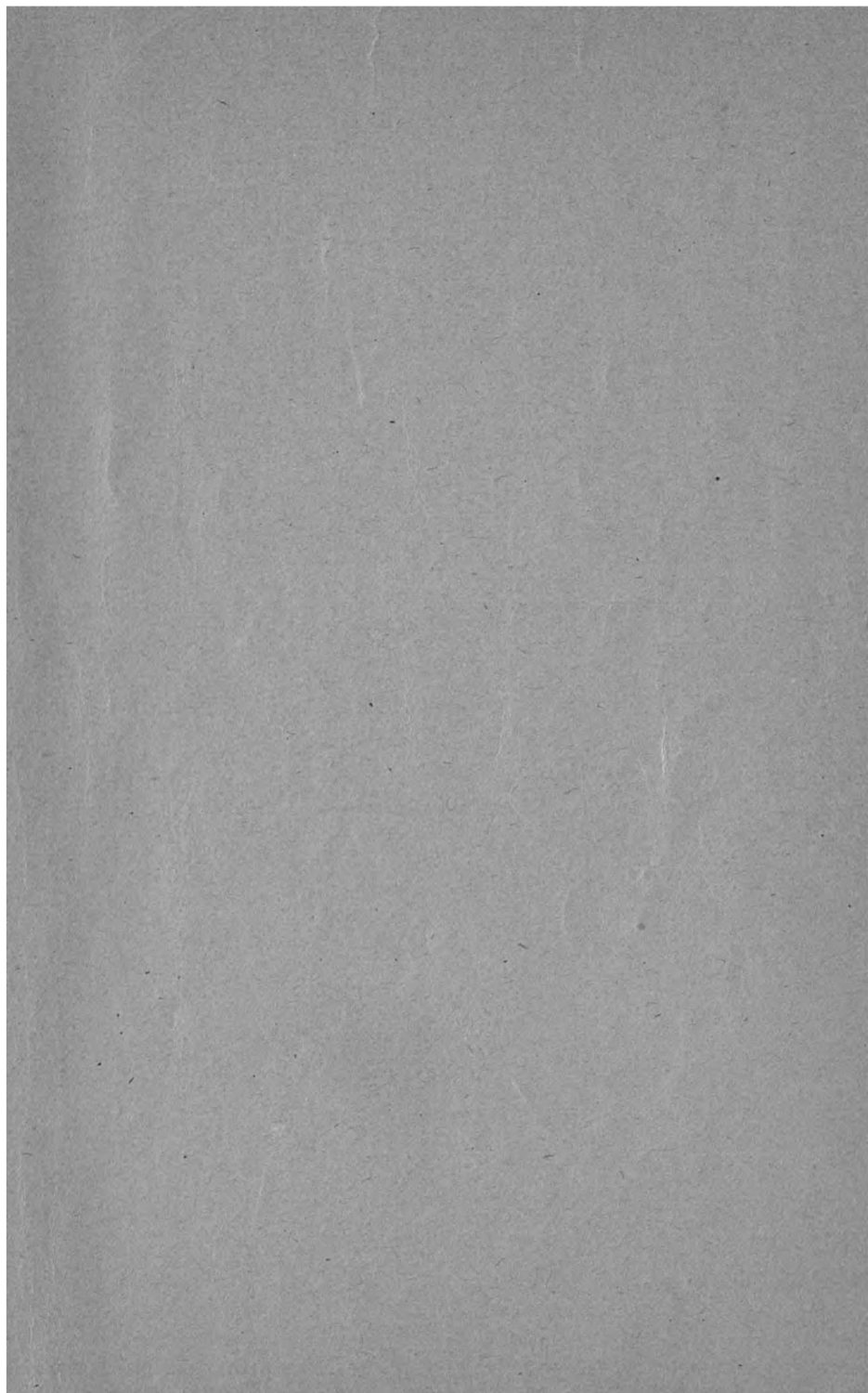

STATE OF MAINE

To George A. Libby, Town of St. Albans,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the eighth day of March A. D. 1920 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3—To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

Art. 4—To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor.

