, LYFORD, AND FIVE CORNERS.

These buildings are all in good repair inside but need painting outside and the shed at the Town Farm clapboarding and painting.

#### HOPKINS.

This building is in good repair outside, but in bad shape inside. The plastering is in very bad condition.

#### MAGOON.

These buildings are in fair condition and can be made comfortable with small expense.

#### TRACY.

This school building needs repairing inside, which should be done this year.

#### CHAMBERS AND MOUNTAIN.

These buildings are not used for school purposes and we would recommend that the schoolhouse in the Chambers district be sold as it is fast going to ruin.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

We think that the recommendations and suggestions as herein made should be carried into effect and that the voters of this town will be willing to appropriate a sufficient amount. We believe our school buildings and grounds should be made so pleasant and attractive that it will be a pleasure to attend instead of a place to shun.


