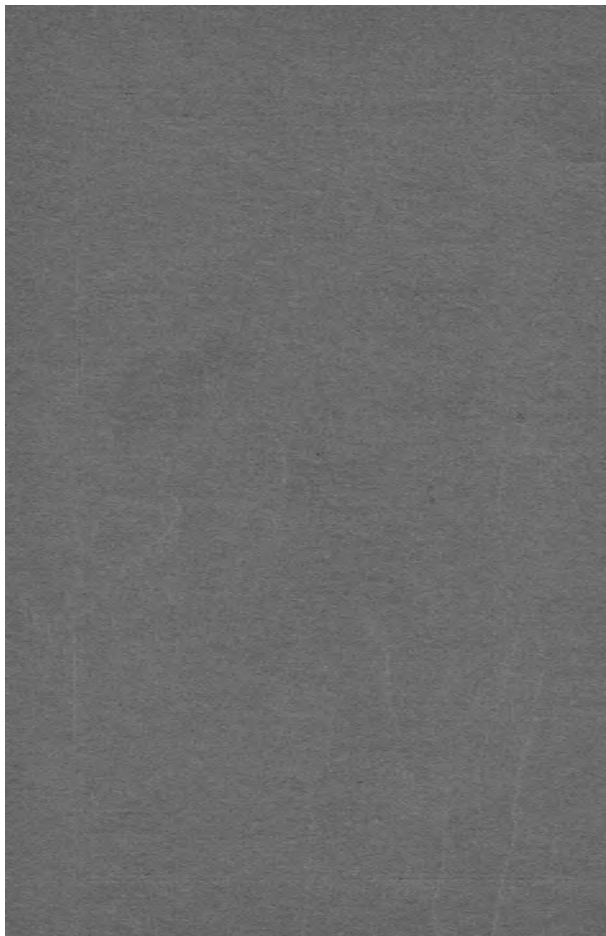

STATE OF MAINE

To H. M. Foss, Constable, Town of St. Albans. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans qualified to vote on town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 9th, A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and act on same.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
- Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a collector of taxes, and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of same.
- Art. 7. To choose a superintending school committee.
- Art. 8. To choose a road commissioner, and fix his compensation.
- Art. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition and

board of pupils, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician, and raise money for the same.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund order.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay school superintendent's salary.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to unite with the towns of Hartland and Palmyra to employ a music teacher for the three towns, and raise money for same.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to close the Tracy school indefinitely.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges and town poor accounts.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial services.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair roads in summer.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to care for roads in winter.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and construct bridges.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and construct snow fences.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be expended for repairs on Rand Hill (so-called) or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be expended for repairs on hill near A. P. Lewis', or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be expended on repairs to Town Hall, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be expended for repairs to The Union Church, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to purchase the land near the Tannery school-house, containing five or six acres, and raise money for same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended on V. H. Bragg hill, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to repair the village cemetery fence, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what amount to build a sidewalk in front of the Post Office, or act on anything relating thereto.



Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise money for a street light near David Grant's, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote "YES" or "NO" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Sec. 29, Chapter 25, of the R. S. of 1916.

Art. 34. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of (\$533.00) for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 25, Sec. 18, of the R. S. of 1916.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under the three town act to build on road beginning at Corinna town line, near Brawn's corner, and extending in a westerly direction to St. Albans village, thence south over Mill Hill to the corner near Alexander Foster's residence in Palmyra village, thence east over route No. 2 to the corner near the church, thence north to Sanborn's corner, thence east to Marsh's corner, thence south to Newport over Stewart Hill continuing along route No. 104, hence route No. 2 to Hasty's corner so-called, thence in a westerly direction to Plymouth town line.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$875.00 for Third Class highway maintenance, to enable the town to receive Third Class money from the State.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for patrol maintenance for the ensuing year.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under Chap. 84, Sec. 11 of the P. L. of 1911, relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay overdrafts as shown in town reports.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to give the school committee authority to move the Tracy schoolhouse shed to the Merrill school, if they so desire.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what amount, to be applied to town debt.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what amount, for a "public health nurse".

Art. 45. To act on any other matter or matters not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at their office at 9 o'clock A. M. on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of St. Albans, the following is a report of your schools for the Municipal year 1930-31:

The school census last April was 329, 162 boys and 167 girls. Of this number 190 were enrolled in the elementary schools of the town at the beginning of the school year. With 2 elementary pupils attending Corinna, 16 Hartland, and 3 Mainstream, schools, we have a total of 211. The high school students are distributed as follows: 3 Dexter, 24 Hartland Academy, 2 Newport High, 1 Higgins Classical Institute, and 1 Maine Central Institute. A total of 31, making a total of 242 elementary and secondary pupils. A slight increase over last year.

An epidemic of measles in several of the schools interfered with the progress of the work during the last of the fall and beginning of the winter terms. At the present time attendance is very good and the grade of work being done is very satisfactory. During the past year teachers and parents have been very cooperative, which adds to the success of any school system. We are still introducing the plan of supervised study and find that in the upper grades, it has many advantages over the old system. With the new State Course of Study, that is to be ready next September, we hope to have a better and more regulated plan of work for next year.

