### Town Warrant.

#### STATE OF MAINE.

To J. F. HILTON, Constable of the Town of St. Albans, County of Somerset. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of St. Albans, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D., 1907, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
  - Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
  - Art. 5. To choose a town Treasurer.
- Are. 6. To choose a Collector of taxes and to see what method the town will adopt for the collection of the same, or act anything thereon.
  - Art. 7. To choose one Superintending School Committee.
  - Art. 8. To choose a Road Commissioner.
  - Art. 9. To choose a Town Agent.
  - Art. 10. To choose all other necessary town officers.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of schools.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Free High School.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay tuition of scholars in schools of standard grade out of town.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise for repair of school buildings and purchase school supplies.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase and repair of text books.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise for bridges.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will raise for town charges.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair and build roads in summer.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will raise to break out roads in winter, what method they will adopt for expending the same and the pay per hour to be allowed for men and horses, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will raise for board and wire fences.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial services.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will raise and how much they will appropriate for extension of the State road.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase of road breakers, or act anything thereon.
  - Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will raise

for the repair of the Town House, or act anything thereon.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to have any road drags made and what method they will adopt for having the same operated.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to pay the school committee for services rendered.

Art. 27. To see if the town will take any action to recompense Mrs. Charles Brown of Ripley for being thrown out of a wagon on the Rand hill so-called and seriously injured.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will raise to finish screening the dam at the outlet of big Indian pond.

Art. 29. To see what action the town will take in relation to request of Ellen F. Hilton, now Mrs. C. C. Knowles of Corinna, to have her released from a clause in the deed to her of the Oliver Lane place, whereby she was required to save the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans from any expense on account of Charles Lane a non compus son of Daniel W. Lane of Billerica, Mass., so that she can sell the said Oliver Lane place and give a warranty deed of the same.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay J. F. Hilton seven dollars for one sheep killed by dogs in 1905 and four dollars for one lamb lost about the same time with forty two cents interest on the same.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will raise to paint the hearse.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will raise to clean up and fence the Sleeper cemetery or act anything thereon.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to hire money to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town House

at eight o'clock A. M., on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

### Report of Supt. of Schools.

#### Teachers and Schools.

Upon receiving from you authority to examine, certify and engage teachers an examination was held in the Town Hall, April 21, which was attended by twenty or more teachers, who, for the most part, passed satisfactory examinations.

Teachers were certified and engaged for twelve schools during the spring. These teachers with one or two exceptions gave entire satisfaction, and as far as it was deemed advisable the same teachers were retained for fall work.

The fall and winter work which has been done in two terms was done in one term of fifteen weeks with a recess of one week. This plan seemed the most practical at the time and clearly demonstrated that much time was saved which has heretofore been required in closing and opening terms.

There have been a few instances where the lack of support on the part of the parents has materially injured the progress of the school.

In most cases the pupils have made good progress and

I believe every teacher has performed her work faithfully.

#### Text Books and Appliances.

The text books were in very poor condition at the opening of the year. They were collected and repaired and new books purchased to replace those which were useless. New histories were bought, also enough readers, geographies and arithmetics to practically complete the uniform set of text books throughout the town. Other books have been secured as necessity demanded. I would recommend that \$175 be raised to pay the amount overdrawn and to purchase and repair text books for the coming year.

There was, and still is, a great deficiency in maps, charts, etc. We purchased about half the desired number of Grover's Outline Maps of Maine and the United States and suggest that enough be bought this year so that each school may have at least one.

#### Writing.

Pupils have not made satisfactory progress in writing during the past year. I feel safe in saying this will continue to be the case until writing books are furnished by the town and every pupil in the common schools is required to write daily.

#### High School.

The High School(now in session) is under the management of your superintendent, with what success it is for you to say.

We were very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Sarah E. Little of Merrimac, Mass., as assistant. Miss Little came highly recommended and has proved herself an efficient teacher by her thorough preparation of the work and by her untiring efforts in behalf of the students.

#### Conclusion.

#### Report of Superintending School Committee.

We herewith submit our annual report, of the expenditures of the past year.

The superintendent was authorized to examine and certify teachers, procure text books, and look after transportation of scholars.

#### Schools.

There were twelve schools in town during the past year, with a total of thirty-five terms. The Hopkins school was suspended during the last term, owing to the condition of the building. The pupils from this school were transported to the Lyford school.

#### Transportation.

Scholars were transported for the year from Magoon district to Village. From Chambers district to Five Corners, and from D. D. Raymonds to Tracy school. During the

winter term from Fred Fenson's to Tracy school, and from Hopkins district to Lyford school.

#### Repairs.

One side of the roof of the Tannery schoolhouse was shingled. The school building at the Village was considered by the school board and the board of health, as unfit for school purposes. Therefore it was deemed necessary to make extensive repairs. The ceiling was lowered four feet, and the building sheathed throughout with hard pine, also filled and varnished; 18 feet of new chimney was built, extending six feet below the floor. The other school buildings remain in the same condition as reported last year.
