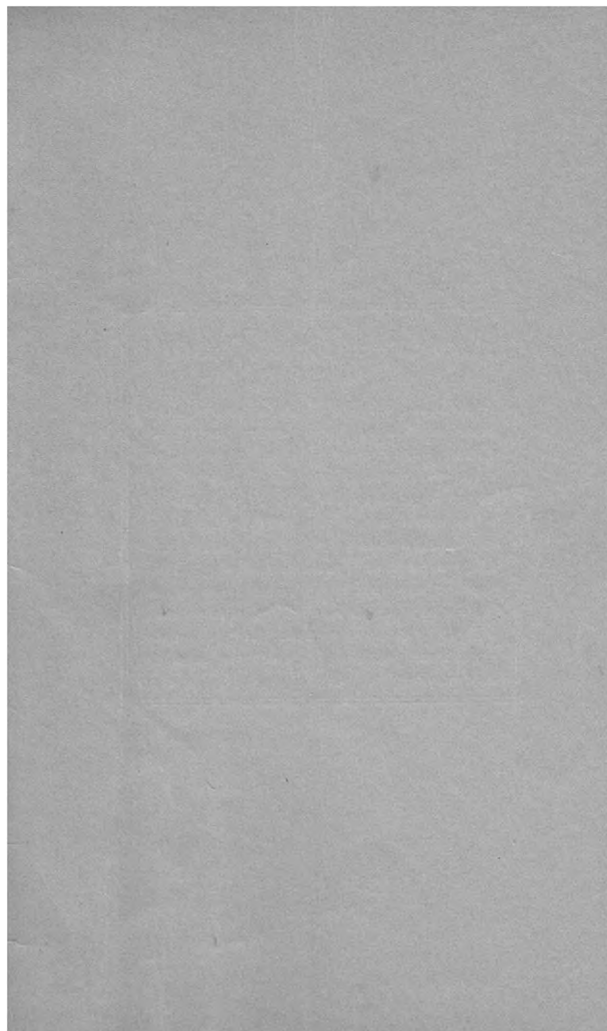

STATE OF MAINE

To Ethel Libby, Town Clerk, Town of St. Albans, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of St. Albans qualified to vote on town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 12, A. D. 1945, at ten o'clock, A. M.

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3 To hear reports of town officers and act on same.

Art. 4 To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government and instruct the Selectmen to appoint an agent and fix his duties and compensation, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 5 To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, to determine their salary and act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 6 To choose a town treasurer.

Art. 7 To choose a superintending school committee.

Art. 8 To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and act on anything relating to same.

Art. 9 To choose a collector of 1945 taxes, fix his salary or commission or act on anything relating to payment or collection of the 1945 Commitment.

Art. 10 To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 11 To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary schools including teachers, wages and board, fuel, janitor services, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, textbooks and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for secondary school tuition.

Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair of school buildings.

Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for public health nursing in St. Albans, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Art. 16 To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician and raise and appropriate money for same.

Art. 17 To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$61.40, the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund order.

Art. 18 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay salary of superintendent of schools.

Art. 19 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to retire school construction notes.

Art. 20 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to pay town charge account.

Art. 21 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest on town debt.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town poor account.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Services.

Art. 24 To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tractor, now in possession of the town together with the snow plow, spare parts and accessories from A. H. Moore for the sum of \$1,000.00 and raise money for the same or instruct the selectmen to issue a note in the name of the town on demand, and fix the rate of interest.

Art. 25 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to purchase or lease equipment for removing snow.

Art. 26 To see what method the town will adopt for snow removal, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair roads in summer.

Art. 28 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and construction of bridges.

Art. 29 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter roads.

Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$746.00 for Third Class Maintenance, the amount necessary to enable the town to receive Third money from the State.

Art. 31 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for patrol maintenance for the ensuing year.

Art. 32 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes on Third Class and State Aid Roads.

Art. 33 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street and hall lights.

Art. 34 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on town debt.

Art. 35 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for the non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 36 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Hartland Volunteer Fire Company for same services rendered as Hartland for the ensuing year.

Art. 37 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for Mothers' Aid and Dependent Children.

Art. 38 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 necessary for insurance on Town Hall.

