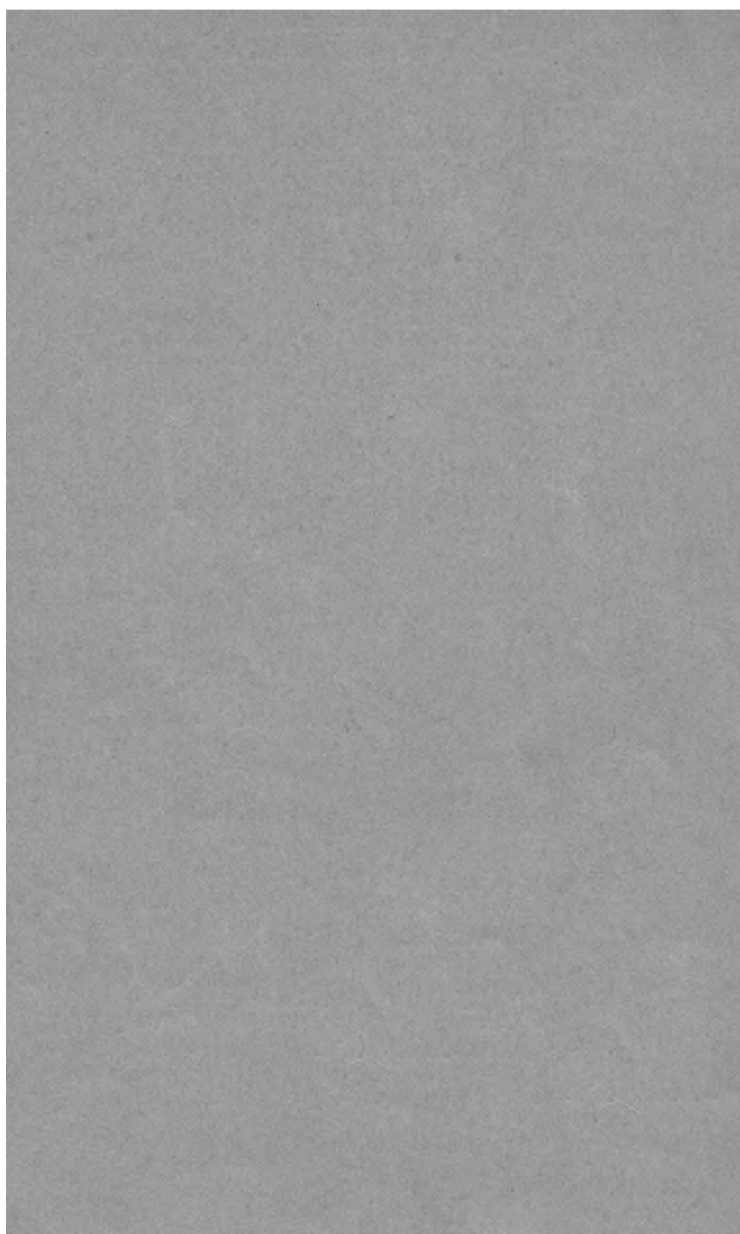

# TOWN WARRANT

---

SOMERSET, SS.

STATE OF MAINE.

To George A. Libby, Town of St. Albans.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of St. Albans, qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the 10th day of March A. D. 1919, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3—To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

Art. 4—To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and Overseers of poor.

Art. 5—To choose a town treasurer.

Art. 6—To choose a collector of taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of the same.

Art. 7—To choose one superintending school committee.

Art. 8—To choose a town agent.

Art. 9—To see if the town will choose a road commissioner.

Art. 10—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay tuition of scholars in schools of standard grade out of town.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of school buildings and purchase of school supplies.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase of text books and repair of same.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will raise for bridges.

Art. 27—To see what sum of money the town will raise under Chapter 84, Sec. 11 of the Public Laws of 1911, relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. 28—To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire a sum of money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed \$1000.00.

Art. 29—To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician and raise money for same.

Art. 30—To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to contract for tuition of scholars of standard grade as provided in Chapter 16, Section 84 of the Public Laws of 1915.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from Ditson Corner (so called) to Maxim Corner.

Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the Grover place.

Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to create a special municipal board of Mothers' Aid to consist of three members at least, one of whom shall be one of the overseers of the poor, and at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve for three yearr terms the term of one member to expire each year.

Art. 34—To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair and paint the Town Hall and if so how much.

Art. 35—To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of Elden E. Wilkins for the year 1918.

