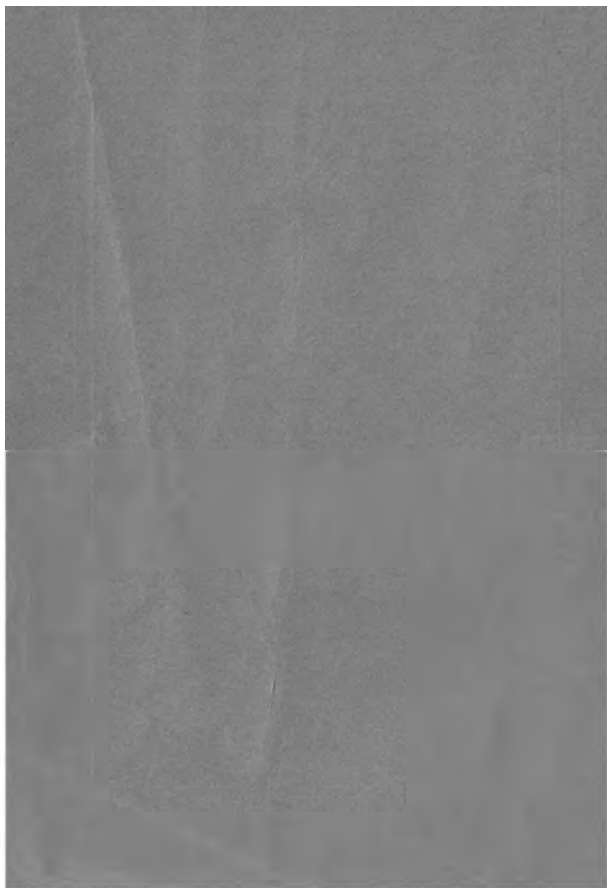

# TOWN WARRANT

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Herbert M. Foss, Constable, Town of St. Albans. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town hall in said town on Monday, the 14th day of March, A. D. 1927, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. No. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. No. 2. To choose a town clerk.

Art. No. 3. To hear reports of town officers and act thereon.

Art. No. 4. To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Art. No. 5. To choose a town treasurer.

Art. No. 6. To choose a collector of taxes, and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of same.

Art. No. 7. To choose a superintending school committee.

Art. No. 8. To choose a road commissioner, and fix his compensation.

Art. No. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. No. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

Art. No. 11 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings.

Art. No. 12. To see if the town will authorize the school committee to employ a school physician, and raise money for same.

Art. No. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to contract for tuition of scholars of standard grade, as provided in Sec. 84, Chap. 16, of the P. L. of 1915.

Art. No. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund order.

Art. No. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay school superintendent's salary.

Art. No. 16. To see if the town will vote to pay the school committee for services rendered.

Art. No. 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school board to open the Lyford school if necessary.

Art. No. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 to purchase a school yard at the Lang school, and raise money to fence same.

Art. No. 19. To see if the town will vote to accept a piece of land from Lewis Schillingger to be used as a school yard, and raise money to fence same.

Art. No. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what amount to fence and grade the school yard at the village school.

Art. No. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what amount to repair the Five Corners school.

Art. No. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what amount to build a shed at the Brick school.

Art. No. 23. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 29, Chap. 25, of the R. S. of 1916.

Art. No. 24. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chap. 25, Sec. 18, of the R. S. of 1916.

Art. No. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and build roads in summer.

Art. No. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of winter roads.

Art. No. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build and repair bridges.

Art. No. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for hoard fences.

Art. No. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under Chap. 84, Sec. 11, of the P. L. of 1911, relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. No. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for patrol maintenance, for the ensuing year.



Art. No. 31. To see if the town will vote to buy a truck, and raise money for same.

Art. No. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges, and town poor.

Art. No. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for memorial services.

Art. No. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights.

Art. No. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire a sum of money not exceeding \$2,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Art. No. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay over-drafts as shown in town reports.

Art. No. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00, the same to be used together with any monies that may be paid to the town as cemetery trust funds, to buy bonds as required by law.

Art. No. 38. To see what action the town will vote to take regarding the letting of the town hall for dances during the summer months of 1927.

Art. No. 39. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Jesse S. Boston, for the perpetual care of his lot in the Village Cemetery.

Art. No. 40. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school committee to open the Chambers school if necessary.

Art. No. 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the findings of the selectmen regarding the widening and straightening of the road from Merrill's Corner to Five Corners, making this road four rods wide from Merrill's Corner to a point near Edgar Crocker's residence.

Art. No. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on town debt.

Art. No. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise \$50.00 to pay Verne A. Merrill for horse.

Art. No. 43. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the fence around Sleeper Cemetery.

Art. No. 44. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to fence the Mountain Cemetery.

Art. No. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 to repair the road from A. L. Martin's to the Hartland-St. Albans road.

Art. No. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 to repair the road from M. T. Bubar's to Johnson's corner.