Art. 5—To choose a town treasurer.

Art. 6—To choose a collector of taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of, the same.

Art. 7—To choose one superintending school committee.

Art. 8—To choose a town agent.

Art. 9—To choose a road commissioner.

Art.10—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay tuition of scholars in schools of standard grade out of town.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and the purchase of school supplies.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text books and repair of same.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for bridges.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and build roads in summer.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to break down snow and what methods they will adopt in relation to the same.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for board fences.

Art. 19—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 20—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 21—To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18, Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges.

Art. 23—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial services.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights.

Art. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under Chapter 84, Section 11 of the Public Laws of 1911, relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. 26—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire a sum of money not exceeding \$1000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 27—To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician and raise money for same.

Art. 28—To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to contract for tuition of scholars of standard grade as provided in Chapter 16, Section 84, of the Public Laws of 1915.

Art. 29—To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair the road from Ditson's Corner (so called) to Maxims Corner.

Art. 30—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from Diston Corner (so called) to Maxim Corner.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to raise money to build road drags.

Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to raise money to build a tomb.

Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair and paint the Town Hall, and how much.

Art. 34—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase a road machine.

Art. 35—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.

Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund orders.

Art. 37—To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay overdrafts as shown in town reports.

Art. 38—To see what sum of money the town will vote to accept from the estate of the late Henry Watson for the purpose of taking over and assuming perpetual care of the cemetery in the north part of the town.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to have the fire hose, belonging to the town stored at some place where it will be available in case of fire.

Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to remove the tree in the cemetery near the Trafton lot.

Art. 41—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to blow the ledge and make a fill by the Frank Stevens place.

Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to raise money to buy a cook stove for the town hall, and how much.

Art. 43—To see if the town will vote to raise money to cut down hill in front of Wilbur Tracy's, and how much.

Art. 44—To see if the town will vote to raise money to buy a piece of land to enlarge the playground at the village school.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1920

Members of the School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of St. Albans I make my report for the year just ended.

Strong emphasis has been laid upon the common branches this year, especially Spelling and Penmanship. The Thorndike Standard Spelling Tests were given in the schools during the fall term and the pupils, as in Hartland and Palmyra, were found to average about two grades below the Standard. These tests will serve as a basis for improved work in Spelling.

All the teachers attended a two day Institute on the teaching of the Palmer Method of Business writing, under the instruction of an expert. This method was introduced into the schools six years ago, and is now used quite generally thruout the state, but our teachers were not sufficiently acquainted with the system to be able to teach it effectively. A great improvement has taken place since the Institute in October.

The State Course of Study, which has been in preparation for several years was issued to the schools last summer, we have complied with its requirements as far as possible with our present text books and equipment.

The present year is the Centennial of Maine's Statehood. With this in mind, every school has devoted a period each week to the History and Geography of Maine. We plan to continue this work as familiarity with one's state is as practical as any work in History or Geography.

Pupils, teachers and parents have co-operated in the giving of entertainments at nearly every school which has resulted in the purchase of many desirable additions to the school property such as clocks, Victrolas, etc. This is a long step in a good direction.

The Pond Road school house was remodelled during the summer and now is a modern school building in most respects. Single seats from the Lucas School replaced the old double seats and for these and other reasons a fine grade of work has been done at this school.

Sheet iron jackets have been placed about the two box stoves at the Village School. Already the investment has

brought comfort in cold weather and a saving in fuel. After many experiments, it seems that the problem of heating this building has been solved.

At the very beginning of the present year several families settled on farms remote from any school which made necessary the expenditure of more than two hundred dollars for conveyance during the year that we had not planned for in our budget at Town Meeting. This amount, combined with the conveyance usually paid, would have made our account seriously overdrawn but for money from the Equalization Fund.

