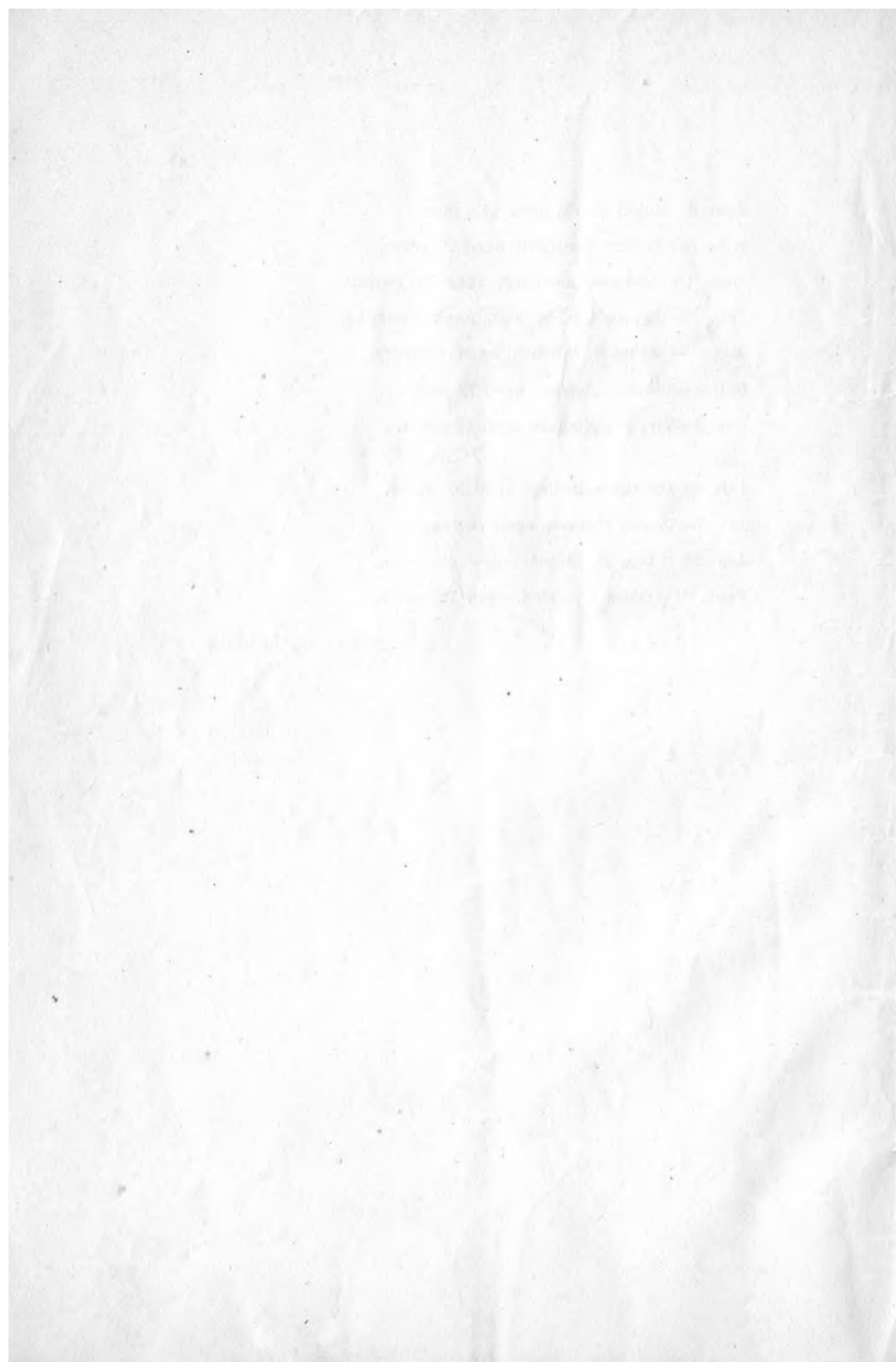

STATE OF MAINE

To Geo. A. Libby, Constable, Town of St. Albans. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans, qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1921, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1.—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2.—To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3.—To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

Art. 4.—To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5.—To choose a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6.—To choose a Collector of Taxes, and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of the same.

Art. 7.—To choose a superintending school committee.

Art. 8.—To choose a Town Agent.

Art. 9.—To choose a Road Commissioner.

Art. 10.—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 11.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Art. 12.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay tuition of scholars of standard grade out of town.

Art. 13.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of school buildings and the purchase of school supplies.

Art. 14.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of test books and repairs to same.

Art. 15.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for bridges.

Art. 16.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and build roads in summer.

Art. 17.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to break down snow and what method they will adopt in relation to same.

Art. 18.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for board fences.

Art. 19.—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to enable the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25 of R. S. 1916.

Art. 20.—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the R. S. of 1916.

Art. 21.—To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of sections 9 and 18, Chapter 130 of the P. L. of 1913.

Art. 22.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Town Charges and Town Poor.

Art. 23.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial services.

Art. 24.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights.

Art. 25.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under Chapter 84, Section 11, of the P. L. of 1911 relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. 26.—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money, not exceeding \$1000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 27.—To see if the town will authorize the school committee to employ a school physician, and raise money for same.

Art. 28.—To see if the town will authorize the school committee to contract for tuition of scholars of standard grades as provided in section 84, Chapter 16 of the P. L. of 1915.