Art. 39 To see what fund of money the town will raise and appropriate for the care of soldiers' graves.

Art. 40 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on Town Hall.

Art. 41 To see if the town will vote to maintain and care for the Honor Roll.

Art. 42 To see if the town will vote to pay the Corinna Fire Department for their services at Elmer Chambers' Fire, the sum of \$100.00.

Art. 43 To act on any other matter or matters not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office at 9:00 A. M. on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

St. Albans, Maine
February 10, 1945

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of
the Town of St. Albans:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report for your consideration.

We have had a total of 164 different pupils registered in the elementary schools this year. The attendance has been fair in spite of the fact that we have lost some time on account of poor weather. The town has employed five certified teachers three of which are new to the schools of St. Albans.

The school physician made his annual visit to the school and examined the pupils. His report is to be found in the following pages. The pupils were also given vision and hearing tests as well as the patch test for T. B. These tests were administered by the teachers and district nurse. Pupils reacting to the patch test have been taken to Fairfield for x-ray examination.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

There are about 140 elementary pupils in a small four room building at the village school. There are four teachers or a pupil teacher ratio of 35 to 1. This means that each teacher has a busy program at school from 7:45 A. M. until 4 P. M., in trying to educate these 35 live and active youngsters in the ways of life so that they may become better citizens of democracy. In order to accomplish anything in our schools there must be organization. There must be certain rules and regulations that each pupil must live up to. In the school society, much the same as in our adult society, laws or rules and regulations are the results of our own conduct. For example if we took only what fish we needed each time there wouldn't be any need for laws telling us that we can take just so many fish. But because some of us make pigs of ourselves some times, our superiors have made it unlawful to take more than a limited number of fish without some form of discipline, if we get caught breaking the law.

The child is an adult in miniature. His society is as real to

him as ours is to ourselves. He needs training and discipline to make him a better citizen in his society. This training must begin in the home at a very early age and be continued in the home until the child reaches manhood or womanhood. The schools, which have the child under their supervision six or seven hours a day for 180 days a year, must not be expected to do the entire job alone. There must be the closest cooperation between the home and the school or parent and teacher to obtain the best results. When problems arise it is the parents duty to go to the teacher and talk the problem over. Nine out of ten problems then cease to be problems any longer.

Too many times do we know only one side of the problem. When this is true we form wrong conclusions and are apt to do ourselves as well as the child a great deal of harm.

At the present time I feel that St. Albans is very fortunate in having the group of teachers that are now working with the elementary pupils. Before we as parents become to critical we should ask ourselves two questions. First, do I thoroughly understand the situation. Second, could I in the same position do a better job. If you answer yes to the first question then go to the teacher and offer constructive suggestions, otherwise just do not talk about the matter. If your answer to the second question is yes, then for the sake of education and the teaching profession make yourself available, as good teachers are always in demand.

Just a word about school lunches. This program is purely a non profit enterprise. There are two efficient cooks serving a better than average hot meal for ten cents per pupil. It is not compulsory for any pupil to eat those lunches. If the parents prefer they may provide their own pupils lunches. However, if you prefer to send your child to the lunch room, then pay the required ten cents and let the child eat what the others have. We know that the child like the adult has likes and dislikes but there are 100 pupils eating dinner in the lunch room each day. It will never be possible to serve a meal that will be liked by all 100 pupils.

SCHOOL BUS

A new thirty passenger school bus was purchased by the Committee at a cost to the town of \$3,064.40. Up to the present time \$2,000.00 of the Common School money has been paid on the bus. It is planned to pay the balance of the account out of the Common School funds this next year. The town will receive from the state each year, during the next five years, 10% depreciation of the cost of the bus or a total of \$1,532.20, which is one half of the cost of the bus.

During the present year the bus is operating on the Five Corners run and the Pond School run, thereby eliminating the Parker bus on the Five Corners and the town of Hartland bus on the Pond School run. The bus was purchased primarily for elementary use and will be used principally for that purpose. However, on the present route, it goes by the homes of a number of Secondary students. In view of this fact it was decided to allow Secondary pupils to ride, free of charge, as long as the bus did not go off its regular run to pick up Secondary students and as long as it did not inconvenience or interfere with the conveyance of the elementary pupils. Fortunately the plan seems to be working well and satisfactorily.

