STATE OF MAINE

To H. M. Foss, Constable, Town of St. Albans Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of St. Albans qualified to vote on town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 14th, A. D. 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and act on same.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
- Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a collector of taxes, and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of same.
- Art. 7. To choose a superintending school committee.
- Art. 8. To choose a road commissioner, and fix his compensation.
- Art. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician, and raise money for the same.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund order.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay school superintendent's salary.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges and town poor accounts.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial services.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair roads in summer.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to care for roads in winter.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and construct bridges.

Art. 20. To see what amount per day the town will vote to pay for labor on roads the coming year.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to deduct a certain percentage of money earned by persons working for the town, same to be applied to the payment of taxes.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract for plowing the improved roads during winter, for a term of years, if the selectmen consider it will be to the advantage of the town to do so.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair and construct snow fences.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote "YES" or "NO" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Sec. 20, Chapter 28 of the R. S. of 1930.

Art. 25. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways,

highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28 of the R. S. of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28 of the R. S. 1930.

Art. 26. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$678.00 for Third Class highway maintenance, to enable the town to receive Third Class money from the State.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for patrol maintenance for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under Chapter 84, Sec. 11 of the P. L. of 1911 relating to trees and shrubs.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$150.00. The State will add fifty per cent of the sum raised to same. The Federal Government will furnish gratis a trained man for supervising the work. All agencies cooperating for the purpose of controlling the White Pine Blister Rust, a fungus disease fast becoming seriously established within the pine areas in the town.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to screen the upper dam.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay overdrafts as shown in the town report.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what amount to be applied to town debt.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what amount for a public health nurse.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended to gravel the Rand Hill (so-called) or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise money for two street lights near the Baird Bridge or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 40. To act on any other matter or matters not relating to raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at their office at 9 A. M. on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of St. Albans, the following is a report of your schools for the Municipal year 1931-32:

The school census last April was 328. Of this number 199 are attending the town schools, 14 Hartland, 3 Harmony and 2 Corinna. There are 30 students attending Hartland Academy, 2 Newport H. S., and one each to Corinna Academy, Dexter H. S., Waterville H. S., and Higgins Classical Institute, making a total of 254 elementary and secondary pupils.

Although the school account has a balance sufficient to complete a year of 34 weeks, the S. S. Committee felt, that by making this year 32 weeks, would save a drastic cut for the year 1932-33. The S. S. Committee are to be commended on the thorough checking of accounts and their decision to save in the costs of school maintenance. To cut the amounts of appropriations recommended by your S. S. Committee would be taking a step downward in the efficiency of your school system. The bill for H. S. tuition has been steadily increasing and will be over \$3,000 for the year 1932-33. The maximum amount from the State for H. S. support is \$700.

Satisfactory progress has been made in our school work during the past year. The Anna D. Cordts method of reading is being used in the beginning grade with much satisfaction. The New State Course of Study, which we consider a great help to superintendents and teachers, is being followed very closely. This is making a very hard, but interesting year's work for the teachers.

Music has been continued in four of the schools through outside funds. This shows a fine community spirit and the desire of the parents, that their children shall have the benefits and enjoyment derived from a musical education.

Reading for the Sub-Primary has been bought and geographies and histories necessary to carry out the State Course of Study. All necessary supplies have been furnished.

Fuel has been bought as follows: Five Corners, Hopkins and Lang, \$5.50 in shed; Village, \$4.74 delivered in cord wood; Merrill, \$5.75 in shed; Brick, \$6.00 in shed; Pond Road, \$6.25 in shed.

Common School tuition to Hartland has been paid for first half of this year. Corinna and Harmony to June, 1931. High School tuition has been paid to Dexter, Hartland and Newport for the first 18 weeks of this year. Higgins Classical Institute fall and winter terms.

There has been very little sickness in our schools with the exception of Five Corners, which has been closed twice, one week on account of whooping cough, and one week on account of flu colds. Dr. Moulton's report gives in detail the record of health of your school children.

SCHOOL REPAIRS

The repairs account has been overdrawn to the amount of \$35. The Merrill school building has been painted inside and out. Also desks have been varnished, total cost \$110. The shed was enlarged and underpinning under schoolhouse reset, at a cost of \$81.96, making a total of \$191.96 expended on Merrill schoolhouse and shed. Two stove jackets have been built for the Village, and Village Primary and Brick schoolhouse stoves exchanged, at a cost of \$44.60. The balance of the account has been for general repairs.

I certainly appreciate the cooperation that I have received from the S. S. Committee, Citizens, Parents, Teachers and Pupils during the past year. I stand ready to cooperate with your S. S. Committee to run your schools efficiently and economically, and I do feel that the careful judgment of the S. S. Committee should be given strong consideration when making your appropriations for the year 1932-33.

To the Citizens of St. Albans, Maine:

The following report of the work accomplished in your town by Miss Emma M. Robinson, R. N., your County Nurse, will be of interest to the people, and of use at town meeting.

During April three full days were spent in St. Albans. The audiometer was used in all of the schools to check up on the hearing of pupils. Other inspection was given and some home calls made at this time.

In June a special case was investigated by Miss Robinson, and a home call made on the patient in question.

Largely through the work of the nurse in stimulating interest and advising corrections of defects, 30 of St. Albans' children received Seven Point pins and certificates from the Maine Public Health Association, while 12 pupils in your town qualified as Six Point children. During the coming year it is anticipated that more boys and girls will become eligible for these awards.