Art. No. 47. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a day as "Clean-up Day."

Art. No. 48. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to buy a fire-proof cabinet for the town records.

Art. No. 49. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 154 of the P. L. of 1917, as amended by Chap. 157 of the P. L. of 1919;

for the construction of a State Aid highway, beginning at the Palmyra-St. Albans town line, and extending through St. Albans village, West Ripley, and Cambridge village to the Cambridge-Wellington town line, on the Burdin Corner road.

Art. No. 50. To act on any other matter not relating to the raising of money, that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at their office at nine o'clock a. m. on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

St. Albans, Maine, Feb. 24, 1927.

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the town of St. Albans:

I submit to you my second annual report on your schools. Nine teaching positions were opened in the fall with teachers and enrollment as follows:

Village Upper Grades—Gertrude H. Mersereau, with 19 pupils.

Village Lower Grades—Alice M. Elliott, with 35 pupils.

Merrill—Viola M. MacLaren, with 26 pupils.

Pond Road—Irene I. Hall, with 25 pupils.

Hopkins—Frederica S. Lanphier, with 31 pupils.

Five Corners—Jennie M. Burns, with 27 pupils.

Lang—Mildred E. Turner, with 14 pupils.

Tracy—Marjorie M. Young, with 7 pupils.

Brick—Ada L. Cyr, with 15 pupils.

The school census corrected to April 1, 1926, found 339 children from 5 to 20 years of age, inclusive. Of these 199 are enrolled in the above schools; 6 are in Hartland elementary schools; 2 in Dexter high; 1 in Old Town high; 2 in Corinna Academy and 24 in Hartland Academy.

That so many are taking the secondary school work is very gratifying, because all departments of human endeavor are demanding people who are well equipped physically and intellectually.

## ATTENDANCE

The attendance, on the whole, has been fairly good. But we regret that in a few instances there is a tendency to keep the older boys at home to work. While such conditions exist we cannot make the advancement that we should, and harmful results are sure to be felt in years to come.

#### CONVEYANCE

Mr. Leland Randall and Mr. Howard Sinclair convey to the Hopkins school; Mr. J. L. Nichols to Five Corners; Mr. John Parker to the Brick, and Mr. L. B. Neal to the Village.

Mr. Randall, Mr. Nichols and Mr. Neal are paid \$10.00; Mr. Parker \$8.00, and Mr. Sinclair \$7.00 a week.

#### JANITOR WORK

The teachers take charge of the janitor work, for which, in the outside schools 50c a week is allowed in the spring and fall, and 75c a week in the winter.

The pay in the village is \$2.00 a week in the spring and fall, and \$3.00 in the winter.

#### BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

Books and other supplies have been furnished as required. All schools are well supplied. New books and material will be added as needed.

#### REPAIRS

The Lang and Hopkins schoolhouses have been remodeled to conform to State requirements. The report of the superintending school committee will give the details of the work.

Chemical toilets have been installed in the village schools, and are proving very satisfactory.

The citizens in the neighborhood of the Five Corners school gratuitously moved the schoolhouse to higher ground. The land upon which it now sets and enough for a good playground was given to the town for this purpose by Mr. Soucie. We greatly appreciate his kindness and generosity.

We say "gratuitously" because the people of the neighborhood who helped to do the work charged nothing for their services. There was some other expense to the town, though not large.

It is recommended that this schoolhouse be remodeled this year.

Only minor repairs have been made on the other schools.

### MEDICAL INSPECTION

What was said under this head last year is so pertinent to the subject that it will bear repeating. The town is fortunate in having a man like Dr. Moulton who is willing to devote so much time to this phase of our school work, and it will be productive of valuable results in proportion to the action taken by the parents to correct the defects, and treat the cases, of which he warns them. Neglect on their part to follow his advice may result, in some instances, in a life of illness and sorrow.

The usual program of physical culture and health hygiene is being carried out.

### MUSIC, DRAWING AND ART

No special program is being carried out along these lines, but each teacher is working according to her own inclination and ability. A definite course in instruction in music will be undertaken next term.

### DISTRICT NURSE

The need of a nurse in this union has not been so apparent this year as it was last year, though there is a lot of work that a nurse might do.

A nurse in no way takes the place of a physician, but her work is correlative or supplementary to his.

### CONCLUSION

Our teachers have been very faithful and painstaking in their work, and the children in most cases, have made about the advancement that could be expected.

We were unfortunate in being obliged to change teachers in three of our schools at the close of the fall term. Mrs. Burns, an excellent teacher, felt that she could not continue longer. Miss Bedell came to take her place, but after four days work she decided she could not remain longer. We then secured Mrs. Parker, who has always proven herself to be a very suc-

cessful teacher. At this writing she is still with us and we expect she will continue through the year.

At the close of the fifteen weeks' term in the Hopkins school, Miss Lanphier decided she could remain no longer; and after many inquiries and considerable correspondence about teachers, Mrs. Dyer who was having a winter vacation from her school in Arnostook county, was secured for the school. She remained about five weeks and then resigned.