In future years the bus route will undoubtedly be changed as it will want to be kept running on two routes where it can be of greatest use. As the school population is constantly changing in different sections it would mean changing bus routes to meet the changes in school population.

BUDGET

There are overdrafts in three of the school accounts this year. In the Common School account by paying \$2,000.00 down on the bus the account was overdrawn approximately \$800.00. The High School Tuition Account is overdrawn about \$400.00 because more students entered and stayed in secondary schools than was anticipated a year ago.

It was planned to improve the playground facilities in the schools this year. This consisted of making repairs to the swings and teeter boards. We have new swings and eight new teeter boards. These materials added to the overdraft in the repair account.

Following is the statement of the budget for the year 1945-1946:

POST WAR PLANNING

We are hearing and reading a great deal now about post war planning for education by our federal, state and some of our local governments. The purpose of this planning is to provide our youth with an education that will enable them, as adults, to be better equipped to earn a living. In this respect

much stress is to be placed on Vocational education. It appears that in the post war period the Federal and State money will be available to those local governments that have planned to improve the type of education that they wish to offer their youth. The town of St. Albans needs to give this matter serious attention and start now to get ready to take advantage of any opportunities that may be coming in the future.

In this connection I wish to conclude my report with the suggestion that at this town meeting a local post war planning committee be set up to make a study of the educational needs of the town, and also that a building fund be set aside this year and added to each year, for the purpose of helping to finance any projects that may develop in the post war period.

I wish to express my gratitude to the School Committee and the citizens of the town for their cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

The general health of school children in the town of St. Albans was markedly improved in contrast to previous years.

The majority of correctable disabilities were remedied and the physical conditions altered.

Body hygiene was notably better due to efforts of teachers, parents and children to correct faulty cleanliness.

The State Department of Health is to be commended for their part in the school program and for the specific work of county nurses in maintaining health tests and programs.

Loss of time due to illness has been decreased and in every way the teachers and pupils have profited by this.

Let us continue the good work of "prevention" in the years to come that it will not be necessary to have our children "cured" of the various diseases that could have been easily prevented by our foresight.

Report of Public Health Nurse

January 1 to December 31, 1944

Bureau of Health Nursing Service

Each child is entitled to a right start in life, whether his parents can afford it or not, and he should have doctor's care during his crucial preschool years.

Weak bones, poor teeth and eyes may be formed before a child is born. In an effort to prevent this condition the Public Health Nurse endeavors to see the expectant mother as early in pregnancy as possible, especially those expecting their first babies, to insure that they have regular medical care and adequate health supervision.

In addition to home visits, the Bureau of Health offers Child Health Conferences where infants and preschool children are examined by a physician. At these conferences if several are held during the season, immunization against whooping cough, smallpox and diphtheria are offered for a small charge. Services of a dentist, dental hygienist and a nutritionist are sometimes available also. One of these conferences was held in your town this summer. Eighteen children were examined by the doctor and four were vaccinated against smallpox. This conference

was sponsored by the Farm Bureau group in cooperation with the Bureau of Health. The members assisted in making the conference a success.

In the schools, examinations by the physician, vision and hearing tests are not enough. Defects, when found, must be followed up and corrected. Conferences with the teachers and superintendent aid in promoting the growth and development of the school child, and in planning for health protection services. Projects carried out in your schools this year included audiometer hearing tests and a tuberculin skin testing program, which was available to all interested persons. Motion pictures on tuberculosis and dental care had been shown previously. A project, which would greatly increase the health protection of both the schools and family, would be the development of a program for the control of the common cold.

The services of the Crippled Children's and Pediatric Clinics of the Bureau of Health have been made available to children in this community.

The facilities of the State Sanatorium for Tuberculosis have been used by those who were referred there for diagnosis, care or x-ray. Since tuberculosis is one of Maine's most serious health problems the program of tuberculosis control is being given emphasis at this time.

The Sanitary Engineering Division services have been used by your community during the past year. This health protection is always available and contributes to community safety.

The work of the nurse could be strengthened and a great deal of time saved for the town by the organization of a permanent Health Committee. With such a committee your nurse could, another year, plan better health protection for your community.
