To John Webber, Constable, Town of St. Albans, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of St. Albans qualified to vote on the town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 10 A. D. 1947 at ten o'clock A. M.

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.
 - Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and act on same.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government and instruct the Selectmen to appoint an agent and fix his duties and compensation or act on anything relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, to determine their salary and act on anything relating thereto.
 - Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer.
 - Art. 7. To choose a superintending school committee.
- Art. 8. To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and act on anything relating to same.
- Art. 9. To choose a collector of 1947 taxes, fix his salary or commission or act on anything relating to payment or collection of the 1947 commitment.
 - Art. 10. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Sclectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary schools including

teachers wages, board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, textbooks and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for secondary school tuition.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of school buildings.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$360 00 for rent of a grade school building.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75 00 for public health nursing in St. Albans, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to employ a school physician and raise and appropriate money for same.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$61.40 the amount necessary to pay interest on school fund order.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay salary of superintendent of schools.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on town debt.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town charge account.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest on town debt.
- Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town poor account.
- Art. 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Services.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to pay Earl Badger the sum of \$20.00 for a bridge put in on the Dixie road so it would be passable to haul over.

- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to buy a Road Machine and will vote to raise and appropriate money for same.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to abate Ralph McNichols taxes for a period of five years.
- Art. 2R. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 32, Sec. 53-58.
- Art. 29. To see whether or not the town will vote to enter into a contract with C. M. Power Co. for a term of ten years, whereby, in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the town during the term of said contract, all as more fully set forth in the contract, copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the town will pay for such street lighting service in accordance with the company's municipal street lighting rate-contract basis.
- Art. 30. To see what action the town will take with reference to authorizing the selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding article.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to sell its snow removal equipment and contract for snow removal.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to purchase a second truck and snow-plough.
- Art. 33. To see what action the town will take to close the Five Corners school and others that have not been closed legally.
- Art. 34 To see if the town will vote to elect one man to look after snow fence, snow removal and sanding, for year 1947 and 1948, for eighty cents per hour for time worked.
- Art. 35 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to instruct its town officers to refuse to pay bills for labor on highways unless an itemized bill for such labor is presented for payment within thirty days from the beginning of such labor, and approved by the road commissioner.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair roads in summer.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and construction of bridges.
- Art. 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter roads.
- Art. 40. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 25 and 29 Chapt. 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$746.00 for third class maintenance, the amount necessary to enable the town to receive third money from the state.
- Art. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes on third class roads.
- Art. 43. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street and hall lights.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 45. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Hartland Volunteer Fire Co. for the same services rendered as Hartland for the ensuing year.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for Mothers Aid and Dependent Children.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 necessary for insurance on Town Hall.

Art. 48. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of soldiers graves.

Art. 49. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to Town Hall.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$155.00 to purchase 1000 feet of snow fence.

Art. 51. To act on any other matter or matters not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

Art. 52. The Selectmen will be in their office at 9 o'clock on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

Report of Road Commissioner

To the Citizens of the Town of St. Albans:

This year we have started a project which if carried out as nearly as possible over a period of five to eight years we will have several miles of much improved road.

We have bulldozed approximately three miles of road at a cost of \$1,014. I believe that money well invested. It will cost from \$1,800 to \$2,000 per mile, depending on the distance from gravel to build this type of road.

We have approximately twenty miles of dirt roads that are badly in need of improvement.

Our school buses have to travel many of these roads and some of the best farms are located on these roads.

I would recommend that the town purchase a road machine. I believe that the town would save money by owning their own machine.

ANNUAL REPORT

ST. ALBANS-1946

The Bureau of Health has many services which may be offered to families through Public Health Nursing. Examples of one of these follow.