Miss Lanphier has decided to come back and will open the school February 28th.

Miss Ilene I. Hall, of Bangor, had charge of the Pond Road school during the fall term, but did not come back, and Miss Doris M. Mattatall took her place.

The other schools are moving along regularly and profitably.

In conclusion I thank the superintending school committee, the citizens, the teachers, and the children, for the sympathetic support which they have given me.

### CONVEYANCE

Nine schools have been maintained. Pupils were conveyed from the Magoon to the Village school, from the Lucas to the Brick, from Chambers to Five Corners. There have been two teams conveying to the Hopkins and the Baird children were carried to Hartland.

### REPAIRS

Chemical toilets were installed and minor repairs made at the Village school. The Hopkins and Lang schoolhouses were thoroughly repaired.

For this year, following the program to meet State requirements, we recommend repairing the Five Corners school and building a new shed at the Brick.

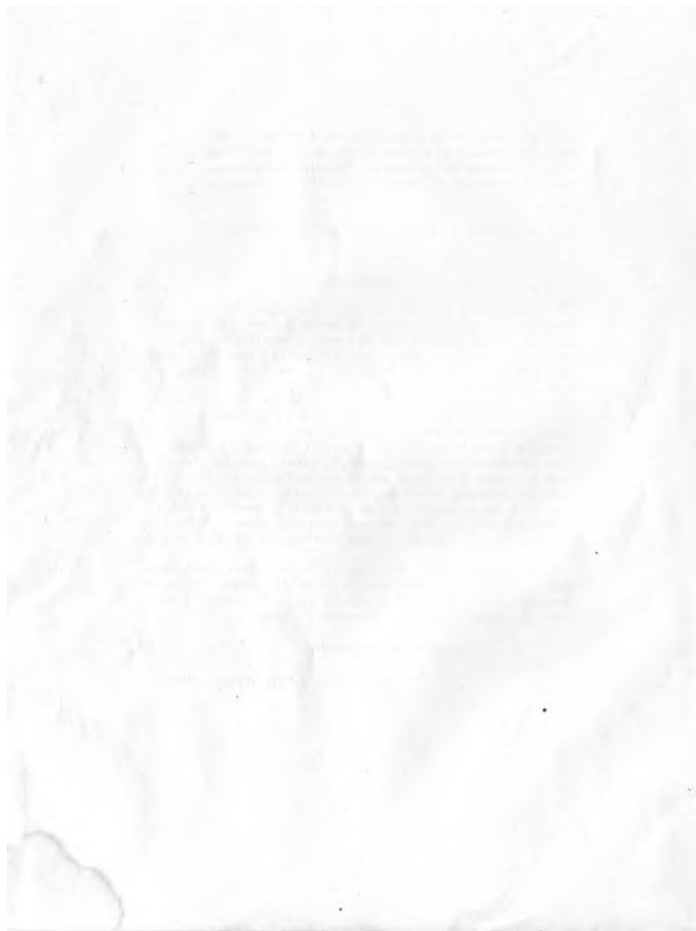

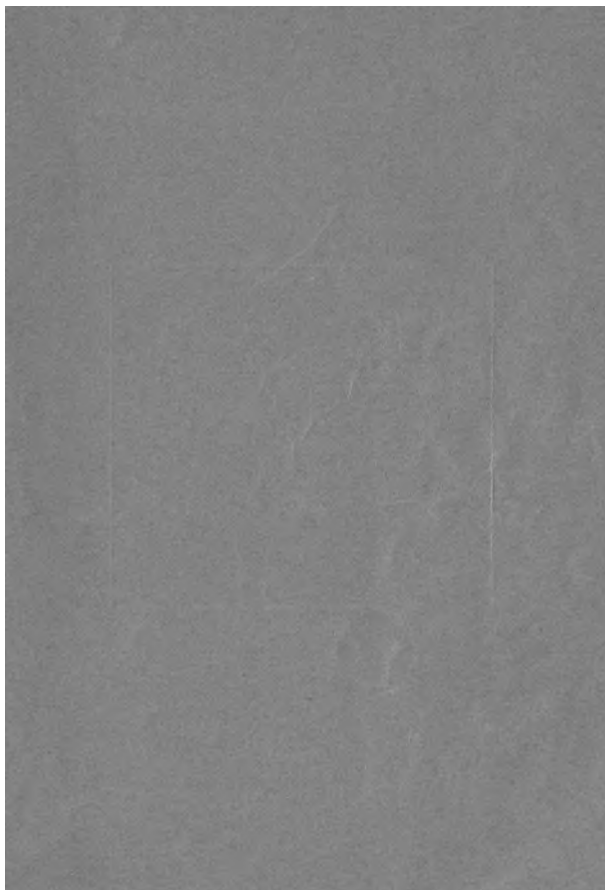