Art. 36—To see how much money the town will raise to blow out ledges in the roads.

Art. 37—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road near the Irving Robertson farm, running northerly to the Henderson place, so called.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase a road machine.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to abate part of the taxes of I. O. Bragg.

Art. 40—To see what action the town will take regarding collecting the taxes of Harry Snell.

Art. 41—To see how much money the town will raise for sidewalks.

Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to let the Red Cross or other charitable organizations have the use of the town hall free of charge, at any time they may designate, the selectmen to be notified ten days before the hall is needed.

Art. 43—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.

Art. 44—To see if the town will vote to improve the heating plant in the town hall.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to raise \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund orders.

Art. 46—To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay overdrafts, as shown in town reports.

Art. 47—To see what action the town will take regarding the claims of Frank Hanson for horse killed by the Board of Health.

The selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall at 8 o'clock a. m. on day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1919

---

## Members of the School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of St. Albans I make my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools. In this report I shall speak briefly of some of the larger matters which have occupied the attention of the schools this year and shall speak of plans for the next year.

I have been able to observe a steady improvement in the teaching in our schools during the past year. Our children are certainly receiving better instruction than a year ago. This is partly due to the fact that there has been less changing of teachers. Not a single teacher remained in the same school thruout the year ending June, 1918, whereas for the year ending next June, six out of seven will remain in the same schools. Our requests for the Common School appropriation covers a careful estimate whereby we expect to increase the pay of good teachers who remain with us and to fill the places of those who leave with promising material. Thus we hope to maintain and improve the quality of our teachers, the most important factor in the school.

The fundamentals of Education have received close attention this year with especial reference to Reading. A year ago we adopted the Progressive Road to Reading Method by which to teach primary children to read. It has justified our hopes of it and we are getting improved results. In connection with strong work in Reading we have had State Travelling Libraries in all the schools but one, which is served by a community library. These have been collections of twenty-five books of the best juvenile literature and have undoubtedly stimulated pupils interest in books and school work. Parents do not always realize the value of good books for children nor the harm of bad books.

We have continued to devote effort to improving attendance without very good results in a year when sickness has been so prevalent. We shall work further for improvement during

the coming year since regular attendance at school is an absolute essential to a pupil's progress.

The Magoon School was remodelled during the summer and is now a modern one-room school building in nearly every respect. Since our schoolhouses were built, much has been learned by specialists regarding proper heating, lighting, ventilation, etc. In the homes of many citizens of St. Albans we find a telephone, furnace, electric lights, an auto in the garage and the mail is left at the door each day. While our homes have been thus equipped, very little has been done in the line of permanent improvements to schoolhouses. An increasing number of school buildings thruout the country are being remodelled to meet the demands of modern sanitation. We are asking for a sufficiently large appropriation on the repair account to allow us to remodel another schoolhouse.

Now that the war is over and our attention is more closely fixed upon matters at home, we shall hope to keep the schools more in the public eye and to give people a better opportunity to observe what we are trying to do. In closing, allow me to express my appreciation of your support and good will in matters pertaining to the schools.

## Report of Superintending School Committee

---

We herewith submit our annual report of the expenditures of the past year and such other information and recommendations as would be of interest to the voters of the town and for the improvement of our schools and school buildings.

At a meeting of the Hartland, Palmyra and St. Albans Union district school committee in joint session at Hartland, April 27, 1918, H. B. Clifford was unanimously re-elected as superintendent of schools to serve one year from July 1, 1918 to June 30, 1919.

The school committee of St. Albans delegated to the superintendent the purchase of school supplies and text books and the care of the same.

### TRANSPORTATION

The committee instructed the superintendent to procure the transportation of scholars from Tracy to Pond; from Lang to Five Corners; from Merrill to Magoon for the year and from the Lyford to the Hopkins for the spring term and also to pay part of board and transportation and provide private tuition of other scholars.

### COMMON SCHOOLS

Seven schools of thirty weeks each have been maintained. The attendance the past year at all of these schools has been above the legal number of eight.

### REPAIRS OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The repair of school buildings has been under our direction the past year. The Magoon schoolhouse and outbuildings have been thoroughly repaired under the direction of State

inspector H. A. Allan and according to plans furnished by the State superintendent of schools. We consider those school buildings as sanitary as it is possible to make them and the light, heat, blackboard, and dressing room so placed as to meet every requirement for the health and comfort of both scholars and teacher.