Art. 29.—To see if the town will vote to raise money to build road drags.

Art. 30.—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as proposed by the Municipal officers.

Art. 31.—To see if the town will vote to paint the Town Hall, and raise money for same, and how much.

Art. 32.—To see if the town will vote to raise \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay the interest on School fund orders.

Art. 33.—To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay overdrafts as shown in town report.

Art. 34.—To see if the town will vote to have the real estate in town revalued, by some person or persons acting together with the assessors of the town, and raise money to pay for same.

Art. 35.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a school improvement fund to put with \$90.00 already raise by the school.

Art. 36.—To see if the town will vote to raise \$300.00 for repairs to church.

Art. 37.—To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the care of cemeteries in town.

Art. 38.—To see if the town will vote to open the Merrill school.

Art. 39.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs to the Atwood swamps.

Art. 40.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair road west of William Magoon's.

Art. 41.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for erecting, painting, and repairing guide boards throughout the town.

Art. 42.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to accept from the estate of the late Henry Watson for the purpose of taking over and assuming perpetual care of the cemetery in the north part of the town.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall at 8 o'clock A. M. on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1921

Members of the School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of St. Albans, I make my fourth annual report.

In spite of disappointment at a 31- instead of a 32-weeks year, the present school year has been the most satisfactory of any during which I have directed the schools. This has been due to one thing, the quality of the teachers. At town meeting you voted a common school fund which provided for good teachers. Contrary to original plans, we placed better teachers in the smaller schools thus increasing the expense with a big gain in efficiency. The school work done this year is indicative of what will be accomplished when the task of educating our boys and girls shall be generally considered not as a job for any 18 year old girl with a high school diploma, but as a profession for our finest young people to aim for. Thus will be brought to the schoolroom a matured mind and character, prepared for the great work of training children for the tasks of their own livelihood and for intelligent, unselfish citizenship.

Better results have been obtained in the fundamental studies which will always be the back bone of the school course. The standard tests in writing and spelling given in June showed a marked gain in efficiency over the results obtained previously. A study which will receive added attention henceforth is Physical Education in which we attempt to instruct the pupils in personal and community hygiene and health. Anyone acquainted with the school physician's report will observe great need of such work. The extra week added to the school year will be used not in teaching new material but in reviewing important facts, a very great need in our schools. Strengthening of the pupil's character has resulted from a firmer and more just discipline. This is not to be wondered at when one knows that the average experience of our teachers is ten years each. They are mature, sensible women rather than young girls. The work of Mrs. Carrie Tracy of the Magoon school, who has done the

helping teacher work, initiated by State Supt. Thomas, has been of great assistance.

I have dwelt at some length upon the subject of teachers for this matter is more important to your children than all other school matters combined.

One new feature of the school work, begun a year ago and deserving special mention is the warm dish served at noon in all the schools. This has meant a great deal to the child coming to school from a distance with nothing warm to eat from morning till night. Parents, teachers and older pupils have co-operated in making this a success. Schools have continued to add to their resources from entertainment funds. Library material, pictures and equipment for the noon lunch have predominated. Owing to good weather and general good health, school attendance has been better than usual, this year.

The outlook for next year for those who wish to raise less school money and yet have as good schools is not encouraging. One idea must be sacrificed to the other. Either we raise less money than last year for poorer school or we raise an equal or greater amount for as good or better schools. A glance at the itemized cost below will show that conveyance and teachers make up nearly three-fourths of the total school cost. In no case can we maintain a school in a district at less cost than conveyance. Unless we compel children now riding to walk to school, we are not likely to meet with material reduction in conveyance costs.

Two factors, demand and supply, will keep wages of good teachers where they are or will raise them higher. Whether or not there is a demand for potatoes or for mill labor, there is a demand in Maine for 6000 teachers each year and many are coming to place the word "good" before the word "teacher." In spite of unemployment in the labor market there were Rural schools in Maine that could not find teachers as late as November and many schools have teachers below standard. There will not be nearly enough good teachers available next fall, which will keep wages up. There will probably be many eighteen year old high school girls wanting to teach next fall for those communities who wish them.

In view of the business depression, the school authorities plan to undertake only the most needed repairs this coming year.

The total per capita cost of schooling the 135 pupils in com-

mon school this year was \$46. The school dollar was divided as follows: teachers 53 cents; fuel 3, janitors 2, conveyance 18, tuition 2, books 2, supplies 2, repairs 3, high school 15 cents.

I wish to express my appreciation of the courtesy and co-operation of the school committee and citizens of St. Albans.

To the Citizens of St. Albans:

At a meeting of the Hartland, Palmyra and St. Albans school committee last June H. B. Clifford was elected superintendent of schools for the year ending June 30, 1921.

The school committee of St. Albans delegated to the superintendent the purchase of text books and supplies as in previous years.

SCHOOLS

Seven schools of thirty-one weeks each have been maintained. Also we have had two terms of six weeks each in the Tracy district.

TRANSPORTATION

Pupils have been transported from Lang to Five Corners; from Tracy to Village, a part of the time; from Mountain to Mainstream, and from Merrill to Magoon. Also some other small arrangements that seemed for the best good of the town.

REPAIRS OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The Lucas and Chambers schoolhouses have been shingled. Absolutely necessary repairs have been made on the house and shed in the Tracy district, and small repairs in other places. Our jacketed stoves are the same as last year, in the village and Pond road districts. We wish to install jackets in each of the remaining houses this coming year.