The outlook for teachers for next year is very serious. Teachers are still leaving the profession steadily. Miss Florence Hale, State Agent for Rural Schools, told the Grange Lecturers recently assembled in Convention that there are 80 schools in the state closed for lack of teachers and, which is fully as significant, that 80 more ought to be closed because of incompetent teachers. The only solution is a wage scale sufficiently high to keep teachers from going into other work. This places a heavy burden upon the towns but it must be met if we are to have any schools worthy of the name. A Federal appropriation must save the schools from disaster.

A prosperous and progressive community like ours should school its children for more than the required minimum of 30 weeks. The appropriation which we ask for Common Schools means a considerable increase over last year's amount yet it does not seem best to plan for more than the 30 weeks. If our conveyance bill should decrease or if we should receive a larger amount from the State, we shall hope to use it to increase the school year.

We plan to make only the most necessary repairs next year. The increased cost of books and supplies necessitates more money in these departments.

The total per capita cost of schooling the 135 pupils in common schools this year has been \$41. The school dollar has been divided as follows this year: Teachers, 46 cents; janitors, 2 cents; fuel, 3 cents; conveyance, 17 cents; books, 2 cents; repairs, 12 cents; supplies, 2 cents; High School Tuition, 14 cents; grade school tuition, 2 cents.

I wish to express at this time my appreciation of the courtesy and cooperation of the School Committee and citizens of St. Albans.

Report of the Superintending School Committee

We, having acted as members of your Superintending School Committee herewith submit our report of the expenditures of the past year also such other recommendations and information as we think should be of interest to the voters of the town and for the improvement of our schools and school buildings.

On June 8th was held a meeting of the Hartland, St. Albans and Palmyra School Committee at which H. B. Clifford was unanimously elected as Superintendent for one year from July 1, 1919 to June 30, 1920.

The purchase of school supplies and text books was left in the hands of the Superintendent the same as in previous years.

SCHOOLS

Seven schools have been maintained in the past year. Each of the schools for 30 weeks. The attendance has been above the legal number of eight in all of these schools.

TRANSPORTATION

The committee and superintendent have worked together to procure transportation as reasonable as possible consistant for the good of the pupils.

Pupils have been conveyed from Lang to Five Corners; from Tracy to Village and Pond; from Merrill to Magoon; from Lyford to Hopkins; from Mountain to Mainstream, also some other small arrangements that were made to what we considered to the best advantage of the town.

REPAIRS OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The Pond schoolhouse and out buildings have been thoroughly repaired this past year, under the direction of H. A. Allen, State Inspector of School Buildings, and are now in condition to serve as a model for other school buildings. They are arranged along the same lines as the Magoon and we consider them as convenient and sanitary as it is possible to make them.

There have been installed in the Village schoolhouse two jackets, one around each stove. After having much trouble as there has been in the past with the heating of this building it has been a gratification to us to note that these jackets gave very satisfactory results this past winter. There has also been a jacket partly installed at the Pond schoolhouse which we wish to be completed this coming year.

The school board has examined every schoolhouse in town and some of them need immediate repairs. The Lucas and Chambers need shingling and the Tracy needs a new sill and some minor repairs. We have the shingles bought for the Lucas and Chambers which explains the overdraft in our account.

These estimates were made after we carefully considered the school situation and requirements for the coming year.

With prices where they are now we do not recommend the remodeling of another schoolhouse this coming year.

Even though we are sure that the Pond school buildings were repaired as cheaply as was consistent with good labor and material yet we feel that it will be for the best interests of the town to adopt the article in the warrant in regard to the purchase of land for the Village school rather than to remodel another school building this year.

We have used our best efforts to carry on the school work

as cheaply as possible with the best results of the pupils and town's people in mind.

We feel that we have been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Clifford as superintendent and we trust that he has met with the approval of the town.

We have tried to make the school year a success from an educational and financial stand point and sincerely hope that it has been satisfactory.