Your committee recommend that the town adopt a plan of repairing one set of buildings each year until all our scholars are given the same chance to secure their education amid healthy and comfortable surroundings.

The above amounts will be adequate to meet all ordinary requirements for the coming year. If another set of school buildings are repaired the coming year a larger amount will be necessary for repairs.

The school board have used their best efforts to economize as much as was consistent with good work, having ever in mind the best interests of our schools.

A condition of perfect harmony has existed and everything has been pleasant between the members of the committee and also between the committee and the superintendent. United we have used our best efforts to secure the best corps of teachers and to make all of our schools a success.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To the School Board of St. Albans:

The following is my report to you of the inspection of your school buildings and the examination of your pupils for the school year 1918-1919.

Six schoolhouses and seven school rooms were inspected. All the houses and rooms were in good repair and as comfortable as could be expected. The difficult problem of the out-buildings, heating and lighting and ventilation is present in all of your houses except the new remodeled building at the Magoon schoolhouse. This building, except for the heating and ventilation, can serve as a proper model for the changing of all the rest of your houses.

In the examination of the pupils their conditions were classified as 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Only 3rd class conditions were reported to the parents.

There seems to be a growing desire among the parents to have the children in a more presentable condition, not only as to their personal appearance, but in their physical condition as shown by comparing their records in the last three years. Only 23 children were reported to the parents who should receive competent medical advice at once.

The following is the medical examination in detail.

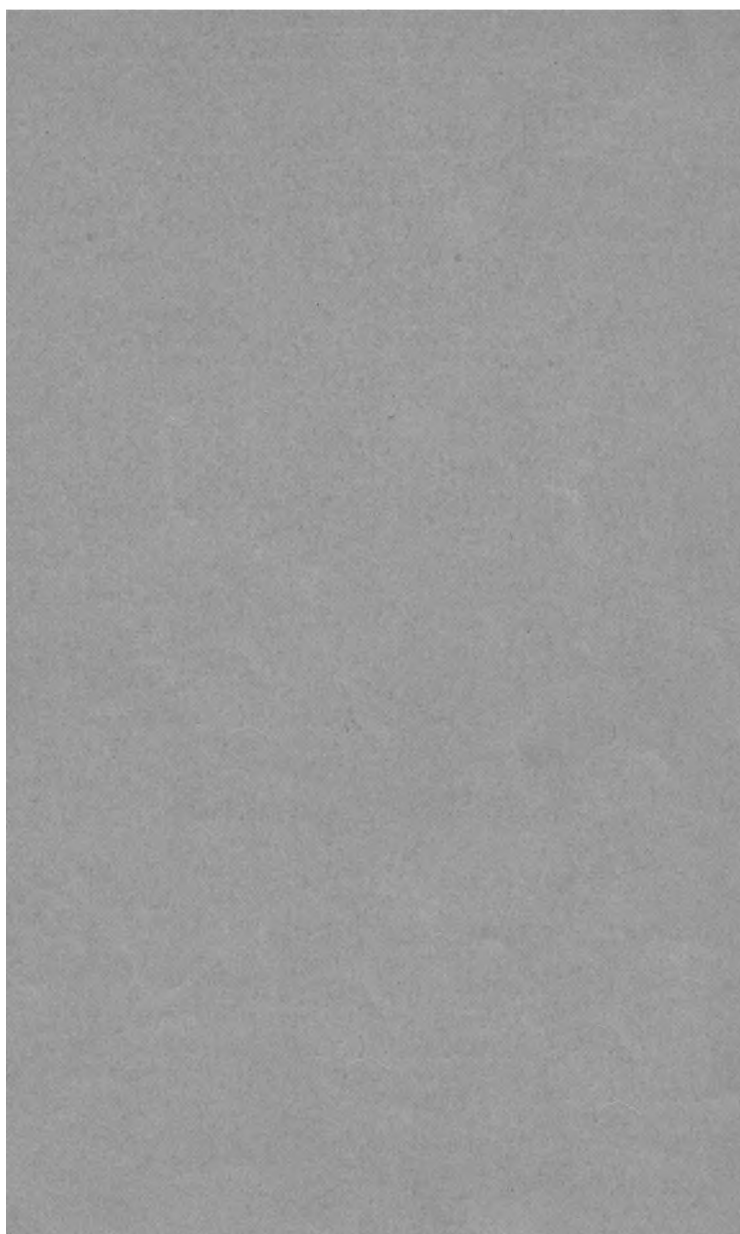