## MUSIC

With the roads in such splendid condition this winter, music has made the best progress since its introduction in our schools. Our boys and girls have had very little difficulty in carrying on their music after entering high school. The number of school unions teaching music in their schools is increasing rapidly each year.

#### JANITORS

Janitors have been paid the same wages as last year. Village, \$2 per week, fall and spring, and \$3, winter. Outside schools, \$0.50, fall and spring, and \$0.75, winter.

#### BOOKS

Arithmetics have been bought for the six upper grades. Geographies have been bought for part of the schools, and the others will be supplied as soon as necessary. I recommend that a change in English books be made next year.

All necessary supplies have been furnished.

#### FUEL

40 cords of wood have been bought for the schools at \$6, and \$6.50 delivered to the buildings. \$7.25 and \$7.75 sawed and put into sheds.

#### TUITION

Common school tuition to Corinna, Harmony and Hartland has been paid for the first half of this year.

High school tuition for the first half of the year has been paid to Dexter, Hartland and Newport. Maine Central Institute for the fall term. Higgins Classical Institute for the fall and winter terms of this year.

#### SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

Dr. Moulton's yearly examination and inspection of our school children brings out many conditions unknown to parents, and in this way many boys and girls receive medical aid before these unknown conditions become serious. The number of Six and Seven Point children is increasing from year to year.

#### REPAIRS

A new platform was built at the Five Corners at a cost of \$40.60 and the Lang schoolhouse painted inside at a cost of \$44.75. Repairs were made on the Pond road schoolhouse



chimney, the cost being about \$15. There is a balance in the repairs account large enough to meet the cost of painting and repairing the Merrill schoolhouse. I recommend that a new stove or furnace be bought for the Village schoolhouse, and that part of the Hopkins and Merrill schoolhouse yards be graveled.

My work this year, with the S. S. Committee, teachers, pupils and parents has been most enjoyable, and I wish to thank all for the splendid cooperation which has been given to the schools, teachers and myself.

# Report of the Superintending School Committee

---

To the Citizens of the Town of St. Albans:

We herewith submit our report for the municipal year 1930-31.

Eight schools have been maintained for the year. Five have completed a 34 week year. The Hopkins and Brick each, have one week and the Lang two weeks to complete 34 weeks for this municipal year. A very high grade of work is being done in our schools, and with music, in which the pupils are making very good progress, we feel that our school system compares favorably with other towns of the State.

We are pleased to report that all school accounts show a substantial balance.

## REPAIRS

The Lang schoolhouse was painted inside at a cost of \$44.75. A platform was built at the Five Corners at a cost of \$40.60.

The balance of the amount expended has been for minor repairs. It was intended to paint the Merrill schoolhouse inside and out, but owing to the sickness of Mr. Shibles, the work was not carried out as planned. There is a balance in the repairs account large enough to complete this work.

Desks were bought for the sub-primary and first grade pupils at the Village. The money for them was given by the State.

The following is an estimate of the School Budget for the municipal year 1931-32:

At the beginning of the school year, when these records are made, there were no skin diseases found, but later in the fall there seemed to develop some cases of impetigo (a contagious skin disease). Many were excluded from school for treatment.

An extensive epidemic of measles was prevalent during the fall term. Nearly all susceptible pupils were ill with this disease, otherwise, absences on account of ill health were about normal.

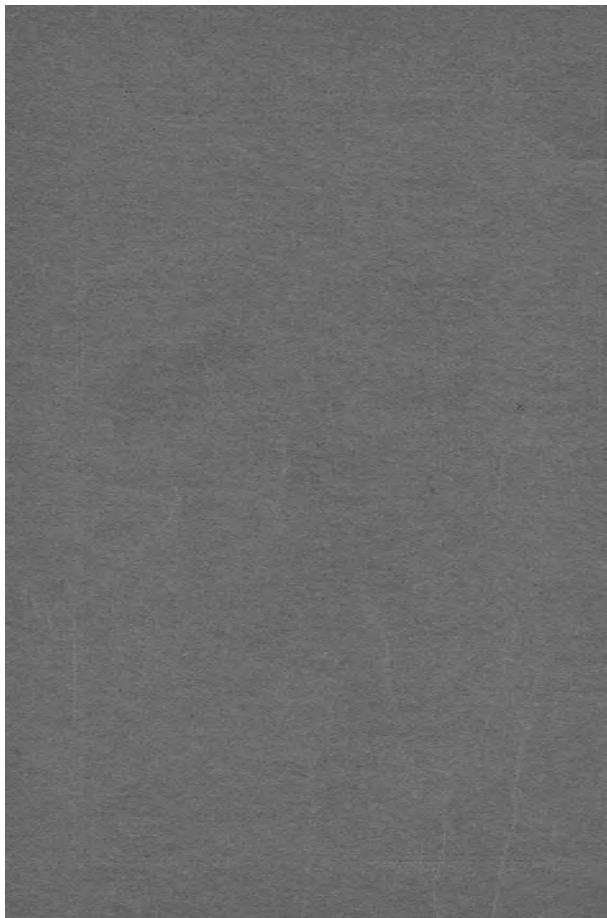