Several years ago, while working in another district, your nurse saw a little girl whose head was pulled over to the left side. This is called a wry neck. This child was referred through the family physician to the Crippled Children's Service. Arrangements were made by that service for admission to a hospital for operation. Today her head is as straight as any child's. Now let us look at another example. The nurse received a letter from a doctor requesting that a baby, one month old, be referred to the Crippled Children's Service as the child had a wry neck. Exercises were given at the clinic and the parents carried out the instructions faithfully. In about 2 years this child was discharged from the Service, cured. She did not have to submit to an operation. The first child could have had the same treatment when she was a baby, if the parents had known about Crippled Children's Service. Other resources are available to the children of your town and your Public Health Nurse will be glad to help you use them.

Do you know that on paper Somerset County is one of the most healthy places in the State? But when your nurse visits a town she frequently learns that some communicable disease is prevalent and often she finds defects or handicaps that early care could have prevented. We could correct much in this picture if every family would report any communicable disease or suspicion of one to the local health officer within 24 hours. Families can protect their own children and other children in town by keeping them home when they have colds or other illnesses. The use of informational material your nurse is glad to share with you would also help to safeguard your health.

Because of the interest of the parents and sided by a group of interested women, four successful Child Health Conferences were held in town this summer. Children attending had thorough physical and dental examinations by a physician and a dentist. Fifteen children were immunized against diphtheria, 14 against whooping cough and 15 were vaccinated against smallpox.

At the January clinic 180 completed diphtheria immuniza-

tions. One school project this year was the audiometer hearing tests given to all children above the second grade. Only 7 were found with hearing defects. Parents have been very cooperative in correcting the defects brought to their attention. Problems are discussed with the teachers during school visits.

Health supervision visits have been made to expectant mothers, infants preschool and school children. Efforts have been made to follow tuberculosis patients, those with venereal diseases. and their contacts to insure that they have regular check-up. Several people took advantage of the X-ray clinics held in Newport in July and in Skowlegan in March.

We still do not have a Health Council in your town. Such a Council could be an incentive for additional health programs, better health protection and would promote health education.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

St. Albans, Maine February 10, 1947

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of St. Albans

It is with pleasure that I submit this, my first annual report on your schools.

I have had an opportunity to acquaint myself with your educational system and find that it follows a normal pattern with both assests and liabilities.

Like every other community you have a building shortage. Your schools have been consolidated ahead of your present housing facilities. However, the church alleviates the overcrowding for the present and another year may tell us more definitely what our school population is to be for the future.

You have five teachers handling nine grades and 200 pupils

which is way out of reason. Until this condition is eliminated to a point whereby a teacher has from 25-30 pupils, you can't be too critical.

To help as an immediate measure I suggest that our Sub-Primary grade be dropped until adequate space and an increased teaching force makes their attendance more practical for all concerned. If this recommendation is accepted by your School Committee for another year, children will not be able to begin school in September unless they will be six years of age by December 31. This will decrease our numbers for the coming year and cut the teaching load to not more than two grades to a teacher, whereas, this year two teachers have had three grades each.

The schools are open for your inspection at all times. You are not only invited, instead, I urge you to visit and become better acquainted with the problems facing your school authorities. Too, I believe a better acquaintance on your part will help to eliminate some of the misunderstanding that occasionally presents itself.

I hope that we may be able to secure the services of a Music Instructor for the coming year. Too, I am of the opinion that the size of our school warrants the services of a man to plan and execute activities for the boys.

Your transportation system has good equipment, your children have access to a good hot dinner, your building is well kept and you have been fortunate by having good teachers. I believe you have much fir which you should be thankful. The cost is only average on a State-wide basis.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

Examination of the pupils of St. Albans school showed an improvement in general health over 1945. Many disabilities which are correctable have not been corrected by the parents.

The rooms are somewhat crowded and this certainly is a public health problem. The temporary use of the church building for housing pupils is unsatisfactory in present form.

St. Albans is to be congratulated upon its excellent teaching facilities and fine building. However, the building is small for present needs and enlargement of the same should be considered.

Guidance of children across the highway should be planned. The cost of a traffic director's time would be far cheaper than the preventable loss of life of a single scholar.

The public health nurse is to be commended for her excellent support in helping keep these children well.