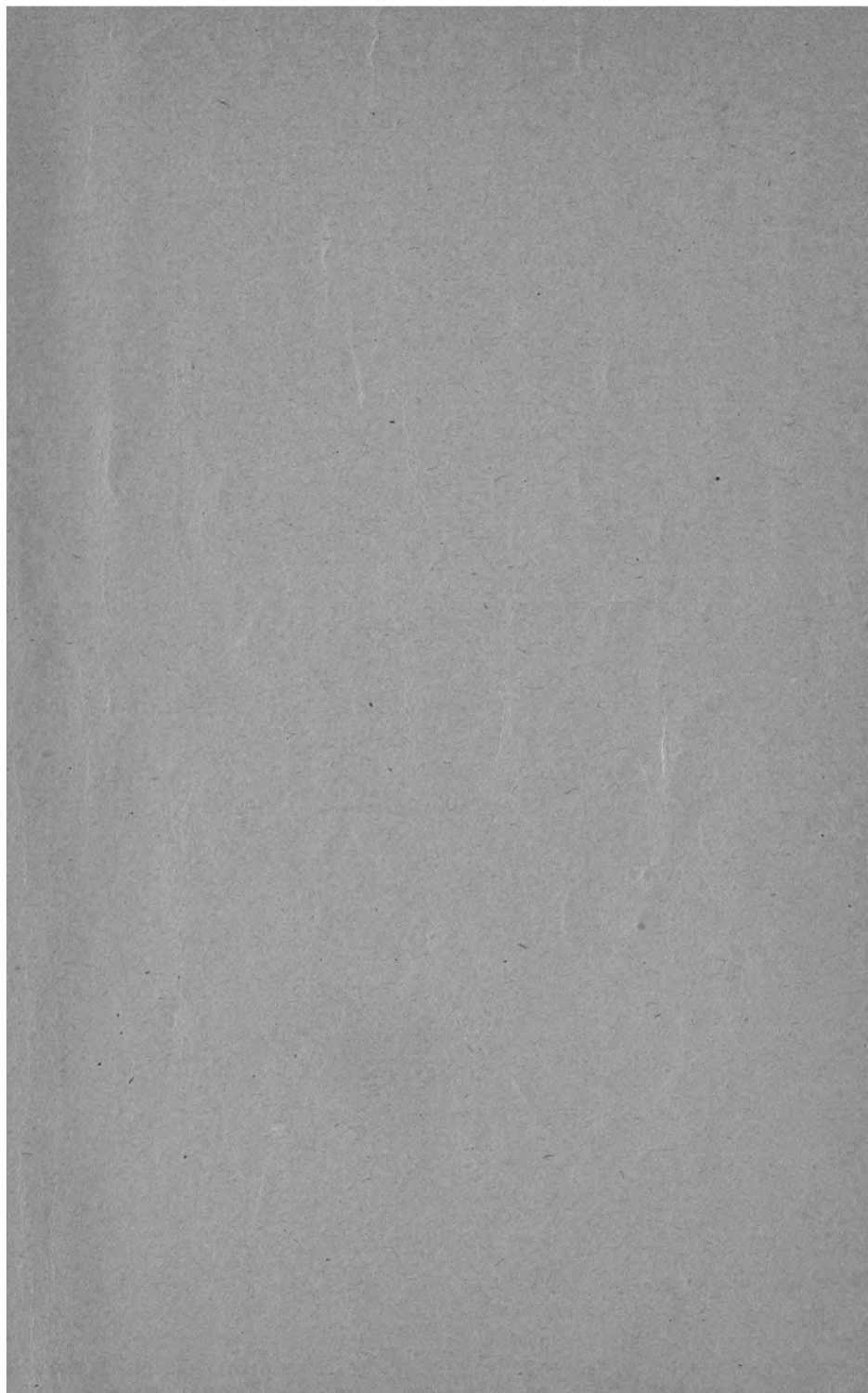
